Livestock Show Opens 3-Day Run

Eastland County 4-H and FFA Youth will be exhibiting over 300 animals at the annual County Livestock Show, Thursday through Saturday. The stock show will be held at the County show barns on Highway 3103 north of Eastland.

Approximately \$2500 will be given as premiums to the exhibitors this week. Many attractive trophies and ribbons will be presented in addition to the premiums. Among the trophies to be presented will be the Grand Champion Steer trophy which will be given by the Farmers Peanut Company of Gorman.

A new treat that all exhibitors will receive this year is a certificate from the Red Gap Western Store and Rodeo Shop of Cisco. The certificates will entitle each exhibitor to a ten percent discount on items purchased at the Red Gap Store. Among the improvements that visitors will see at the stock show are new concrete isles in the swine barn. The Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association ads new

improvements to the stock show facilities each year.

Official judges for the show will be Bill Scott of Abilene swine judge; Tim Stone of Clyde, beef cattle judge; Roger Blackmon of Coleman, goat, sheep and lamb judge; and Tom Whitaker of Abilene, rabbit judge. The dairy judge will be announced at the show.

All animals except rabbits must be entered in the show by 10:00 p.m. Thursday. The rabbits must be entered by noon Friday. The show will end with the stock show sale Saturday night at the Eastland Auction Co. Merchants and individuals are encouraged to attend the sale and purchase prize winning animals at premium prices Saturday night. Businesses and individuals purchased advertisements in the show catalogue. This is a method used to provide prize money for the exhibitors.

The concession stand will be operated by the County 4-H Adult leaders. They invite the public to come to the concession building for meals, coffee, cold drinks and baked goods.

JOE GRAY SAYS

If it were not for the boll weevil I wouldn't be here. As a matter of fact, if it were not for the boll weevil I would not be anywhere.

My people on both sides of the house were cotton farmers. My grandfather on my father's side of the house was Joe. W. Gray, who at the time of his death was the oldest native-born Texan living in Cisco. Granddad died in August of 1930. He was born on a farm out of Van Alstyne, and at this late date there seem to be some doubt as to whether granddad was born in Grayson or Collin County. My understanding of it, is that he always considered himself as being a native of Collin County.

He married my grandmother, I know not where, but farmed in Kosse and Thornton area of Limestone until the bollweevil made cotton farming so unprofitable there. I am not sure when the bollweevil hit Limestone County in full fury, but it must have been sometime about the turn of the century.

So my grandfather looked around for another location to farm. Moving away from the bollweevil then was about all a farmer could do about the insect pests. They didn't know as much about insecticides then as known now. Granddad decided to move his family to Eastland County to escape the weevil.

So my father and his brother together with their father got control of some land about three miles north of Rising Star on the Cisco Road.

They rented a house in Carbon while the men of the family built a house on the farm. Grandmother and her three girls remained in Carbon while Granddad and his two boys built a house.

Later they added a cotton gin to the farming operation and for a good number of years this corner was known as Gray's Gin.

My father was Walter Gray and I don't blush one bit when I say he was the finest man that I have ever known. As a young boy, Dad suffered an attack of scarlet fever which left him with a defective left leg. For the rest of his life he had to use a crutch to walk, but I never in all my life heard him

complain about a thing nor did I ever hear of him ever wanting any kind of special consideration because of his handicap.

Needless to say, my father exerted a tremendous influence for good on my life and in the course of this campaign I shall discuss with the voters of this county some of the many ways he influenced my life, my work and my beliefs. These are things that I think you should know about your district clerk. As a candidate for re-election to this office I shall discuss more of them next week and in the weeks to come.

