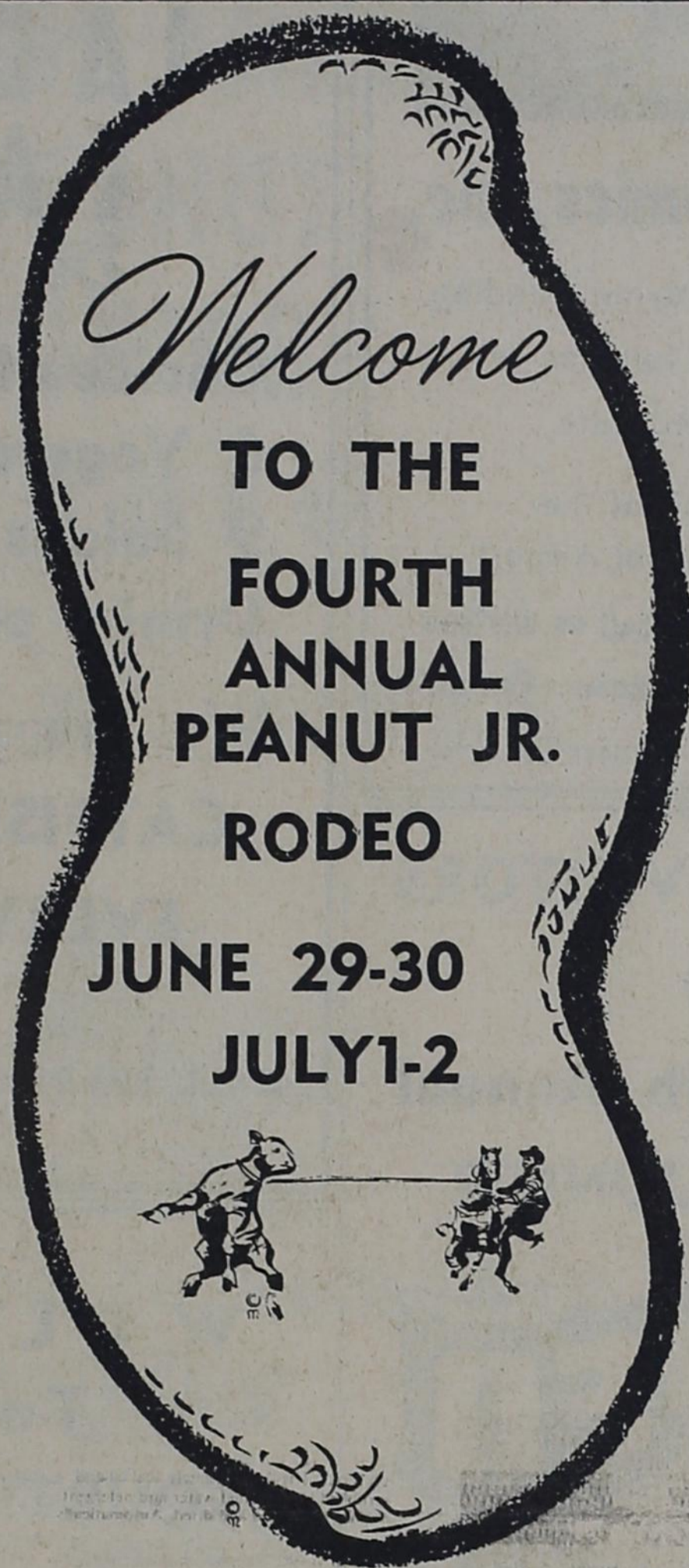
The Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Eastland will officiate. Burial will be in Murray Memorial Cemetery in Carbon.

