In the early 1900's we moved from near Gorman to a place three miles north of Kokomo. Our post office was Staff. The mail was brought by Uncle Tom (somebody). He would go from Eastland to Stephenville every other day. Would carry passengers also. Staff at that time had two "General Stores" groceries, dry goods, hardware etc., a drug store, blacksmith shop, doctor's office, a parsonage, two churches, gin, and a telephone exchange. (I bought the place we lived on in 1921).

We attended Triumph School and among my teachers were Frank Dean, Golda Chambliss and Pearl Gollehon and others. Our school was up to date. Just painted boards for blackboards, home made desks and seats, with two and three to a desk.

We did not know what football and basketball were. We played scrub town ball, wolf over the river, etc. We had as high as 75 in a one teacher room there at one time. I believe Mr. Dean was the first teacher there when they divided the room. He was among my first teachers. We all walked to school in those days. I remember one morning during school, one of the boys yelled "yonder comes a car." The teacher let the whole bunch out to see that car. The first one for me. Oh! it was such a wonder for us to see a "Horseless Carriage." I was in school there when I saw my first aeroplane.

We would come to Gorman about twice a year. In those days it was just work, work and more work. No shows, no TV, no radio. You learned at an early age what a hoe handle was used for. Also a cotton sack. We would go to parties on Saturday nights. None through the week.

Peanut Growers Approve Market Quotas - 1975-77

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced official results of the December 9-13 referendum, confirming that peanut growers have approved use of marketing quotas for peanut crops to be produced in

1975, 1976 and 1977. Final tabulation showed 97.0 percent of growers voting approved continuing quotas for another 3-year period. The vote was 42,317 for and 1,294 against, for a total of 43,611 ballots.

The total vote in this referendum compares with a total of 43,641 cast in the December 1971 referendum on quotas for 1972, 1973 and 1974 crops. The favorable percentage vote in the 1971 referendum was 97.4. Since more than the necessary two-thirds of farmers voting approved quotas, they will continue in effect for 1975, 1976 and 1977 peanut crops.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect since 1949. Since growers now have approved quotas for another 3-year period, it will not be necessary for them to vote again before 1977. Under the quota program, marketing penalties will apply to "excess" peanuts of growers who do not comply

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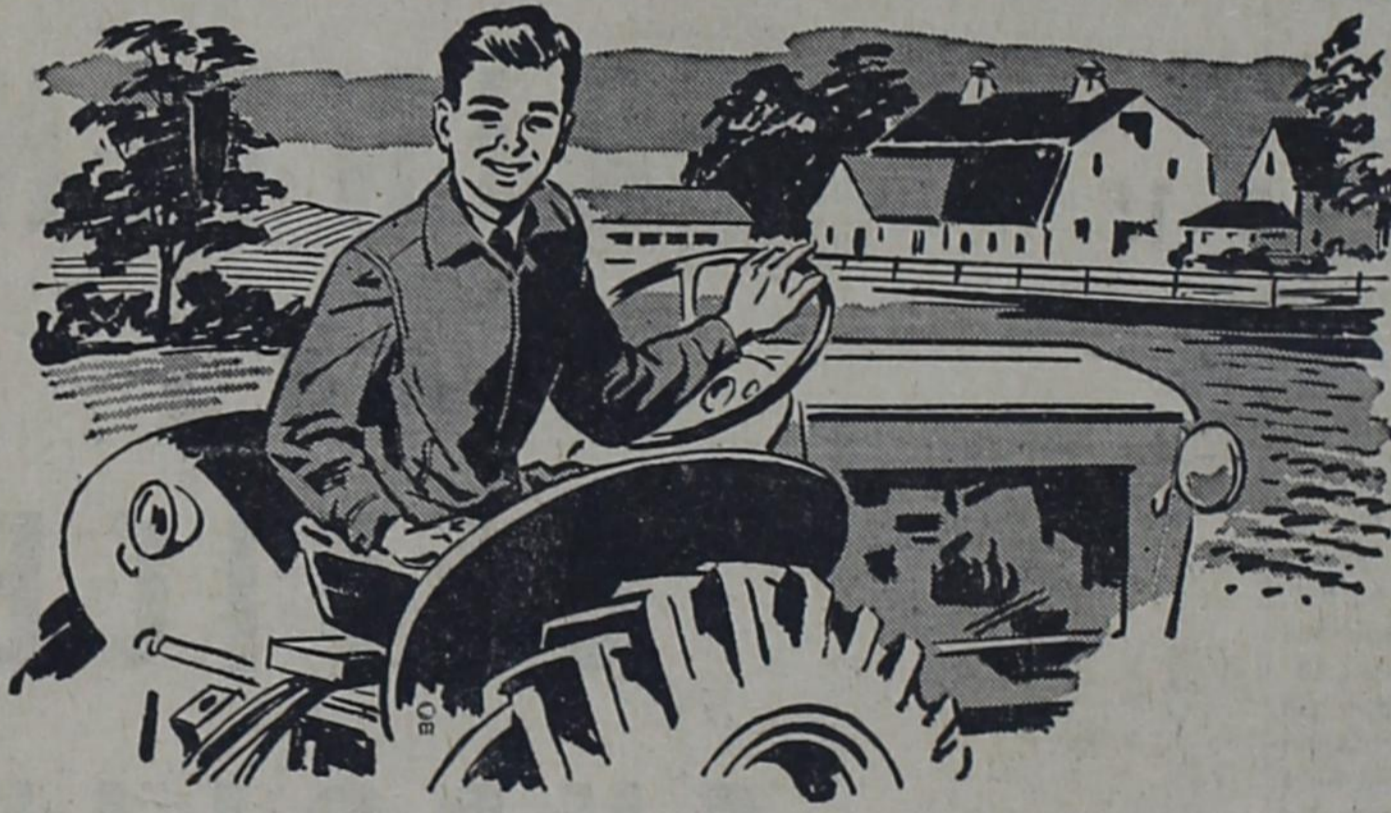

