Delbert Vernon Crowley


Delbert Vernon Crowley of Comfort passed away in Kerrville on Wednesday, January 26, 2005 at the age of 80 years.

ORDINANCE #2005-01

AN ORDINANCE CALLING AND ORDERING A SPECIAL ELEC-TION TO BE PARTICIPATED IN BY THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, SETTING AN ELECTION DATE, SAID ELECTION TO BE HELD IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. There is hereby ordered a Special Election to be participated in by the qualified voters of the City of Gorman, Texas, to be held on the first Saturday of May 2005, being the 7th day of May, 2005, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. at the Gorman Community Center 120 South Kent St., for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Gorman the propositions of whether or not the City of Gorman should adopt a 4A Sales and Use Tax.

SECTION 2. The Mayor shall cause notice of the election to be published by posting notice of the election at a public place not later than twenty-one (21) days before the election, and by publishing notice at least once not earlier than the thirtieth (30th) day not later than the tenth (10th) day before election day, in a newspaper published in the City of Gorman, Texas.

SECTION 3. The propositions submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Gorman, Texas shall be placed on paper voting ballots and absentee paper ballots as follows:

PROPOSITION 1. The adoption of a sales and use tax for the promotion and development of new and expanded business enterprises at the rate of 1/2 of one percent. Anedt vil noivel's

SECTION 4. If any section or part of any section or paragraph of this ordinance is declared invalid or unconstitutional for any reason, it shall not invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections or part of a section or paragraph of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption and approval, and it is so ordained.






Taxable or Nontaxable?

Generally, most income you receive is taxable, according to the IRS But there are some areas where certain types of income are partially taxed or not taxed at all. A complete list is available in IRS Publication 525, Taxable and Nontaxable Income.

Some common examples of items not included in your income are:

- Reimbursement for qualifying adoption expenses Child support payments
- Gifts, bequests and inheritances
- Workers' compensation benefits
- Meals and lodging for the convenience of your employer
- Compensatory damages awarded for physical injury or physical sickness
- Welfare benefits
- Cash rebates from a dealer or manufacturer

If you surrender a life insurance policy for cash, you must include in income any proceeds that are more than the cost of the life insurance policy. Life insurance proceeds paid to you because of the death of the insured person are not taxable unless the policy was turned over to you for a price.