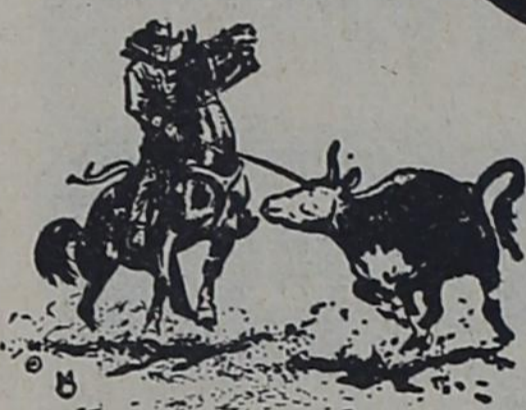

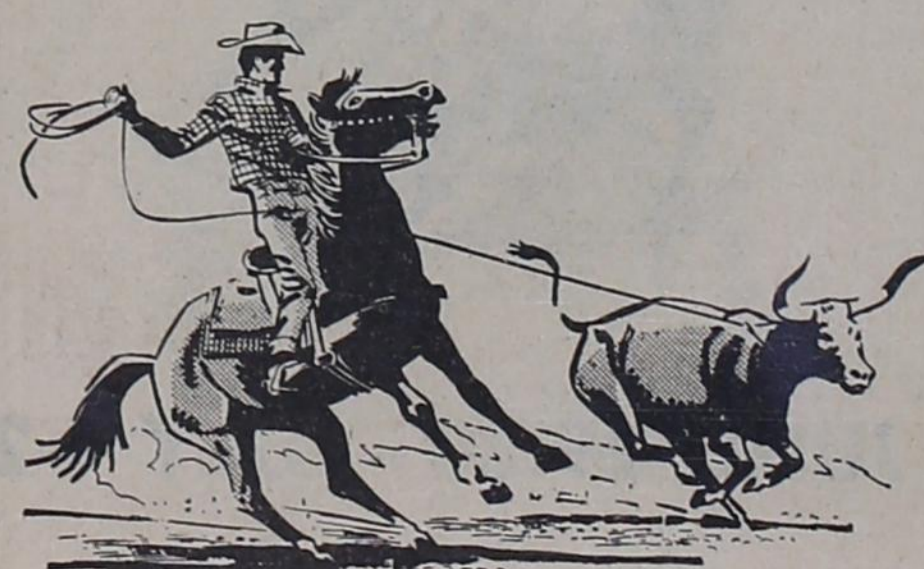

**SPEAK**

"Speak The Same Thing"  
"Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no division among you, but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" - I Cor. 1:10.

Recorded in this verse is Paul's great injunction to the saints at Corinth encouraging

them to be united. In this injunction we recognize the existence of two voices. Found in the expression, "I beseech you," is the voice of entreaty. Found in the expression, "by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ," is the voice of authority. With the joining of these two voices Paul has stressed these points: (1) unity of speech, (2) unity of organization, and (3) unity of mind and judgment.

Paul's first attack was leveled against the speech of the Corinthians. Then, as now, many of our

Lord's disciples had allowed speculative and unscriptural reasonings to come into their minds to the extent that such reasonings were dividing the church. Such a speculative and argumentative spirit has caused many people to accept a human creed or confession rather than God's word. Because the problem of division existed Paul warned "the church of God which is at the Corinth" to "all speak the same thing."

To speak the same thing is to speak only that which is taught by Christ and His Spirit-filled apostles. To speak the same thing is to speak only as the "oracles of God." (I Peter 4:11) The "oracles," to which reference is made in this verse, were divine utterances delivered through the recognized agencies of God Holy men to God "spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit" (II Pet. 1:21)

Too much emphasis cannot be placed on the necessity of unity within the church. Paul stressed unity in many of his epistles. As a brother in Christ, he tenderly

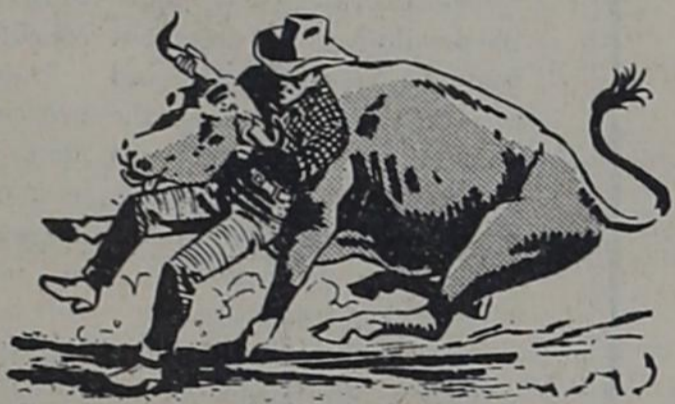

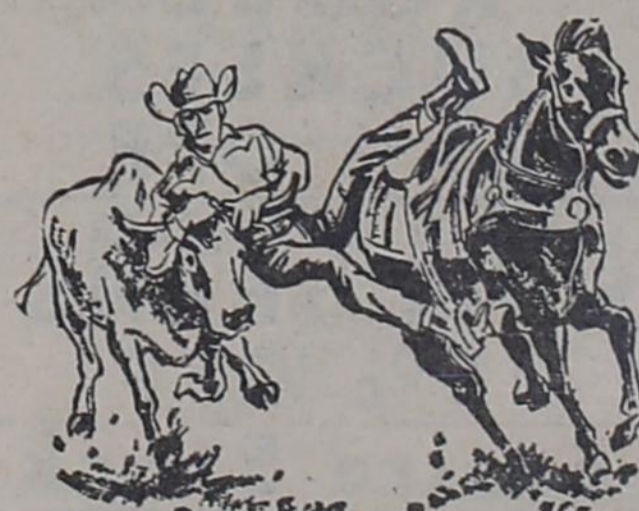

**Are You Eating Yourself to Death?**

Is wrong eating a factor in the physical and mental illness of modern man? Lelord Kordel believes so. For years he has studied the effect on body and mind of varying foods, and is convinced that we can add many years to our lives by revising some of our eating habits.