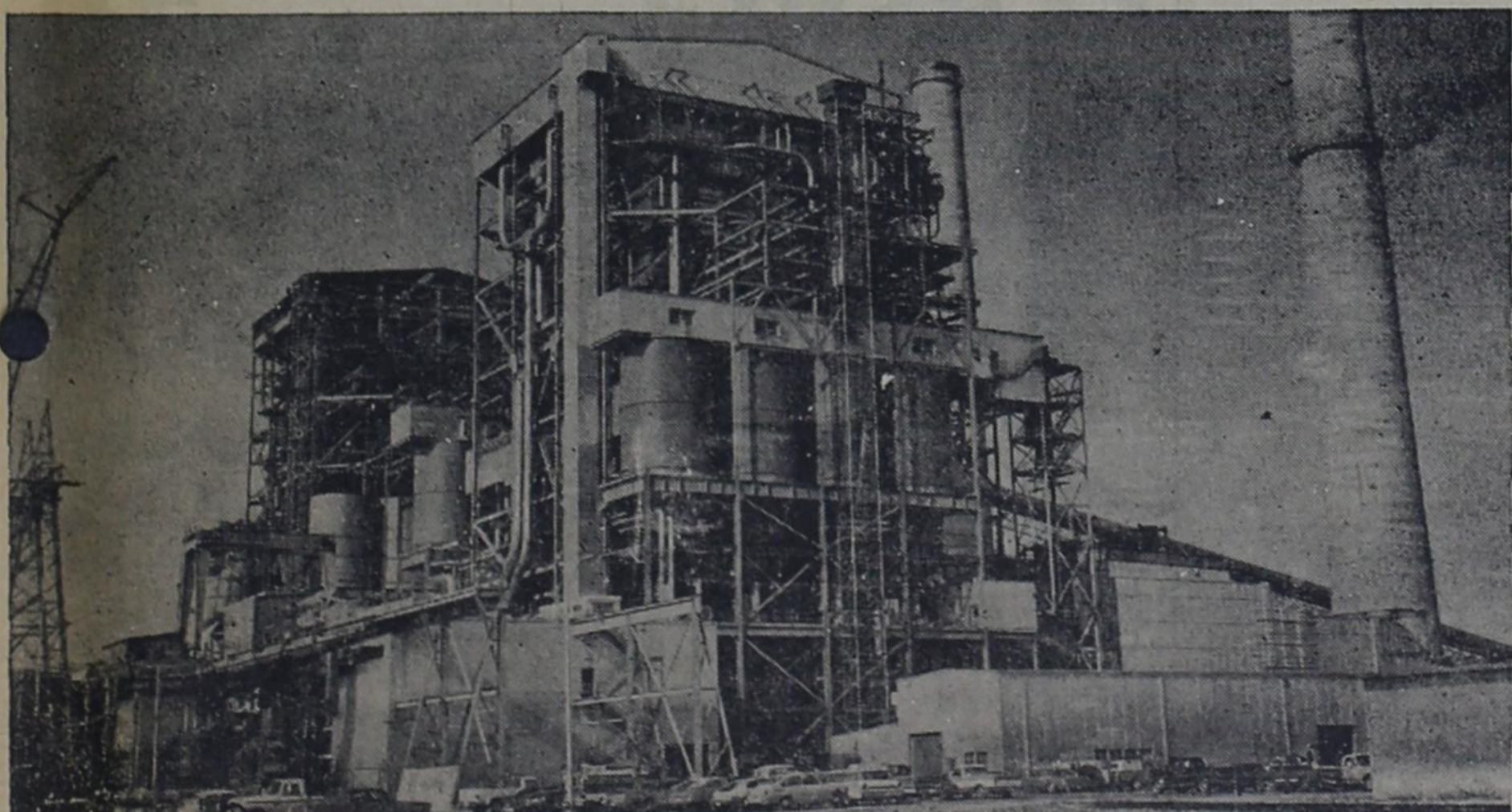

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — EVERY COUNTRY IN THE WORLD, including our own, has had its national police and intelligence operations.

OUR OWN COUNTRY MUD- DLED THROUGH WARS AND CRIME WAVES without either a CIA or FBI. We did, how- ever, during the American Revolution, have secret intelligence operations. Theodore Roosevelt founded the Bureau of Investigation which preceded the FBI by some 30 years.

NOW, WITH THE TREND TOWARDS LIBERALISM, there are those who have found reason to want to dis- mantle all our intelligence a- gencies. Just recently, the old UnAmerican Activities Com- mittee in the House of Repre- sentatives was scuttled by the New Congress. Under the in- fluence of Watergate, the CIA is under attack for conducting domestic surveillances, an au- thority which was never intend- ed. Neither had the times of the 60's been intended or ever expected when the thousands of revolutionists (their own term) marched in Washington and other cities across the country. The question was al- ways where did they get their finances. People who appar- ently lived well didn't come here from the four corners of the Nation by airplane for nothing. It may be an over- simplification but the role of CIA at that time, was to try to find out what foreign con- nections the leaders of these revolutionary groups may have had in financing these activities.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES OF BOTH THE HOUSE AND THE SENATE are being formed to investigate both the CIA and FBI. These agencies have grown to massive size and are accused of a serious challenge to popular freedom.

THE FBI IS NOW CHARG- ED WITH ASSEMBLING IN- FORMATION such as has come its way on Members of Congress. The CIA is charged with having kept a file on 10,000 or more Americans in the course of trying to deter- mine if the war protests of the 1960's were inspired or fi- nanced from foreign sources, and to what extent.

