David Barton To Speak At New Hope Bap.

David Barton, author of America: To Pray or Not to Pray, will be speaking at New Hope Baptist Church on Sunday, May 27, in both the 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. services.

David's book documents from governmental agency statistics the negative impact upon American society that has resulted from the 1962 and 1963 Supreme Court decisions effectively removing prayer and Bible reading from the public classrooms. Numerous Congressmen have stated that this book has given the first hard statistical evidence of the detrimental effect of those decisions upon American society.

Since the publishing of his book, David has traveled all over the United States speaking to many church and civic groups and has spent extensive time in our nation's capital meeting with Congressmen, U. S. Senators, and Executive Department staff members pointing out to them the need to return the official acknowledgement of God to public affairs. His efforts have already affected some legislation in these areas.

A second book, "The Myth of Separation," has recently been published. This book shows from original documents of our Founding Fathers how the current concept of separation of church and state was never envisioned nor intended to be in the minds of men like Washington Adams, Madison, Patrick Henry, and the drafters of the Constitution and Declaration of Independence.

David will be sharing the same messages at New Hope that has awakened thousands across our land in his numerous radio and television

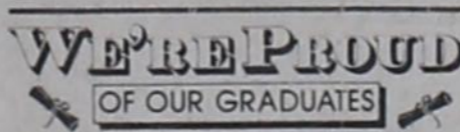

The game was called by the 10 run rule in the fifth inning.

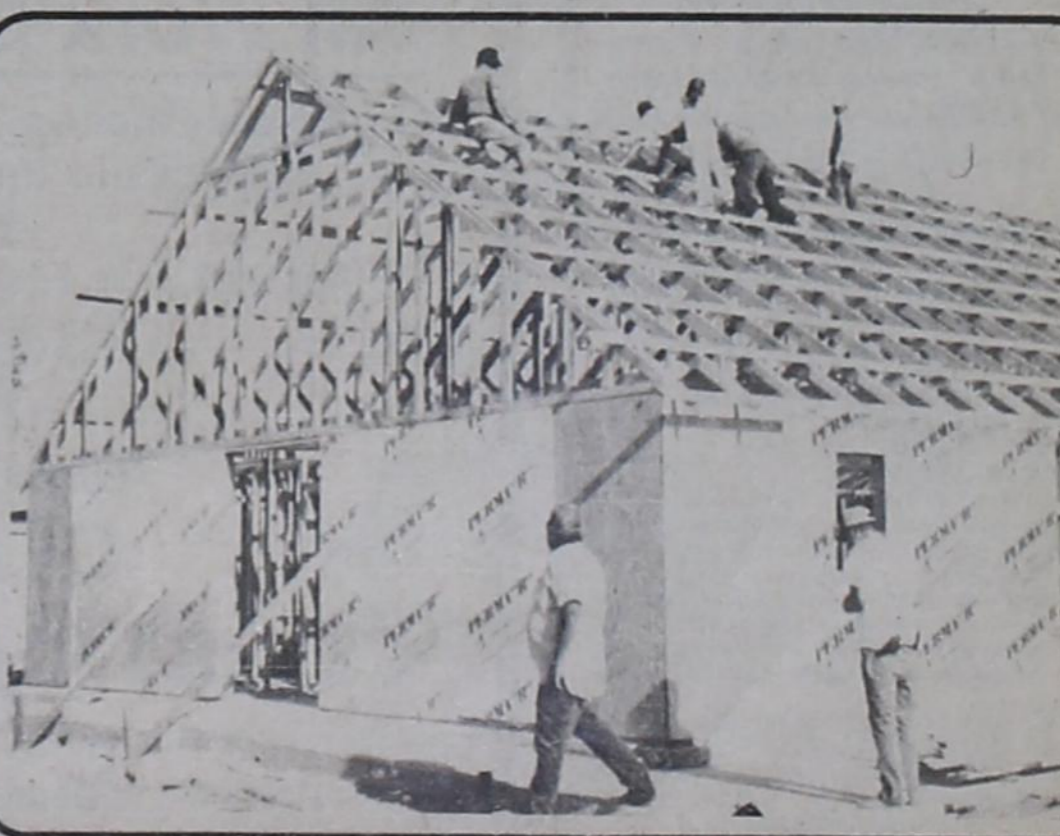
The Panthers will play Bryson on Friday, May 25th at 3 p.m. in Stephenville. Location is undetermined at press time.