HERE THEN, is the Lelord Kordel plan for enjoyable eating—and healthy living. Follow these articles for the next 12 installments. They will help you to a livelier, healthier existence.

"DO PEOPLE DIE because they don't eat the right stuff?" I recall asking that question of my mother when I was about nine years old.

"I suppose they do, thousands of them every day, only it is called by some fancy medical name," was her sage reply.

Perhaps that was the day when I resolved to find out what people should eat to grow to maturity in good health and to maintain themselves in vigorous, energetic usefulness throughout middle age and toward the century milestone.

What I learned is not new, for there is really nothing entirely new under the sun. A few wise men in each generation have felt for centuries that mankind was growing less and less vigorous.

In the days of the Roman Empire, the philosopher Seneca realized this sad truth. As tutor and friend of the gluttonous Emperor Nero, no doubt Seneca had occasion to make many an observation which finally led him to declare:

"Man does not die. He kills himself."

And throughout the ages since Seneca, men—and that means women, too—go right on "killing" themselves at the dinner tables, lunch counters and banquet boards of the world.

**HEED THE WARNING!**

We are an ultracivilized na-

tion, composed of persons whose mental powers and accomplishments are adjudged above the average.

Then, why in the name of all that is sensible, don't we heed the warnings which our own public health statistics flash before us every time there is a census; every time we conscript large numbers of our young men for military service?

We are a nation of aches and pains, fatigue and nerves. Thousands upon thousands of our citizens die every day, prematurely. Many of our older men and women are incapacitated in one way or another for years before their death by one or more serious illnesses.

We are far from being a strong, healthy people.

By now, you are probably waiting for me to tell you to invest in a carrot patch and live off the harvest the rest of your life.

You might live a long time by munching carrots throughout the years. But who wants to live a long time if life is going to be as monotonous as a carrot diet?

Even an ant eater enjoys occasional variety in its meals.

**THE FIRST STEP**

However, as a first step toward re-educating you for maximum health and well-being, I shall outline briefly what to me is a prime natural law governing the human body.

Whether you have but a smattering of knowledge about the human frame, or whether you have read every medical book in the library, a good understanding of natural law is absolutely necessary. Then you will treat your body with the respect and consideration it merits.

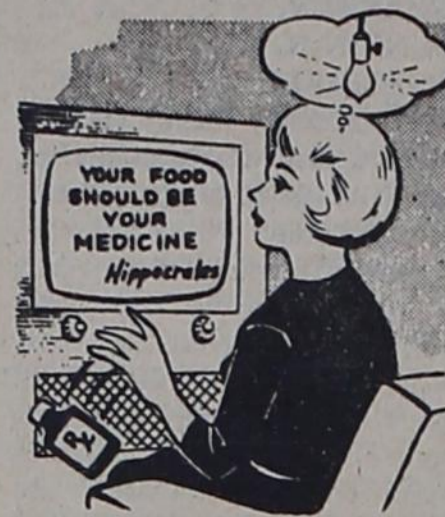

so small that it would take 8,000 of them lined up side by side to reach across one edge of a box one cubic inch in size. To fill that same little cube box would require over 100 million of these cells.

And in the entire human body there are hundreds of billions of cells. That is a lot of anything! To make the matter more complicated, each one of those cells is a separate living unit.

The next time you look in a full-length mirror, try to visualize yourself as the billions of separate lives you actually are instead of as the one life registered on the birth records.

Therefore, the prime natural law is to nourish the cells of your body. What do they require? Among others, three very important nutrients: Minerals, Vitamins, and Protein.



Why, you are probably asking, should I be bothered with such things? An animal does not. It eats what it wants with no thought of maintaining any kind of balance. Or does it? An animal does maintain a

balance in nutrition! Except that it does so by instinct, whereas man, blessed with the "superior" faculty of intelligence, can choose and select his food. What is the result?

**LIFE EXPECTANCY**

The average man today can expect to live to be 68; but some doctors think he should live to 150. The lower animals do much better than man.

