

Medicare has not kept pace with the rapid changes in our health care system. As our research community pushes the envelope to develop lifesaving medicines and procedures, our nation's health care system must take that innovation into account.

Pharmaceuticals have revolution ized medical care. Increasingly, ailments are treated with medication instead of invasive surgeries and it is imperative that those who rely on Medicare have access to affordable prescription drugs.