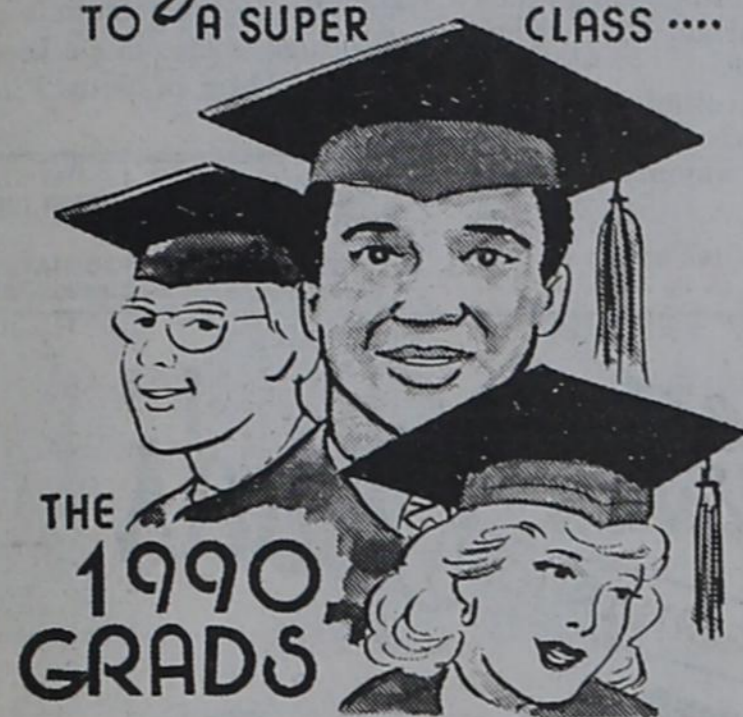

How would you like to "adopt" a Scandinavian student who would join your family next August and stay with you during the school year?

The American Scandinavian Student Exchange is looking for host families for several students who are eager to become members of American families and to attend high school in America.

The students arrive in August, attend local high schools and participate in school activities. In general, they are very outgoing and adaptable to the American way of life. There is no language barrier as all have studied English at least six years.

The host family provides a room, a quiet place to study and meals for the foreign student. Each student is fully insured for medical and liability purposes and has spending money for extra-curricula activities.

