Dear Mr. Baker:
I find the letters from Mrs. Tidwell and Mr. Stokes interesting and informative. I think these letters present a very effective refutation of the diatribe Mr. Clark and Mr. Kyle directed against what they assume to be the future intentions and actions of Mr. Kennedy and the Catholic Church.

I recognize the fact of your fairness, as illustrated by your printing of letters that do not reflect your own political views. (Pardon the break here Mr. Riddell but this paper belongs to the public. It will always be open to constructive criticism and anyone is free to express their opinion as long as their name is signed to the statement. I believe Mr. Truman tried to throttle the press but failed.)

I agree with you that Roosevelt did a fine job for our nation. In fact, he took over the Presidency when the nation was in economic chaos, and was able to build a workable economy in a remarkably short time. And if "we are still paying the fiddler, and it will be for a long time", I believe that a liberal national administration offers the only hope for gradual retirement of the national debt.

Only through increased tax revenue can there be any debt retirement, and tax revenue can be increased only by steady, sustained, economic growth of the nation.

If you think the Truman Administration escaped recession by the occurrence of the Korean Police action, what of the Eisenhower Administration that have produced two recessions while spending more money for war equipment and supplies than the Roosevelt and Truman administration combined, and have achieved a total deficit of approximately eighteen billion?

You say not many firms in small towns can afford to pay 1.25 an hour plus 6 cents tax penalty for unskilled labor."

As a tenant farmer, neither can I. But I feel such wage is fair and just, for the continually rising cost of living demands wage increases, if a working man is to be able to support a family. I feel that if I am unable to pay the minimum wage, I should either do the work myself or let it go undone.

I am quite familiar with the political views of Mr. West. I do not subscribe to any of his outmoded, reactionary ideas of the great "Conservative Utopia", with Republican Bruce Alger as the hero of most of his erudite discourses. I am unfamiliar with "Life Line", but will surely listen to it as you suggest.

If you are curious as to "Why we buy wheat from Russia to feed our soldiers in Europe" I would suggest you check with Mr. Eisenhower, since it must be a part of his foreign policy. At the great personal risk of seeming to support one small Eisenhower policy, I would say that negotiation, and I do not mean appeasement, and some trade of non-strategic materials, would be a more realistic relation with Russia, than the stubborn, and dangerous, impasse Eisenhower and Khrushchev reached at the Summit Conference.

I think the situation developing in West Germany is a very dangerous one. The West Germany economy, fostered by the billions of foreign aid the Eisenhower administration has poured into it, has become the strongest in Europe, far outstripping our traditional Allies. Now the German military leaders are demanding nuclear weapons, and in view of past Eisenhower-Adenauer meetings, will probably get them at the next summit.

As a Roman Catholic I have never been questioned or challenged. But we people who are not supporting Kennedy for president of the United States, due to religious differences, are not doing so because we fear the repetition of undeniable and undisputable history of the Catholic church through the ages. We have first hand information through our missionaries in foreign fields, of their mixing of church and government and persecution of religion and fraternalism at this very hour.

The Pope of Rome is the head of the Roman Catholic Church and not only Kennedy, but every Catholic on earth is religiously in subjection to him. This possibly will be denied by some good people who claim to be protestants, but no Catholic will deny it for himself or in behalf of his church.

I read the press every day and a great many writers seem to think that because the Catholic people fought in the war and Kennedy's brother along with thousands of other soldiers, lost his life that this surely would qualify him for president from a standpoint of religion.

The Democratic party pitted Stephenson against Eisenhower in 1952 and lost. They were persistent enough to try the same man in 1956 and the results were the same. In 1928 they tried a Catholic nominee over the protest of many Democratic leaders and fair thinking people and lost again. There is a great probability that they are headed for the cleaners come November.

