DUBLIN 13, GORMAN 6

Last Friday afternoon the Dublin High School football team arrived in Gorman for a game with the local team, and after a strenuous afternoon play, took them into camp for the count of 13 to 6. The teams were evenly matched and played a fine brand of football for the class of schools they represented in the game. The Gorman boys' showing was very creditable for their first game, as the most of them entered the game without experience and some few without having ever seen a game.

Gorman chose to defend the south goal and Dublin kicked to them. Gorman ran the ball back for a gain of over half the distance to their goal and then in a series of sweeping and runs and a terrific line smash by Odie Kinney carried it over for a score in less than four minutes of play. They failed to kick goal and their score was six even. On the next kick off it looked like they were bound for another touchdown but weakened at the last moment and were forced to kick.

In the second quarter Dublin came back strong and put over a touchdown and then kicked goal. They repeated the touchdown in the third quarter and missed the goal by inches. This ended the scoring for the game and gave the Dublin boys the game. The fourth quarter was a series of sweeping and runs for each team with Gorman having two good chances to score. In one of them the runner was forced out of bounds and in the other he slipped with a clear field and was tackled before he could arise.

The game was a very creditable showing for the Gorman boys and was worth months of coaching for them. They learned a lot about the game and are now ready to tackle some other team.

The high stars for Gorman were Eppler halfback, Kinney at full and Dabney at end. They were in every play and did good work both on offensive and defensive.

The quarter back for the Dublin team was the best player they had and was the brains of the team. He is always dangerous and is really a class little player.

Gorman will give them a return game in a few weeks, and will no doubt make them forget their exultation over this game in the oodles of gloom that will be theirs when the game is over.

The high school football team tied up with a bunch of old players from the town Tuesday afternoon and had a real scrimmage for about an hour. The town boys were short of wind, but by their superior knowledge and the extra weight they carried they put a victory of twenty to fourteen over on the lads from school. The team is showing marked improvement and is coming along fast. They are learning a lot of the tricks of the game and are improving rapidly. A few more games this season and they will have the making of a real team for the coming year. They go to Eastland Saturday for a game with the county seat high school.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETING

Last Friday Evening the agricultural representative of the Katy system was in Gorman and was scheduled for an address before the Chamber of Commerce. Only a few were present, but his visit did a lot of good, and showed us a way out of the agriculture difficulties of this country. He was scheduled for an address on a potato curing plant and gave us all the information that is wanted to show the citizens of Gorman what is needed.

It seems from what he told us that that houses to properly care for the potatoes can be built under certain plan with a capacity of ten thousand bushels for the sum of \$2500 and can be a success. The potatoes are put thru a drying process and are almost doubled in value at once. They can then be kept and then be marketed as the demand grows for them later in the year. The potatoes will keep indefinitely if they are properly treated and then kept at a temperature of fifty-five degrees. The farmers who were present were enthusiastic over the plan, and believe that enough acreage can be secured to justify a plant.

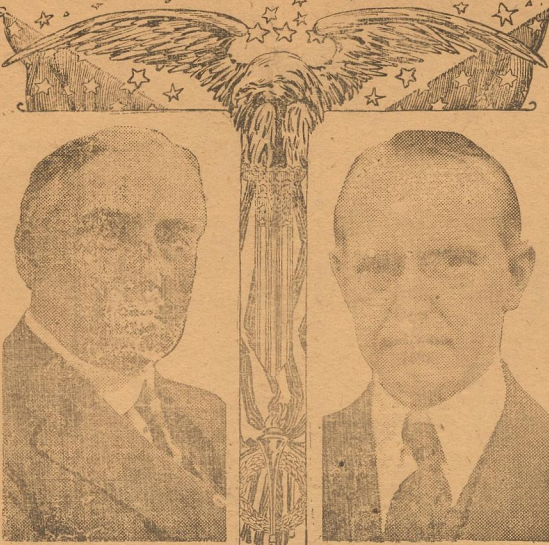
This is the way out from cotton and peanuts, and will give the farmer a good money crop. Progress would like to hear from a lot of the farmers readers on the subject.

Proclamation By Governor Hobby

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

The great humanitarian drive for the Department of Texas, the American Legion, and the Benevolent War Risk Society is reaching its climax. If the Kerrville hospital for tuberculous ex-service men, hundreds of whom are now living about the State without the skilled care and attention, which they need, is to be finished and made ready for these sick fellow Texans of ours, we must meet the issue right now.

In order to complete this splendid institution, which is to be known as the American Legion Memorial Hospital, we must raise \$350,000.00 by November 11th. On that date, when we shall unite to commemorate the great victory which was ours on that date two years ago, this fight shall come to a close.

The efforts of these public spirited citizens who are leading this fine clean fight for such a worthy cause, call for the admiration of every right-thinking citizen of our great State. The Department of Texas American Legion and the Benevolent War Risk Society workers should receive the full and unqualified support of every man and woman in the state.

At the request of the Department of Texas, American Legion and the Benevolent War Risk Society of Texas, I do hereby proclaim November 6, 1920, as American Legion Memorial Tubercular Hospital Tag Day, and urge upon all the observance of this day, the success of which will insure the completion of one of the finest projects placed before the generous people of Texas.

