The cost of newsprint has jumped to \$450 per ton and the cost of printing the paper has increased accordingly. Also the recent rise in postal prices and the expected cost increase in postage in July has a big affect on the cost increase. We know this increase will be hard on some of the subscribers, but we really have no choice. When our cost get so high we just have to raise our prices to offset the increase. Sorry

folks. The cost of the Progress on the racks will be increased to a level equal to the papers in our area and will be 25 cents per copy beginning July 2 along with the increase in subscriptions.

The good news is that for the time being we are not increasing the advertising rates per column inch. We have raised the advertising rates since we have increased the subscritpion rates. So we are holding the line here as long as we can.

Also we are glad to state that the cost of classifieds and card of thanks will not be raised at this time. So you can see, we had some good news and bad news. -J-



Article 4477-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, "Dumping Solid Waste on Property or into Water" is one of several statutes which may be used in cases of unauthorized dumping. This statute states that any person who dumps or disposes of trash, junk, garbage, refuse, unsightly matter or solid waste on public highways, rights of way, on public or private property, or into any inland or costal water of Texas without the consent of the owner, his agent or public official in charge, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$15.00 nor more than \$200.00 Every law enforcement officer of this State and its subdivisions shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this

Paragraph A-2.5 of the enclosed Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations covers Article 6674v-2, VTCS, "Dumping of Refuse Near Highway", which may also be used. This statute states that no municipal corporation, private corporation, firm or person shall dump, deposit or leave any refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on or within 300 yards of any highway in the State.

As indicated in paragraph H-1.1, it is the policy of the Department to encourage local enforcement where effective, however, the Department will initiate enforcement action when local efforts have not caused compliance within a reasonable period of time. Paragraph H-1.2 of this Department's regulation covers Section 8 of the "Solid Waste Disposal Act" which could also be used if necessary. This act states that no person may cause, suffer, allow or permit the storage, handling, or disposal of solid waste, or the use or operation of a disposal site in violation of this Act or the rules, regulations, or orders of the Department. The penalty for offenders convicted of violating this Act is not less than \$50.00 or more than \$1000.00 for each act or violation and for each day of violation. The use of this Act would be of a civil nature and could require that this Department be a party to


