DUBLIN — The Gorman Panthers spoiled the Dublin Lions home opener Friday night by handing them their second defeat of the 1977 season by a score of 16-0.

**Eastland Gets Paving Okay**

The Eastland County commissioners received the right-of-way to pave Farm-to-Market Road 2563 between the intersections of FM 2689 northeast to FM 2214 at their meeting Monday.

Commissioners said the 2 1/2 miles of road work will offer paved roads to commuters between Gorman and Eastland by way of Lake Leon.

In other business, the commissioners adopted the budget for 1978. Judge Scott Bailey termed the budget as "very conservative." This was necessary to keep taxes at their present level, he added.

The commissioners will attend a sub-regional meeting of the council of government at noon Sept. 21 at the Trails West Restaurant in Eastland. Representatives from Comanche, Stephens and Eastland counties will be elected to the council.

The Panthers had it pretty much their own way in the non-district contest by racking up 12 first downs to the Lions two; 222 yards rushing to the Lions nine; and completing two out of six passes while Lions came up zero for 15.

But, the Lions defensive unit made the Panthers offense work for their score. Gorman gave up the ball seven times on fumbles and had to punt out of trouble four times.

The Panthers first score came on a 33-yard drive after the Dublin punter fumbled a snap from the center and was trapped for a 13-yard loss on the Lion's 33-yard line.

At the end of the drive, halfback Blaine Gibbs made his first touchdown of the night by coming over right tackle with 6:53 left in the first quarter. Quarterback Steve Keith came around left end for the two-point conversion.

On the next series, Dublin managed to move the ball from their 35-yard line to their 49 before a seven-yard loss and an incomplete pass forced them to punt to the Panthers' 36.

Richard Arnold, Blackwell Hospital administrator was appointed Thursday, Sept. 8, to chair the West Central Texas Emergency Medical Services System Advisory Council.

He succeeds John Nunn as chairman of the group. Because Arnold previously was vice chairman, Don Comedy of the Haskell Free Press was elected to the second-place office.

Formerly a training coordinator for emergency medical services, Nunn was hired in June as emergency systems coordinator for the West Texas area. Since the coordinator is a state position, the former chairman had to relinquish the position, Nunn explained.

Other business at the monthly meeting included preparing the final copy of the questionnaire for the 38 ambulance services in West Central Texas. Prepared by Richard Cox, owner of the Abilene Emergency Medical Service, and Comedy, the survey will ask for information such as name, type of equipment and training.

Information will be compiled into a form for area hospitals, Nunn explained, so emergency rooms will know what to expect from incoming ambulances.

The types of equipment and staff training of out-of-town emergency services are needed particularly by Hendrick Medical Center and West Texas Medical Center Nunn said, because the Abilene hospitals are transfer pointed from smaller area hospitals.

Composed of 16 members from a 19-county area, the advisory council is a stipulation of an emergency services grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The grant is funneled through the Texas Department of Health, which provides staff services for the advisory council.

The advisory board's next meeting will be at 1 p. m. October 13 in the Old Court-house.

Gorman moved back up the field with a couple of good runs and the help of a 15-yard penalty against the Lions. A recovered fumble on the lions' 23-yard line gave them only temporary relief because two plays later Kelly Greer recovered another Gorman Panther fumble on the Dublin 13.

Dublin was forced to punt following a stiff Gorman defense and a penalty against the Lions. Two plays later, Dixie Bell recovered a Panther fumble on the Gorman 48 to end the quarter 8-0 for Gorman.

The Lions tried to take to the air opening the second quarter. However, Mark Boucher's first pass was long and just off the fingertips of intended receiver Jeff Pate Boucher's second aerial try was picked off by Billy Simpson on the Gorman 43.

The Panthers marched to the Dublin 15 where Darrell Ethridge picked up another Gorman fumble. However, a penalty against Dublin and a Lion quick kick gave the ball back to the Panthers on their own 45.

The Lion defense bore down and four plays later the Panthers were forced to punt to the Dublin 21. Although a few plays later the Lions were also forced to punt, they got a new lease on life when they recovered a fumble on the punt return on Gorman's 37.

The lease was short lived when the Lions couldn't complete two attempted passes and punted the Panther's 15.

