School Board Is Reorganized

The Gorman School Board of Trustees met in a called meeting on Monday, April 5 at 7:30 p. m.

The results of the election on Saturday were reported, which showed the following: Mr. Butler 33 votes; Mr. Self 33 votes; and Mr. Reeves, 33 votes; Mr. R. O. Watson, 4 votes; Mr. O. M. Pilgrim, 4 votes; Mr. Don Estes, 3 votes; and Mr. Clydell Lewis, 1 vote. After the three winning candidates took the oath of office, the board elected officers for the next year. All present officers were re-elected for another year. Mr. Self, president; Mr. J. O. Jackson, Jr., vice president; and Mr. Butler, secretary.

Among other business, the board had the Equalization Board meet with them to hear the financial picture for next year. Mr. Garrett presented some figures showing that in order to maintain the educational program at the present level that an additional \$5,000 to \$6,000 would be needed above the amount collected this year. The Equalization Board was instructed to take a look at the entire tax roll and make any adjustments that needed to be made to equalize values.

Another item that was discussed was the poor attendance of students and many students who had just quit school. Mr. Garrett stated that there were eight or more students who were not in school that were still of compulsory age. The law requires a student who is not more than 17 to be in attendance at least 165 days. The law states that a student may be excused for temporary absence because of personal sickness, sickness or death within the family, quarantine, or other conditions that would prevent the student from attending. For such absences, the law says that the student may have them excused only by presenting a written excuse signed by a parent or guardian. Under law, parents are responsible for keeping their children in school.

The person hurt the worse by not attending school is the student, but the can, in turn, hurt many others. The number of teachers is determined by the average number of students who attend each day. This year, due to the number who have just quit or have attended very little, have hurt very much. These students have caused the district to lose one teacher because of average attendance. This will mean that it will cost the district about \$6,300 to keep this teacher, because the salary must be paid from local taxes. Parents need to become more concerned about the importance of keeping their children in school.

County Trustee at Large candidates B. W. Parnell received 20 votes and Dick Hodge polled 17.

The newly-elected trustees will serve a term of three years. Hold-over members on the board include Fred Rogers, Ted Snider, J. O. Jackson, Jr. and Billy Earl Simpson.