AS YET, THERE IS NO SIGHTED INSTANCE OF ANY Member of Congress be- ing intimidated by the FBI, nor any war demonstrator having been unduly hounded by the CIA. It could have hap- pened in isolated instances without shaking the founda- tions of this Republic.

AS FAR AS CONGRESS- MEN ARE CONCERNED, THEY ARE NO LESS free of peculiarities, and have human behavior like anyone else, but, although some are suspicious that they may have been in- vestigated, nothing shows up yet that any such information was formally solicited but only that which came to them by reference.

THE POINT IS, THAT OUR HIGH CRIME RATE, and the foment in the Country, will continue as opportunity presents itself, but there are those in this increasingly as- sertive and permissive Demo- cratic society, who seem to think there is a threat of op- pression when laws are en- forced or investigations are made of actions designed to overthrow and subvert this Nation.

DEMANDS ARE NOW HEARD IN THE CONGRESS, from people and organizations around the Country, that there should be no confidentiality in these agencies and other in- telligence operations in our Government for fear of re- pressive action. Nothing is per- fect and it is entirely possible that a reorganization, a re- statement of aims and prin- ciples should be redefined to guide these operations. It would, however, be disastrous and make ineffective law en- forcemen and hamper efforts to guard against insecurity for this Country, if total control and publicity of our intelli- gence activities were imposed by the Congress. If this should happen, we can forget about conducting investigations nec- essary to our internal security. There is a limit on secrecy and sensible men should apply
