

Most of the talk going around here this week concerns the actions of the city commission and the resignation of Chief of Police Cecil Funderburgh. Funderburgh tendered his resignation and accepted the position of Chief of Police of Eastland on Tuesday, which becomes effective on

November first.

The citizens had let it be known that they wanted 24 hour police protection to continue in the city and the commission had voted to hire another police officer to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Allan Swanner recently. However, they voted to place the police officers on 40 hours weekly, which would leave two days uncovered unless the officers agreed to fill in, without pay, to have 24 hour protection seven days a week. This and the decrease in the salary of Chief Funderburgh, we feel was the deciding factor for Funderburgh to accept the Eastland

position. This city will truly miss the outstanding performance of duty of this man and his devotion to our city. He did many other things, above and beyond the line of duty for our city. And we feel his worth will truly not be known until it can be found out just how many extra things he did for our city.

Our congratulations to Cecil on his new position. And we just hope that the ones filling his shoes and the positions of the other officers can do what he was accomplishing for our

The City Commission has an overwhelming task ahead in solving the problems of our city and they will need all the support we can give them in their quest to keep our city operating within the necessary limits that our tax revenues bring in. Cecil Funderburgh **Accepts Chief's** Post in Eastland

The majority of the citizens of Gorman were saddened on Tuesday when they learned that Chief of Police Cecil Funderburgh had accepted the position as Chief of Police of the City of Eastland and the elimination Friday of the municipal judge's office held by Roy Parker. These men will be greatly missed.

The City Commission, faced with a delimma of cutting expenses to help eliminate the \$130,000 indebted-Coffee, tea and snacks will be ness, have met in several called executive sessions to discuss terms and conditions of employing police officers and city judge in an effort to

The commission met for 21/2 hours behind closed doors Thursday evening on the status of police protection. Following the meeting Mayor C. M. Avery stated that the commission wants to maintain protection with police chief Funderburgh and patrolman Brett Ashley, and that the city had no immediate plans to hire a third policeman to replace patrolman Allan Swanner, who resigned Oct.

At the Thursday meeting an emergency meeting was set for 10:30 a. m. Friday to consider Chief of Police Funderburgh's proposal. His proposal was to cut hourly salaries of his and Ashley's and up the hours of police protection. Also reducing total mileage on the patrol car by 1,000 miles per month, resulting in full savings and a total savings of \$20,000 per year.

At the Thursday meeting the commission voted to stop cgarges ranging from \$1 to \$5.50 a month on businesses for night watchman serv-

Panthers Defeat Wildcats 28-14; **Travel To Santo Friday Night**

The Gorman Panthers wasted little time in showing their strength and power in District 14A as they jumped out to a 14-0 halftime lead in really outplaying the Rising Star Wildcats, but came out in the second half and with a couple of miscues, let the Wildcats tie the score. But following the tying TD by the Wildcats, the Panthers started a comeback and settled down for a convincing 28 to 14 victory.

The Panthers took the opening kickoff and were forced to punt. But thre was indecision on the punt and the Wildcats tackled the punter on the Gorman 44 yard line.

Then six plays later the Big Red Defense got the ball for the Panthers when Stephen Scitern intercepted a Wildcat pass at the Gorman 42. And from there, the Panthers left little doubt that they came to play as Jason Ditmore took the handoff from

ices, since watching the businesses is part of the police responsibilities.

In the Friday commission meeting the council turned down Chief Funderburgh's proposal and set new salaries and hours of the chief and patrolmen.

A motion was made to do away with the City Judge's position and to hire another patrolman to give coverage for 24 hours, but to hold the hours to just 40 hours a week. The motion carried and the meeting was dismissed.

A large broup of citizens have attended the commission meeting supporting 24 hours police protection for the city and supporting the

In the commission meeting held on Tuesday evening, the commissioners voted to place Brett Ashley in the position of Interim Chief of Police at the present time. It was also discussed about the hiring of two more police officers to fill the vacancies. It is hoped that the hiring of new patrolmen can be accomplished in the immediate future.

This was all the action taken at the Tuesday night meeting.

Kevin Hirst, and behind some great blocks from the front wall of the Panthers, broke loose and raced 58 yards for the score with 5:55 left in the period. Hirst added the point after and Gorman led 7-0.