Once again, the Lions' defense held until the Panthers gave up the ball on another fumble that was recovered by the Lions.

Inthe closing seconds of the half, three incomplete passes brought up a field goal attempt that turned into a touchdown try when Bou-

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cher, who was holding the ball, rolled off to the right on a run that was good for only four yards.

The teams went to the locker room with a Panther eight, Lions zip halftime score.

The second half got under way with a see-saw battle between the two teams working from the Gorman 43 to the Dublin 34-yard line.

Gorman's second scoring break came late in the third quarter when Dublin picked up a Panther punt on their own 25-yard line. Two plays later, a Lion fumble gave the ball back to Panthers on the Lion 17. Gorman quarterback Steve Keith moved the ball seven yards on a keeper play then handed it off to Blaine Gibbs who cracked off left tackle three times, the last for a three-yard run to pay dirt. Keith's attempt to run off the left guard for a two-point conversion was unsuccessful.

The score was 14-0 with 3:35 remaining in the third quarter.

The remainder of the third quarter and the fourth became primarily a ground battle with a few aerial experiments one which was successful when Billy Simpson connected with his receiver for a 16-yard Gorman gain.

The final score of the game one which will be discussed for some time to come, especially by Dublin fans and players and coaches, came with 43 seconds left in the final quarter.

The ball was on Dublin's eight-yard line, fourth down and 12 yards to go, the Dublin punter, to prevent being trapped in his own end zone by a hard rush from the Panthers, passed out of bounds and was penalized for intentionally grounding the ball. The penalty gave the Panthers a two-point safety and a 16-0 score when the game ended.







**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS  
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977**

**NUMBER ONE  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 18)**

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

**NUMBER TWO  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 13)**

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

**NUMBER THREE  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 3)**

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense: providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

**NUMBER FOUR  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 5)**

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

**NUMBER FIVE  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 19)**

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

**NUMBER SIX  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 49)**

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

**NUMBER SEVEN  
ON THE BALLOT  
(S.J.R. 30)**

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."




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GOOD RUN: Steve Keith is shown here making tracks for a first down.

**PECAN SPRAY TIME**

Adult pecan weevil emergence has been observed through out Eastland County reports DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. That means it's time to spray for the control of the weevil, one of the most damaging pests of pecans.

Gordon said last year many pecan growers lost a large portion of their pecans because of weevil damage.

Chemical control will reduce adult weevil numbers before feeding and egg laying occurs. Once the pecan has been punctured or eggs have been deposited, the nut is destroyed. Proper timing of insecticide applications & retreatment schedules are important in achieving protection of the pecans.

Gordon said about this time each year pecan weevil adults emerge from the soil and move into pecan trees to mate and deposit their eggs. After an egg has been deposited, the larva will develop inside the pecan, cut a hole in the shell about 1/8 inch in diameter and emerge from the pecan as a fully grown larva from late October to December. The little white grubs with red heads or larvae will tunnel into the soil 4 to 12 inches. Much of the pecan weevil's 2 to 3 year life cycle is spent as a larva in the soil. Larvae that enter the soil this fall will emerge in August of 1979 with the exception of about 10 percent of these larvae which will emerge as adults during the fall of 1980.

Early maturing varieties are unusually more susceptible to weevil attack. Feeding of adults weevils causes the nuts in the water stage to drop. Chemical control during the water stage may be required to protect the fruit on the tree. After the kernel begins to reach the dough stage, the nut is susceptible to egg laying. A single female may deposit up to 60 eggs over a month period. Adult weevil populations will vary greatly from year to year but in heavily infested orchards pecan weevil populations will probably be present in most years.

Insecticide applications should be applied to pecans as the pecans reach the dough stage. This can be determined by cutting through a developing pecan kernel. It will contain water or gel or dough depending of its stage of maturity.

Nut protection can be achieved with several applications of Sevin, an application

rate of 2 to 3 pounds of 80 percent Sevin on 3 to 4 pounds of 50 percent Sevin per 100 gallons of spray may be needed to effectively control pecan weevil infestations. There should be an interval of 5 to 12 days between applications. When using any pesticide, read and follow the directions given on the pesticide label carefully and use the insecticide only as directed.