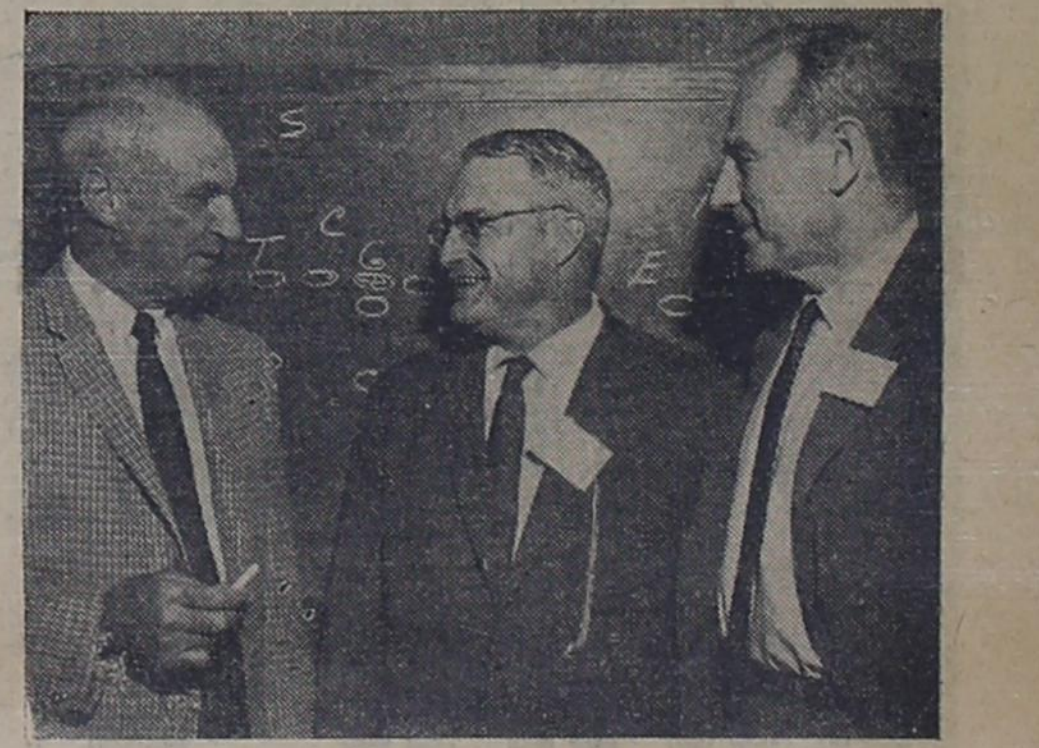

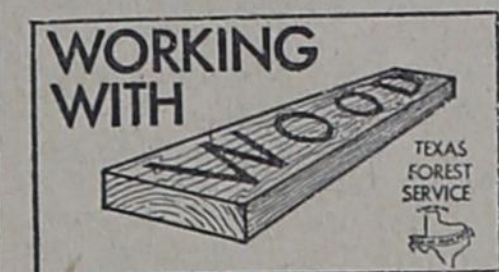
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PAINTING TIPS

The pleasure of newly painted property is sometimes marred by early paint failure. Frequently this is neither the cause of the paint, nor the painter. Several simple rules applicable to the painting on wooden surfaces will usually assure satisfactory results.

1. The proper type and quality of paint should be used for the specific job.

2. Manufacturers instructions relating to preparing the painting surface, mixing the paint, prime coats, and methods of application should be carefully followed.

3. Painting is undesirable during temperatures under 40 degrees or over 90 degrees. A wrinkled surface generally occurs.

4. Repainting should be done before the old paint has worn sufficiently to expose the wood surface.

5. Do not repaint too frequently. The paint film becomes excessively thick and brittle, and cracks and peels easily. A good paint job should give satisfactory service for 4 to 6 years.

6. If paint is applied scantily by brushing on too thin a film or by using excessive paint thinner, the paint will chalk or wear off early.

7. If paint is applied too generously, it will present a wrinkled wavy appearance.

8. The surface to be painted should be smooth and free of dust, dirt, mildew and loose flaky paint.

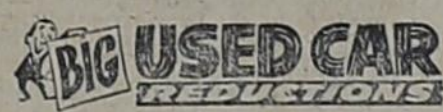
9. Do not paint moist surfaces, nor dry surfaces in damp weather. Dew, frost or other moisture under a paint film causes blistering and eventual peeling.