The two clubs exchanged passessions a couple of times, and with 5:08 left on the clock in the first half, Kevin Hirst got the final yard on a keeper to cap a 65 yard, 12 play drive that featured a 20 yard first down run by Stephen Scitern; a pass of 20 yards to Cory Pack for a first down; a 12 yard scamper by Matt Jones; also two more runs of 3 and 6 for first downs on third down plays. Hirst booted the point after and Gorman led 14-0.

During the halftime intermission the Panther Marching Band performed the routine that they were to present at the Band Contests on Saturday at Brady. They did a great job and the crowd really appreciated all the hard work and sweat that the Band put into getting ready for the event. The band was awarded a 2 in the contest. They did not get to advance in the competition, but they have come a long ways and are really to be congratulated on their effort and improvement this year.

Following the halftime activities, the Panthers forgot that the Wildcats were still in the game. The Big Red defense stopped the Wildcats on the first possession after the half and made them punt. Gorman got the ball on their own 15 and moved out to the 42. Then on a pass try, the ball was a little bit high for the offensive man, and Jarrod Horton, a tall secondary player stepped in front of the receiver, went high for the ball, intercepted it and raced for a TD with 6:25 left. Danny Alcorn booted the extra point and the score was

Then after exchanging a possession by each team, the Wildcats got another interception on a bad pass attempt by the Panthers and returned it to the Panther 30. Then on the first play, Jimmy Evans found his received open down the sideline and Brian Bailey caught the pass and raced the 30 yards for the score with 9:22 left. Alcorn kicked the extra point to tie the score 14-14, and just that quick the Wildcats were back even with the Panthers, even though they had only 5 first downs.

However, this score by the Wildcats woke up the Panthers. They took the ball on their own 30 yard line and started a drive that covered the distance in just four plays. On the first play Jason Ditmore ran for 8 yards. On the next snap the Panthers were lenalized 5 yards. Then Kevin Hirst got the first down with a 9 yard run. After a play for no gain, Kevin faked a handoff, broke out to his left and broke open to the outside and raced 51 yards to put the Panthers out front again with 7:49 left in the

game. Hirst booted the point after

and Gorman led 21-14.

After kicking off to the Wildcats, the Big Red defense again took charge as Stephen Scitern again intercepted a pass at the Rising Star 43. From there the Panthers scored in 8 plays to ice the win with 4:24 left in the game. The drive featured an 8 yard run by Stephen Scitern; a 4 yard run for a first down by Ditmore; a 3 yard run for s first down by Stephen Scitern; and a 15 yard run for a first down by Hirst. Then following a 3 yard gain, Jason Ditmore got the final 4 yards for the score. Ditmore ran in for the two pointer and the Panthers stopped the Wildcats the rest of the way for a 28 to 14 victory.

Jason Ditmore led the Panthers with 95 yards on 17 carries. Hirst got 76 yards on 11 keepers. Matt Jones ran for 75 yards on 19 tries. Stephen Scitern had 57 yards on 14 trips. Cory Pack ran twice for 17 yards.

The Big Red defense did a great job of holding the potent wildcat offense and held them to just 88 yards on the ground and just a total of 138 yards. Stephen Scitern did a great job in the secondary, picking off two Wildcat passes at critical times in the game. But the entire defense is to be commended for the outstanding job they did.

This Friday night the Panthers travel to Santo in another District 14A battle with some more Wildcats. The Panthers will need to keep up the good play on defense and improve the passing attack for a victory in this one. And, of course, this is yet another must win game for the Panthers to stay atop the District

Price support loans are available for warehouse stored peanuts and farm stored additional peanuts from harvest time through January 31, 1991. The national support price for 1990 crop peanuts is \$631.47 per ton for average quality quota peanuts and \$149.75 per ton for average quality additional peanuts.

FALL PEANUT QUOTA TRANSFERS

Producers need to be taking precautions now because frost is when the potential for prussic acid poisoning is most dangerous. Do nor graze susceptible plants for two weeks after a non-killing frost. Do nor graze susceptible plants after a killing frost until the plant material is dry, usually in 10 to 14 days. Do not graze at night when frost is likely. Do nor graze susceptible plants which are wilted or with young till-

After a frost susceptible plants cut for hay should be well cured. Wait at least two months before feeding.

There usually are no visible symptoms of prussic acid poisoning. Most of the time only dead animals are found. There is an antidote but it must be administered quickly to be effective.

Winter brings the threat of prussic acid poisoning for livestock but it can be managed for when precautions are taken.






Coach Eddie Pettit said, "we played an excellent game. We were very aggressive and our offense played their best game of the year."