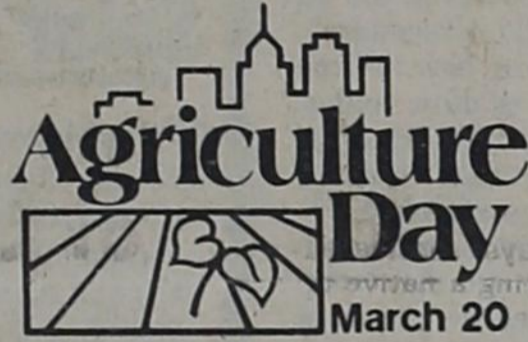

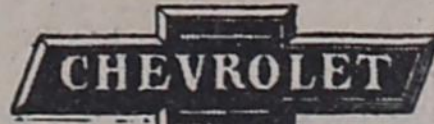

Plans were made to have a 4-H program at the April 10 meeting of the club, and activities for the Spring Fun Day were discussed.

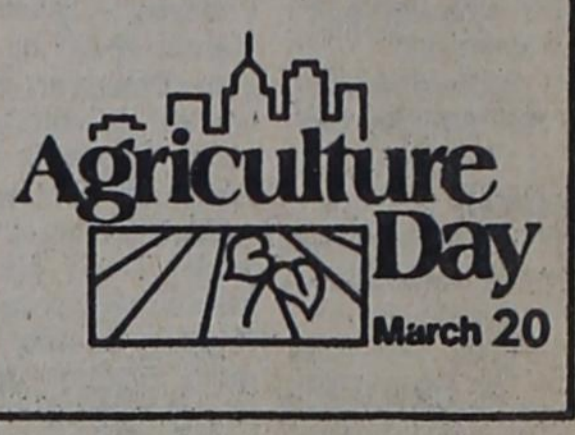

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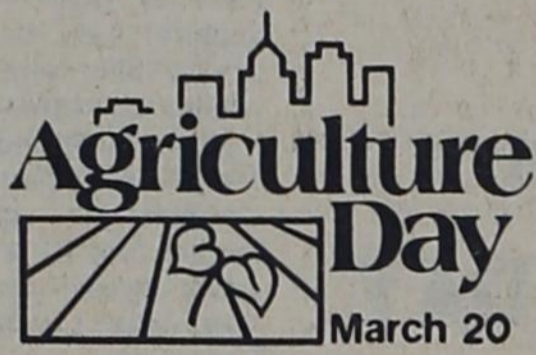

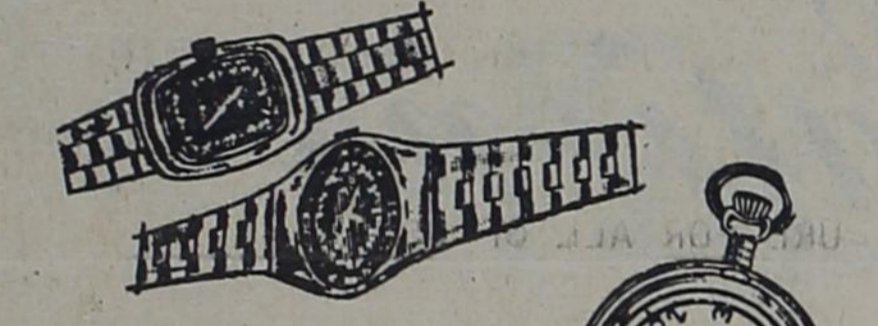

The Nutribird says "Eat a balanced diet every day" and help celebrate March, Nutrition Month, according to Mrs. Janet Thomas County Extension Agent. The Nutribird emphasizes the need for good nutrition and weight control obtained from eating a balanced diet.

according to individual food needs. This knowledge of the balanced diet will help you to fight food fads and "wonder" foods.

"Faddism and nutrition nonsense have created a major public health problem, with Americans squandering \$2 billion on

food fads," the agent reported.

"These people are fooled, because they don't know - or won't accept scientific facts about foods and nutrition," she challenged. She cited "ignorance, indifference and fear" as the major factors that contribute to the situation.

"Victims are persuaded that helath foods wonder diets or super pills can produce magical results she continued.

"These people accept false promises of the quack and believe they can regain youth vigor and charm or lose ugly fat, no counting of calories, no exercise.

"And they believe claims, such as those for having nerves soothed while miraculously being cured of whatever ails them," the agent added.

Mrs. Thomas termed food fads dangerous for several reasons.

"Food fads and nutrition quackery are dangerous because essential nutrients may be lacking from the fad diet - malnutrition could result."