AMERICAN LEGION

The Alvin Mauney Post No. 15, American Legion, held a joint meeting with the Woman's Auxiliary in the Post rooms, and a very enjoyable as well as profitable evening was spent. The refreshments were extraordinarily tasteful, and the boys all voted that the ladies have the unanimous vote of thanks.

Many important matters were taken up and discussed. The Public Library which is being established in Gorman is well under way, and it is hoped will soon be open to the public. The ladies Excelsior Club, and the Woman's Auxiliary, through their co-operation, are making the realization of this undertaking possible, by agreeing to keep the library open two hours each day on three days per week. Several of Gorman's citizens have volunteered to lend books to the library so as to increase the number of books available to the public. The American Legion and the two ladies' organizations, the Woman's Auxiliary and the Excelsior Club, will gratefully appreciate you lending the library as many books as you can.

Every effort will be made to take the best of care of all books loaned. You may make your tender of books for the library to Mrs. J. F. Hankins, Miss Ida Chaney, J. W. Cockrill or H. B. Martin. Let us have what you can spare, one or several books, and we will gratefully appreciate your help in making our library a great institution for our people.

Mrs. Philip Pettitt, the head of the Red Cross in Eastland county, met with us, and her talk to the Post was most interesting and encouraging, as well as highly instructive. She highly commended the American Legion to every ex-service man, saying that it was one of the greatest organizations in the country, and every man eligible should make haste to join in, actively, in the carrying out of the high ideals and the great work which the Legion stood for and was undertaking. She also expressed the hope that the Legion with its high ideals and standards maintained, would become the biggest political organization in the country, but not a partisan organization. Mrs. Pettitt told us some thing of her work as the head of the Red Cross in this county, and among other things said she had handled about 2,800 cases of different kinds, some of them heart rending in their tragedies, for the ex-service men, the men who offered up their lives for their country, and this number since January 1, 1920. She very highly commended the work being carried on by the American Legion for the completion of the Kerrville hospital for those of our ex-service men who are suffering from the Great White Plague, and said if the people of this town and county only knew a small part of the pitiful conditions of these men who did their bit "over there" that we would have no trouble in our Tag Day drive next Saturday, but that we would be swamped with willing money to help properly care for these men. In Eastland County alone, there are Eastland County etao shrdl taoi shrdl 186 tubercular ex-service men receiving care as best can be given them, and two cases in your own City of Gorman. Mrs. Pettitt also enthusiastically gave the Legion the promise of her support (and in this Mr. Cockrill, head of the Red Cross in Gorman, heartily co-operates) in their plans for combining in their hall the public library, the ladies rest room, the Red Cross health center to be established in Gorman.

The Legion and the Auxiliary voted Mrs. Pettitt an expression of thanks for her co-operation, and a promise to give her and the Red Cross all the assistance possible in their activities and undertakings in this community and vicinity. An invitation was tendered, and accepted by Mrs. Pettitt to attend our joint meetings the first Wednesday in each month.

The Red Cross will start their drive for their 1921 membership and funds, on November 11, Armistice Day, and we of the Legion hope to see Gorman go over the top on that day and render assistance to the Great Red Cross in its wonderful work in this community in particular, and the country at large.

The arrangements for the celebration of Armistice Day by the Legion boys and girls are going ahead nicely and a great time is promised everybody. Be sure and come, and bring the children and stay all day, and help us commemorate the greatest day in our recent history.

BIG ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION FOR GORMAN

The recent proclamation by Governor Hobby, officially setting apart Thursday, Nov. 11 for the observation of Armistice Day by the citizens of Texas, clears the way for the attractive and comprehensive celebration planned this year for the city of Gorman. As is appropriate, the exercises are to be held under the auspices of the Alvin Mauney Post, American Legion, and the active co-operation of all civic agencies and organizations is pledged and assured. Not only will the solemn import of the day be revived and emphasized, but a unique opportunity will be afforded for an enjoyable and wholesome community "get-together". The program will appeal to everyone, and everyone is due for a good time.

In conjunction with the plans of every other Texas city, the following form of recognition of the hour Eleven A. M. will be observed. At one minute before the hour, the bugle call "attention" will be sounded from the center of the town. All business is requested to suspend for a period of one minute, all persons and vehicles to stop, and remain silent for that brief period. All ex-service men will uncover and face West, in memory of the buddies "Went West" for God and Country.

In the afternoon, an outing will be given at the Gorman ball park. Every thing is free, and everyone is invited. The Chamber of Commerce Band will be on hand to furnish music. A distinguished speaker will be there to make a brief address. A competitive track meet will follow, prizes for the various events being offered by business houses and citizens. The program will include a 100 yard dash for boys, same for girls; potato race, three-legged race, tug-of-war, and others.

Following these events, a football game will be played.

The school students are now engaged in a prize essay contest, on the subject of "The Significance of Armistice Day". The winners will be judged under the direction of the Excelsior Club, and the winning essay will be printed in the special Armistice Day edition of the Progress. A declamation contest for students will be held at night at the National Theatre, at which time prizes for the athletic events will also be awarded.

At night, the Legion Post and Ladies' Auxiliary will present "You Tell 'Em", an original production, cast entirely by home talent. Advance information indicates that this show will be the most elaborate and successful offering ever seen in this vicinity. The offering will be included minstrel, musical, comedy, and spectacular features. No efforts or expense are being spared to insure a memorable production.
