In an emergency meeting on April 28 the City Commission employed two policemen.Delbert Biggs, who is currently on the Force in Dublin, was employed as Police Chief and Franklin Rice from Carbon was employed as a reserve officer for night patrol. Mr. Biggs and family will be coming on the job within the next week to ten days. Mr. Rice is already working. Mr. Biggs is a fully certified police officer and Mr. Rice will be working toward certification. I know that all of you will help these men to be good officers in our town. A called meeting was held on Tuesday, May 2 for a study of the tax structure of the city. It was found through this study that there must be some adjustments made in the tax rolls in order to continue to give even the current level of serivce to the community. We are still trying to operate on tax values that were set at least even years ago. The same numbers of dollars collected then just won't give enough dollars to

continue today's operations. In the regular meeting on May 4 I informed the Commission that I had attended a meeting of the Water Board and was informed officially that thier rates would go up to us as of July 1 to 20 percent

Mr. Green and Ar. Hirst, members of that Board. met with the Commission and explained why a raise was necessary. A study is now being made to decide what rate adjustments we must make. City utility rates of neighboring towns are being looked at and we find that the rates of De Leon and Dublin are both abouve our rates by a good margin. There will possible be adjustments made in all city utility rates. At the current time none of the utilities are paying their way. Bob Green was reappointed to the Water

Board for two years. A resolution was passed to advertise for bids on a six-cylinder pickup truck to replace the one now owned by the city. Specifications for the pickup will be drawn up and advertised in the near future.

Some salary adjustments wer made to conform with minimum wage.

Commissioners were instructed to get budget requests in at once so that a proposed budget can be drawn and presented at a public hearing.

Mr. Donnie Skaggs of De Leon was employed to audit the city books after the closing day of the fiscal year, which is May 31.

Bills were approved.

An advisory committee from local civic organizations of the community is being formed to meet with the Commission at least every three months to give the Commision input from the community. Some of these have already be appointed and others will be in the near future.

I have been asked by some about the fifty cents that many of you are paying on your water bill as a volunteer payment. This plan was devised several years ago so that a fund might be started for the purchase on a new pumper truck when the one we are using has to be retired. When a truck becomes 30 years old, it must be replaced or a penalty will be assesed against city fire insurance. This truck will be 30 years old early in the 80's. This fund is a pass book savings account set up for this purpose and the money is badly needed. This at the current time there is a little over \$7,000 in the fund. The price of a replacement now would run around \$30,000. or more. I think you can see that this is avery worthly fund. If