According to Dr. Edward L. Bortz: a dog is fullgrown at two years, lives to an average twelve; a cat is full-grown at 1½, lives to ten; a horse, full grown at four, reaches 25.

Reasoned Dr. Bortz: "If a man is physically mature at 25, then he should have an average normal life span of 150 years."

Why does not man live proportionately as long as the dog, the horse, or other animals?

For the simple reason that, given the power to think, he seems to have lost most of his instinctive powers.

When man traded instinct for intellect he made a bad bargain as far as his health was concerned. Instinct would never lead him to over-refined foods, starches, artificial sweets and fried victuals dripping with grease.

Yet his "intellect" does!

Thus it seems that in the matter of nourishing his body and attaining a ripe old age, man fares much worse with his "brain" than an animal does with its instinctive powers.

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**The Consumer Alert**

AUSTIN—Four years have the consumer's complaint passed since the Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer lawsuit, he can only be assessed the amount of the Consumer Protection Division damage, plus attorneys' fees, and private consumers new rather than treble damages. Also, if the merchant gets fraud, deception, and written notice of the complaint misrepresentation in the marketplace. money the consumer was out.

And, from May of 1973 through April of 1977, our office has taken 338 legal actions which have resulted in \$319,879 in civil penalties for the State, and \$2,462,722 in restitution and other economic benefits for defrauded consumers.

In addition, the number of consumer complaints we have received during this period totaled 48,568, and our attorneys have helped Texas consumers recover an additional \$3,615,812 in restitution without going to court.

During the recent legislative session, a bill was passed which strengthens the Act in several ways. Most important of the changes in the Act was one involving private lawsuits by consumers. It would reduce the possibility that a merchant could be taken to court and assessed three times the amount of damage to a consumer without being notified in advance of the consumer's complaint and given a chance to correct it.

Specifically, the changes provide protection for honest merchants in three instances: First, if a merchant has taken reasonable precautions to avoid errors, but still makes an innocent, "bona fide" error, such as a clerical error, he cannot be made to pay treble damages. Instead, he is liable only for the amount the consumer had to pay, plus reasonable attorneys' fees if the consumer had to hire a lawyer.

Second, if a merchant has not received a written notice of

Third, in cases where a consumer is charging breach of warranty, the merchant who can prove he was not given a chance to correct the product's defect or malfunction before a lawsuit was filed cannot be forced to pay treble damages. The intent of all of these changes in the Act is to give the honest, reputable merchant the opportunity to correct a consumer problem before the consumer takes the problem to an attorney. In the past, a few consumers have never even notified a merchant that they were dissatisfied about something before heading for the courthouse.

These changes should help prevent a merchant from being hit with three times the amount of the consumer's damage, plus legal fees, when he would willingly have corrected the problem in the beginning if notified. Yet the revised Act keeps intact the protection Texas consumers have enjoyed for four years against false, misleading, or deceptive actions by unscrupulous merchants. Many people are trying to keep about half the families in America—those living in rural or non-urban areas—from losing one of their few sources of inexpensive entertainment: Television programs.

An attempt is being made to allow pay-cable TV to siphon off the more popular shows now being seen for free.



However, according to the National Grange, "For people residing in rural or non-urban areas cable TV would come late, if ever," and if it did, to watch at home would be costly for viewers.

The American Farm Bureau Federation favors legislation to divest the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of any power to authorize such a system. The Federation urges the FCC to adopt regulations governing community antenna systems to ensure that they do not impair free broadcast services to rural areas.

Many concerned people in rural areas and elsewhere are writing to their Congresspersons and Senators, urging them to follow the Federation's advice.

**Easement Difficulty**

Many of the land title hazards that can threaten your

investment in a home are discernible in a search of public records. When they are disclosed before completion of purchase, it is possible to clear these up in most instances—so your transaction can proceed and be completed normally.

Before purchasing real estate, you will want to consider the facts on selection, financing, closing, and land title protection in your community. It is well worth the

trouble. But there are also hidden pitfalls that for various reasons will not show up in a title search. A problem of this type caused some anxious moments for two California real estate purchasers.

In this situation, the seller

had used an easement across adjoining land to reach the real estate being purchased. The buyers were shocked to learn after closing that the seller had given up the right to use this easement. After the owner of the adjacent land began to object regarding use of the easement, the buyers faced the prospect of being prohibited from access to their real estate.

Troublesome as this situation was, the buyers experienced a happy ending. Through the coverage of owner's title insurance they had obtained before completing purchase, the buyers received assistance from title company experts—who upon investigation discovered another useable easement that was still valid. The buyers enjoyed access to their property once again, and the title company paid the expenses for related work to spare them financial loss.
