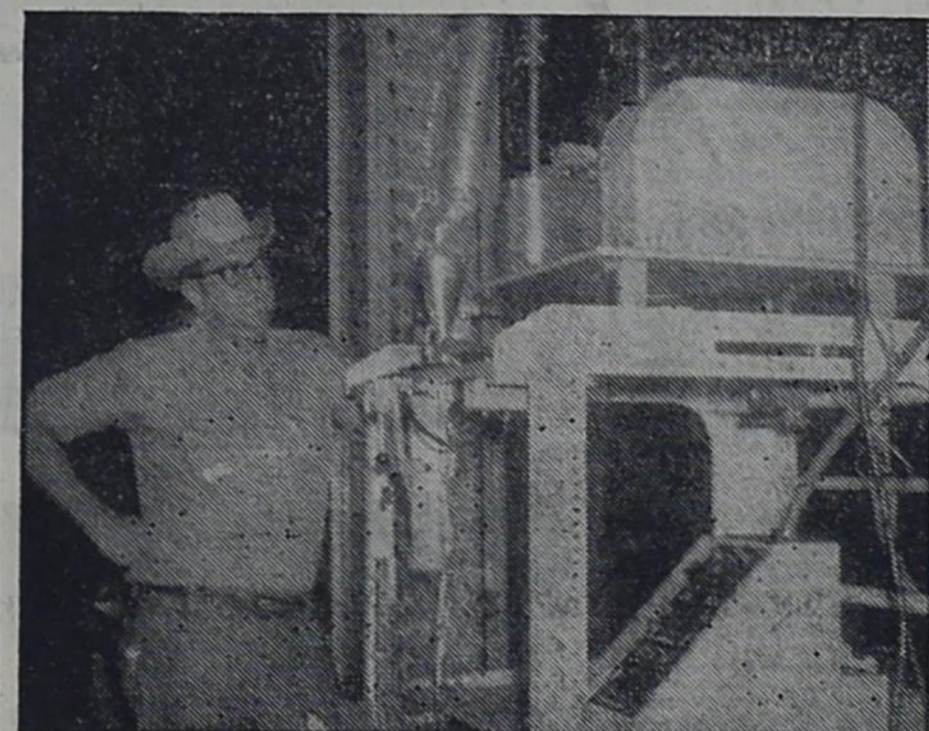

The Lions Club is doing fine work assisting the school in various programs and also assisting other clubs with their projects plus many civic projects of their own.