"Instead, a variety of foods wilo produce a wholesome diet."

"Also, children following a fad diet may not get the nutrients they need for growth and development.

"In addition, attention to a serious ailment may be

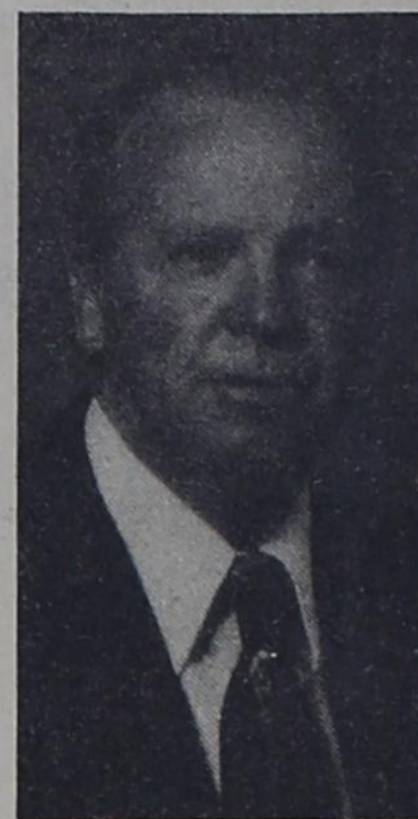

starts with the removal of as much of last year's diseased wood as possible during the dormant season. Follow with a spray program in the spring using a copper fungicide. Streptomycin sulfate can also be used to control the disease, but it is not readily available.

Another practice that can help reduce the severity of Fire Blight in pears is to avoid heavy nitrogen fertilization in the spring. Excess levels of nitrogen or excessive pruning will cause abundance of tender succulent growth which is extremely susceptible to Fire Blight. When fertilizing pear trees, apply a balanced fertilizer (13-13-13, 12-24-12 or 10-10-10). If the trees are sprayed in the yard where they will be receiving additional nitrogen from lawn fertilization, use an even lower level of nitrogen-containing fertilizer, such as 5-10-10.

When buying trees, select varieties which are resistant to Fire Blight. Kieffer and Orient are most often recommended. Magness and Moonflow were developed for their resistance to Fire Blight but have not proven resistant under Texas Conditions. French type pears such as Bartlet are extremely susceptible to Fire Blight.

Pears are an excellent backyard fruit, but they require planning and care to insure success. That planning begins now in the winter months with variety selections, pruning and fertility.

The warm sunshine in Eastland County last week go a lot of folks out in their gardens. It will soon be planting time for many of the vegetables.

Each spring we receive calls from gardeners who report their vegetables die soon after plants emerge from the soil. This is called damping-off and is caused by several different fungi that live in the soil. To control damping-off, you first plant your garden on a raised bed. The beds should be eight to ten inches tall. Treat the soil where you know that you have a problem with a fungicide

"You can learn to separate fact from fiction by learning the basics of good nutrition. Read materials about nutrition obtained from the government, universities, Extension service and accepted nutrition organizations," she concluded.

known as Captan. Captan can be sprayed on the row and then worked in with a rake. Also in buying seed for the garden, make sure the seed is treated with a fungicide.

Small seed packets can be treated by taking a small amount of the fungicide, captan, and placing this in the envelope with the seed. A small amount is that amount of fungicide which will stay on the tip of a knife blade. After treating seeds, make sure that you wash your hands thoroughly. Damping-off is a serious problem in home gardens, especially in a cool, wet spring. To avoid this problem, select good quality seed, treat the seed, plant in treated soil, and use a raised bed.

Pears do well in Eastland County, but there is one big problem—a bacterial disease known as Fire Blight. Control of this disease must begin now if a pear crop is expected.

Trees affected by Fire Blight are characterized by rapid death of blossoms, fruit, leaves and stems during the growth season. The bacteria overwinters in cankers formed on last year's diseased limbs. During spring bloom the cankers will become active and the bacteria will be washed or carried to developing blossoms by insects.