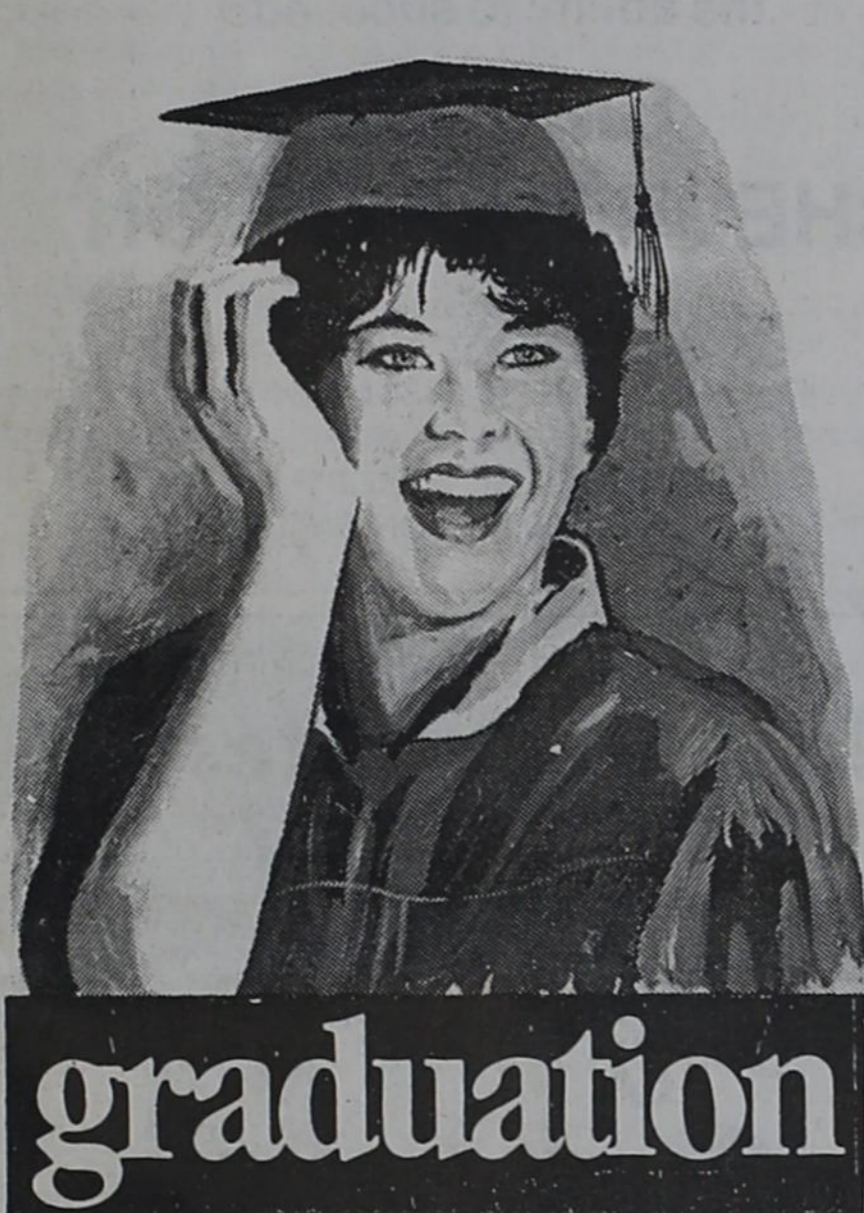

Eastland annexes Carbon ISD

EASTLAND — County Commissioners on Monday approved the Carbon school district's request to be annexed into the Eastland school district.

In a special meeting, commissioners voted 4-0 to back the action taken last week by the Carbon school board.

Before the vote, Dr. Pat Pringle, a monitor with the Texas Education Agency, explained problems found in Carbon's educational system that resulted in his appointment to guide Carbon residents to a solution.

The school board met May 15 and voted 3-2 to rescind action taken April 19 to contract out students in grades 7-12 to Eastland and Gorman schools.

The board then voted 4-1 to annex all grades into the Eastland district. The annexation becomes effective July 1.

Declining enrollment was cited as the reason for contracting out grades 7-12. A further look at enrollment following the election of

New Inspection Council Named For State Inspection Service

May 21, 1990, Harlingen — The new Federal-State Inspection Service of Texas began operation on May 10, 1990. This program replaces the previous Texas Federal Inspection Service which had operated under a cooperative agreement between the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Department of Agriculture. That service was cancelled on May 9 after Commissioner Jim Hightower gave written notice to USDA. The new inspection service is responsible for inspecting fresh fruits, vegetables and nuts for grade, size, and maturity. For some of these products, a federal inspection is mandatory due to federal marketing orders or other regulations. Most products, however, are inspected

whether mandatory or not due to consumer demands for high quality products. Additionally, most fresh produce imported from Mexico is inspected by the service before entry into the U. S. With the change of command the state's agricultural industry insisted that an overnight council be established to monitor the activities of the inspection service. This council will also have the responsibility of establishing operating policy and inspection fees. An onspaction service oversight council has never before existed in the state of Texas. "This council answers industries' criticism that those who use the service never have had the opportunity to monitor the internal operations of the pro-

gram or guard against misappropriation of operating funds," said Jerry Walzel, newly appointed state administrator of the program. The council will consist of a number of citrus, vegetable and peanut representatives proportionate to the volume of inspection work performed. Named as the citrus rep is Dan Seitz, Jr. of Valley Fruit and Vegetable Co. of Pharr, and named as vegetable reps are Robert V. Peterson of Starr Produce Co. of Rio Grande City, Wes Fisher of Barrett-Fisher Co. of Hereford and Dale DeBerry of Progreso Produce Co. of Progreso. The peanut industry is currently in the process of selecting four council reps. The U. S. Department of Agriculture, who is the federal arm of the inspection service, will also be represented on the council by James L. Williams, Federal Supervisor for the USDA Agricultural Marketing Service, Fruit and Vegetable Division. As of May 10, 1990, the Federal-State Inspection Service of Texas is the only agency authorized by law to inspect and issue federal inspection certificates to shippers of fresh produce and nuts. Senator Bill

Simms of San Angelo, Chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Agriculture, stated "I am very confident that this new inspection service operating under a cooperative agreement with the federal government and the Texas Citrus & Vegetable Association will be run more professionally than its ever been before." Currently, the inspection service maintains two district field offices. The fruit and vegetable division office is in Edinburg and is supervised by Gerald Shuttlesworth, who has 30 years of inspection experience. The peanut division office is located in Gorman and is supervised by Billy McDaniel, who has 18 years of inspection experience. The administrative office is located in Harlingen. The Federal-State Inspection Service of Texas will employ up to 200 inspectors during peak harvesting periods and are trained and licensed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Dwayne Biar, president of the statewide Texas Citrus & Vegetable Association, said "Our membership is now extremely confident in the inspection service. Now with the new cooperative agreement creating an oversight council, it will be truly a non-political and a non-profit program. This is going to benefit not

The project, co-sponsored by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board and the Baptist Sunday School Board, is the first venture of its kind with Baptists in the Soviet Union.