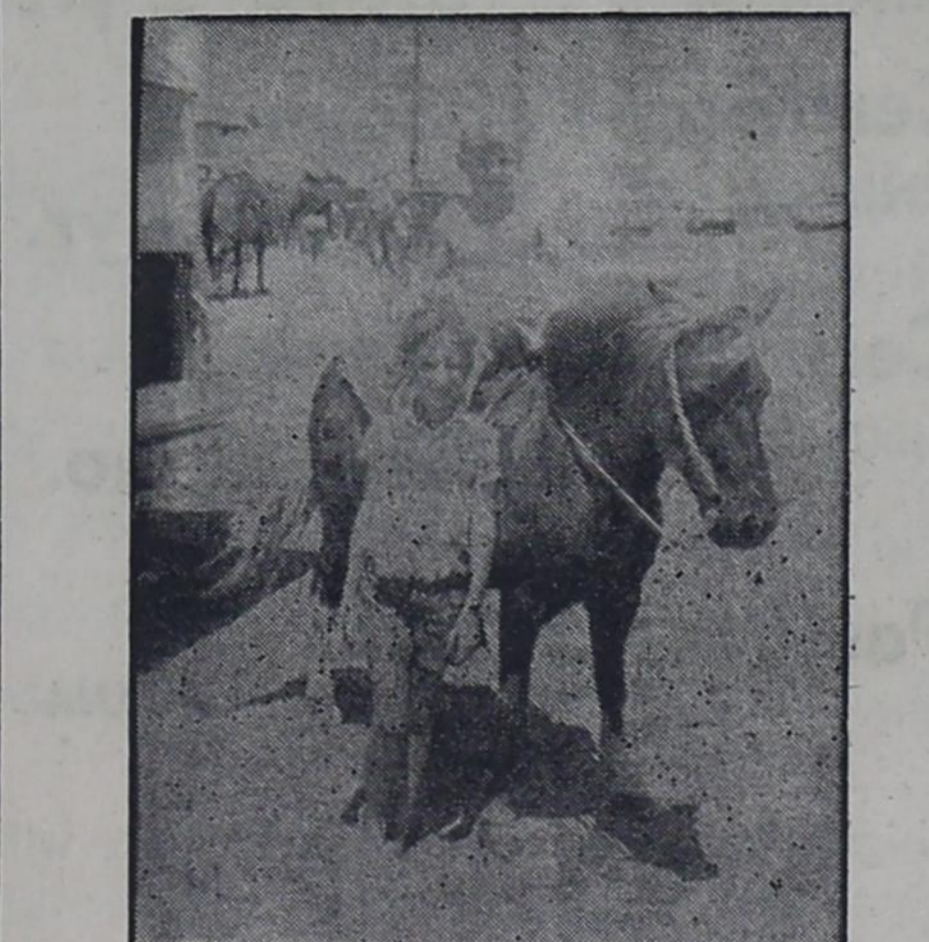

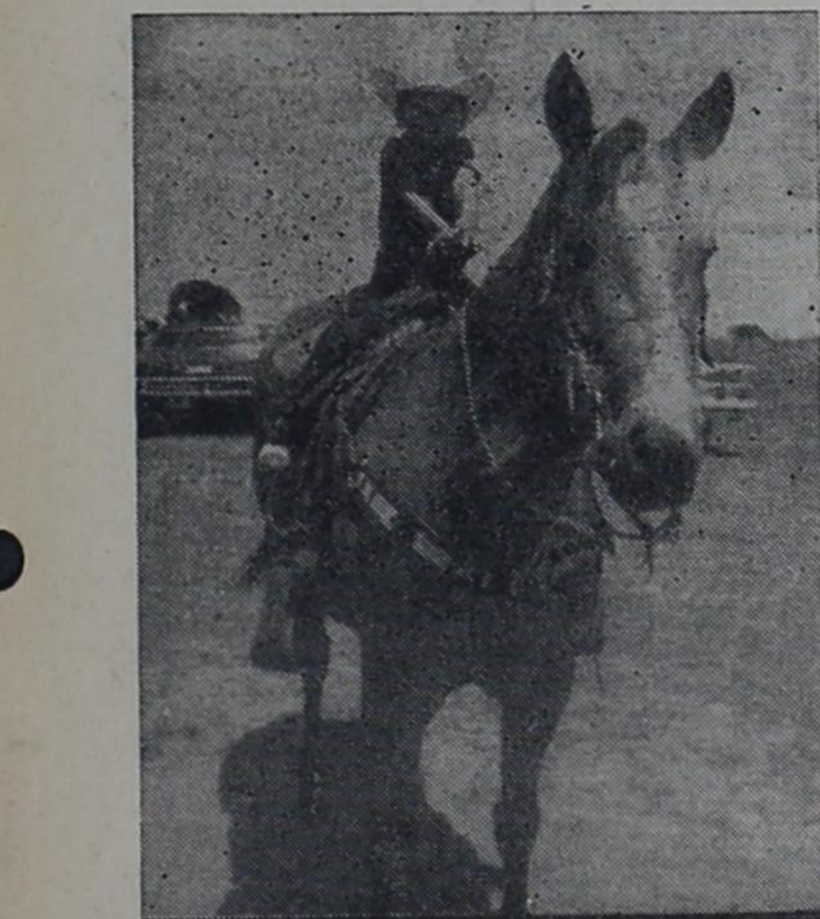

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.

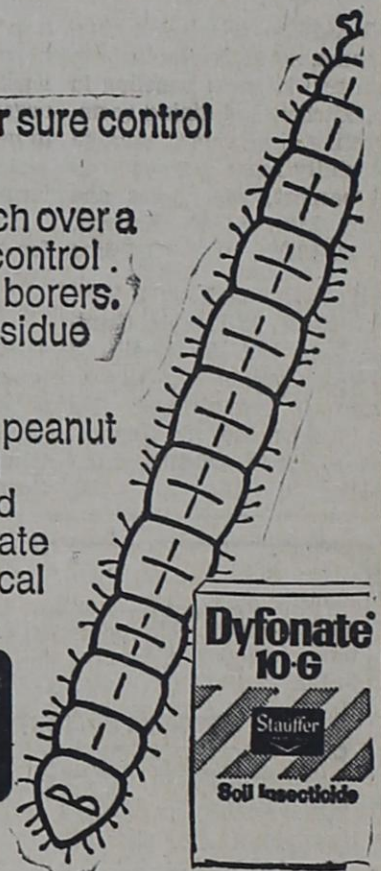

Medicare Marks 7th Anniversary

July 1, 1973, marked the 7th anniversary of the beginning of the Medicare program. It will also mark the first extension of Medicare coverage and benefits to Americans under age 65 who are receiving disability insurance benefits under the Social Security or railroad retirement program, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

An estimated 2000 disabled beneficiaries in the Abilene district under the age 65 will become entitled to Medicare benefits, Tuley says. Coverage starts July 1, 1971. More recent beneficiaries will be covered effective with the 25th month of continuous entitlement to benefits.

insurance part will also be automatic unless the beneficiary files a written refusal request. The \$6.30 monthly premium for Part B will be deducted from the monthly benefit he added.

Another special provision in the Social Security Amendments of 1972 will provide Medicare coverage beginning July 1, 1973, for most individuals needing kidney transplantation or hemodialysis. This cannot begin earlier than the third month after the month a course of renal hemodialysis begins. Those eligible include a worker of any age who is fully or currently insured under social security, or a spouse or dependent child of such a worker.

Also, widows aged 52-64, in receipt of social security benefits if their impairments meet the disability requirements and have existed at least 25 months. Mr. Tuley urged such disabled mothers to get in touch with the social security office for more information.
