WHEREAS, A native Texan, he was born in Flatwood in 1913 and had lived in Gorman where he was active in the social, commercial, and religious life of the town; and



Carbon OKs sales tax of 1 cent

CARBON - Civic leaders in Carbon were successful Saturday in their bid to increase city revenues, as voters approved a 1-cent city sales tax by a 22-8 margin.

City Clerk Billye Daniel said if the paperwork is in Austin by Sept. 1, the city will be able to start collecting the tax on Jan. 1.

The town of 250, located about nine miles south of Eastland, currently raises about \$7,000 to \$8,000 a year through a 6-cents per \$100 valuation property tax and a franchise tax. Daniel estimates the 1-cent sales tax could generate an additional \$800 a year for Carbon.

Possible uses for the additional revenue include cleaning up empty lots around town.

The Gordon Spot CRISIS LABELS ISSUED

On July 28th, the Texas Department of Agriculture issued crisis labels for two peanut fungicides. The temporary use of "Botran" for Sclerotinia blight and "Tilt" for Southern blight is now permitted in Texas.

The crisis exemption on Tilt is only available to those growers of irrigated peanuts that do not have access to granular application equipment and are, therefore, unable to make use of alternative EPA-registered products for the control of southern blight in peanuts. Tilt can be applied only through overhead sprinkler including center pivot, solid set or portable (wheel move) irrigation systems. The overhead sprinkler irrigation system must contain safety valves or other devices to prevent back-siphoning of product into the source of irrigation water.

Botran may be applied to control sclerotinia blight in peanuts. Applications will be made at the rate of 2 to 4 lbs. of product per acre. A maximum of 2 applications are authorized. Applications may not be made within 30 days of harvest.


