Jerry E. Wylie Oil Drilling Co. of Abilene completed No. 1 Arnold Butler in the Duster, Northeast (Marble Falls) Field in Comanche County.

Location is three miles south of Gorman, spotting 2,310 feet from the north and west lines of Section 44, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 78 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus two barrels of water. Flow was through a 10-64-inch choke with 650 pounds casing and 225 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 2,745-49 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

Total depth is 2,580 feet. The well had a gas-oil ratio of 1.538-1.

Riddle Oil Co. of San Antonio will drill No. 2 Vernon Wright in the Gorman (Ranger) Field three miles north of Gorman.

The planned 3,300-foot venture is located on an 80-acre lease.

It spots 2,173 feet from the north and 900 feet from the east lines of Section 3, H&TC Survey, A-118.

Stenholm and Rhodes In Run-Off

A total of 330 voters in Gorman went to the polls Saturday in the First Primary election to help elect a new district clerk, help put Charles Stenholm in a run off election with Dusty Rhodes and Mrs. Joann Johnson to County Clerk. Pat Ingram received 246 votes for Justice of Peace Precinct 5, in Gorman.

In the 17th District Congressional race Gorman voters went for Stenholm with 167 votes and Dusty Rhodes second with 84. Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown received 245 votes. For U. S. Senate, Kruger received 188 votes and Joe Christie 139.

John Hill won the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas and Gorman voters gave him 158 votes and Governor Dolph Briscoe 148 votes.

For District Clerk Roy Lane received 198 votes and incumbent Joe T. Gray received 129 votes. Joann Johnson received 243 votes and Jay Carter 65. Scott Bailey received 153 votes for County Judge. Mrs. Scott Bailey received 237 votes for Democratic Chairman for Eastland County.

E.G. Henderson received 14 write in votes to be elected Election Judge for Gorman and Precinct Five. Run Off election for Congress 17th District will be June 3.

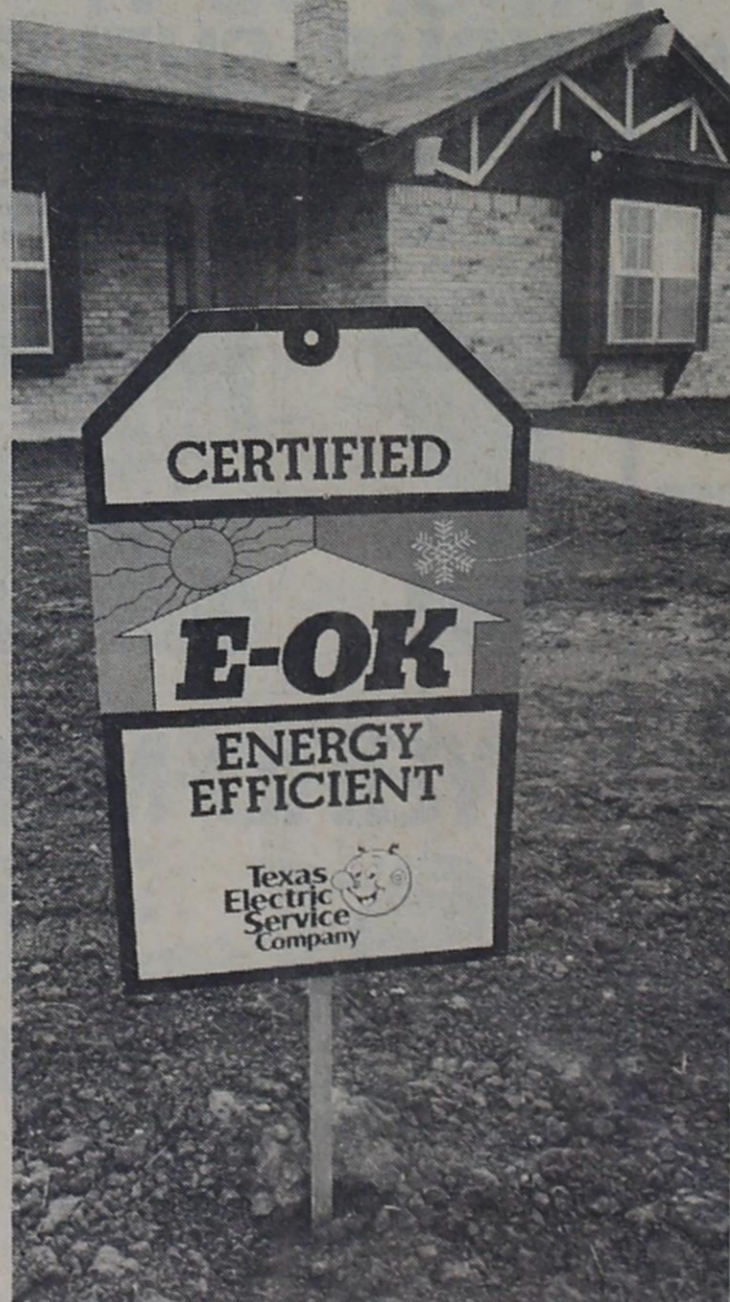
