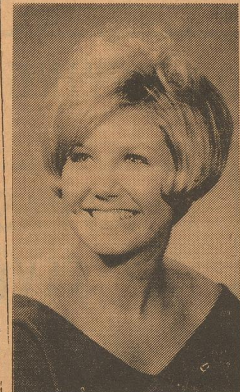

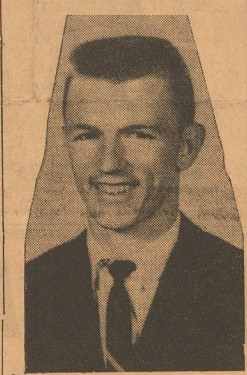
Heart Attack Fatal To E. C. Bramlett

Prayer service will be held each evening at 7:30 and preaching service will be at 8 P. M.

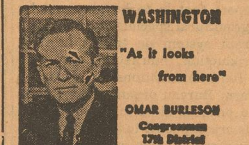
Mrs. Ruby Lee Kinser will be pianist for the music service with a local member leading the singing.

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WASHINGTON, D. C. — FOR MORE THAN 20 YEARS there has been before the United States Senate for ratification an instrument known as the Genocide Treaty.

THE PROPOSED TREATY DE FINES GENOCIDE as "acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national ethnic, racial or religious group, as such."

THE SPECIFIED ACTS ARE ALREADY prohibited by law against an individual. It is superfluous to contend that the nature of the crime changes when committed against a group of individuals. The language of the treaty seems to suggest that it is more evil to murder a group of people falling in this definition than it would be to murder one person of such a group.

THE WORDING, THEREFORE is of dubious definition with no commonly accepted interpretation. It is no wonder that the term genocide is loosely thrown at the United States, connected with every controversy from attacks by the Black Panthers to our air raids on North Vietnam.

FOR MORE THAN TWO DECADES the United States has refused to consider the proposed treaty the full name of which is "The Convention of the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide." Actually, 74 Nations have signed the Treaty since 1951 but it has never been applied to or by any of them.

THE FACT REMAINS THAT IF THE UNITED STATES were to ratify, those Nations who dislike us, of which there are many, would be able to exploit our peculiar position as a powerful nation of the World, subjecting us to propoganda and international pressures. As a Nation we could be charged before international tribunals and as citizens could be dragged before foreign courts without any of the guarantees in our system of justice. The American Bar Association has been against the proposal because it realizes that the provisions of such an agreement would work contrary to the American system of law and the rights which many Americans enjoy under its Constitution.

SOME ORGANIZATIONS IN THIS COUNTRY are advising people in their publications that a ratification of the Treaty is imminent and call for donations to fight it. It is perfectly well to fight it but there is no indication that any action is about to take place in the Senate and nothing is scheduled on it at all. Certainly, it is wise for all of us as citizens to be aware that a resolution is pending for the ratification of the Treaty and oppose any consideration of it. The United States has no business, and it would in fact be dangerous to our freedom, to enter agreement whereby any citizen could be tried in the Country where alleged acts under the Treaty were committed and punished under the laws of that Country. In theory, a United States citizen could be convicted of a crime without definition, under rules and procedures of foreign courts and liable to punishment not yet named.

ALREADY SOME OF OUR MEN IN VIETNAM are being charged with atrocities against civilians. Conceivably, no statute of limitations is involved in the Treaty, our men in Vietnam might be charged and tried at some future date for acts taken in the lawful prosecution of war against the communists.

Funeral services were held at 2 P. M. Friday in Comanche Funeral Home Chapel with burial in Sipe Springs Cemetery.

A lifelong resident of Comanche County, Mrs. Rhymes was born October 28, 1885. She married Walter J. Rhymes, March 6, 1911. He preceded her in death in June 1949.

Survivors include a son, James L. Rhymes of Kansas City, Mo., two daughters, Mmes. M. D. Uittman of Denver, Colo., and Peggy Wood of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. H. H. Bible of Cisco; four grand children and two great grand children.

In a special board meeting held on June 22, 1970 in the Eastland County Farm Bureau meeting room, the local Farm Bureau directors adopted a resolution committing themselves to the "leadership of other county Farm Bureaus in a joint effort to upgrade and strengthen the organizations program to better serve the needs of farm and ranch families." Top priorities would be loan value on peanuts."

The Board also voted to send President Jack Cozart as a representative to a special statewide meeting of county presidents Aug. 27-28 in Brownwood. The purpose of this conference is to chart a recommended course of action for the Farm Bureau.

All of the 203 organized county Farm Bureaus in Texas are holding special board meetings this summer to evaluate current programs and set goals. A summary report of these meetings will be presented to all the county presidents at Brownwood. In addition, they will consider a special report that is to be prepared by agricultural specialists in the land grant system on trends in farm production, marketing, etc.

Recommendations on what the Farm Bureau organization should do on both state and county levels are expected to come from the Brownwood meeting.

According to a procedural plan adopted by the TFB board of directors in June, a statewide committee will be appointed and charged with the responsibility of implementing the state-level recommendations. County Farm Bureaus will be urged to appoint similar county committees to carry out local programs and activities.