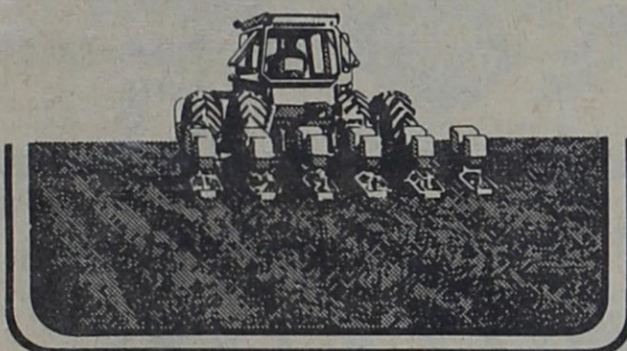
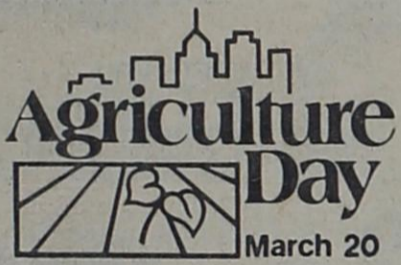

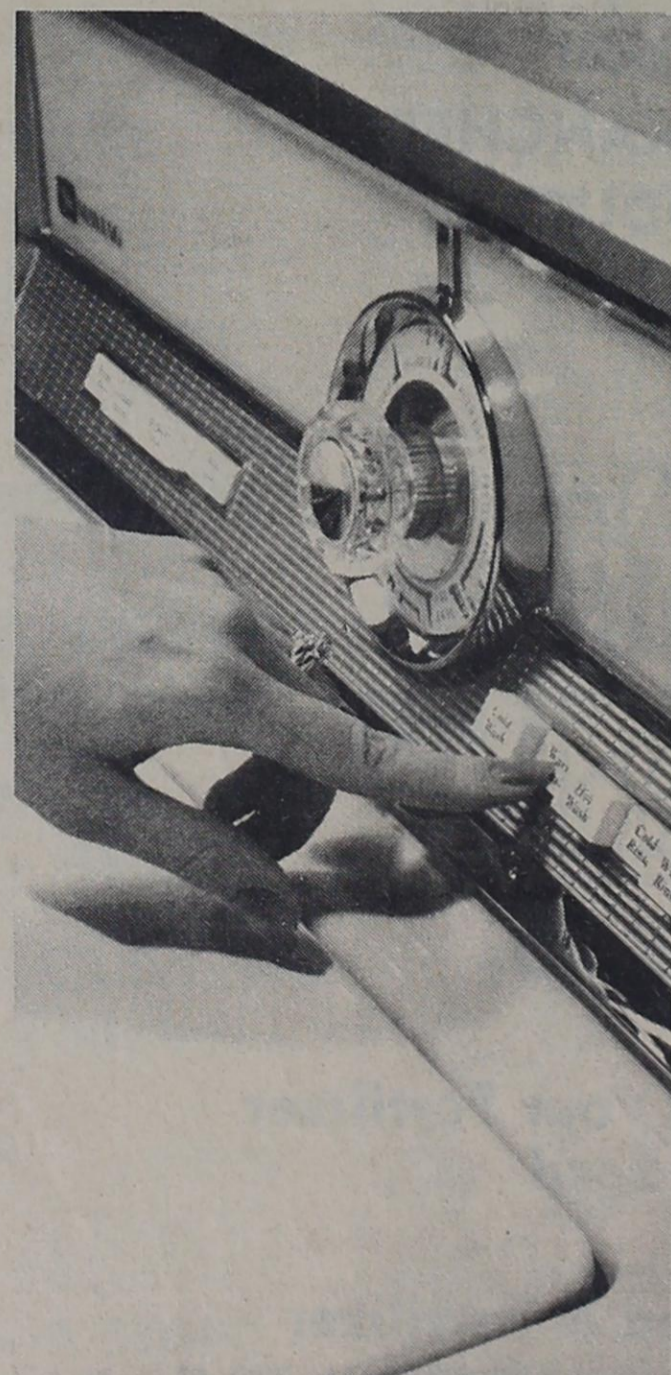
