LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

Last week it was my privilege to attend the forty-ninth National Institute on Cooperative Education at Texas A&M University. This was a valuable educational experience which I would like to describe briefly for Prgress Readers.

The Institute is held at a different location each year by the American Institute of Cooperation, a Washingtonbased organization whichpromotes cooperation and sponsors educational efforts like the one at A&M last week. At this year's Institute there were some 800 youth scholars (including 200 from Texas and 600 from other states), numerous Young Farmer couples, adultconsultants, co-op employees, AICtrustees, guests, and other persons, making a total of about 2500 participants.

Youth scholars were divided into 30 sections to make group discussions easier and more inclusive. Each section had an adult consultant (in the case of my group, Mr. Carey D.
