Both teams had an outstanding final inning with the Lady Wolves scoring 9 runs leaving the Rebels trailing 17-10 going into the bottom of the





Credit By Exam **Test Dates Set** In June and July

Credit by Exam for Acceleration will be administered by Gorman ISD on June 26, 27, and 30. Other days of testing are set for July 1,2, and 3. Parents are to register for the June and July administration by Monday, April 28. Parents of elementary students should contact Betty Morris, principal and parents of junior high and school students should contact Linda Glover.


Credit by Exam for Acceleration is a testing program that allows students to accelerate their pace in school by permitting students who have had no prior formal instruction in a course or grade to skip the course or grade. Elementary students must take test in language arts, math, science and social studies at the grade level they are attempting to skip. They must score ninety percent on each of the four tests in order to advance to the next grade. Junior high and high school students must take the test on a semester basis for each class. They too must score 90 percent on each of the tests. Testing must be requested in advance in order for the district to have the tests and must be administered on the announced testing dates.

Pre-Kindergarten Registration


Registration for Pre-Kindergarten students will be held Wednesday, May 14, during school hours on the Elementary Library.


VANDALISM REPORTED HERE ON SATURDAY

According to a statement from local law enforcement officers there was a large amount of vandalism reported in Gorman in the early hours of Saturday morning.


The major damage by the vandals occurred at the Brandon Place apartments in the southwest part of town.

Hilda Florence Kellerman, 74, of Gorman, died Sunday, May 4 at an Abilene hospital.


Services were held Tuesday, May 6, in the Gorman Cemetery with Craig Rhoton officiating.



Property Tax Protests and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property

- the local governments which should be taxing your property

- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Contact the appraisal district staff at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas or a informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of protest form from the appraisal district office

appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised valued was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.



Review of the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of it's order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become deliquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on a evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.





Government Regulation **Reaches New Levels of Ludicrous**

olfers beware. The federal government has its eye on your game. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is proposing new safety rules for golf carts that would require each to be equipped with seat belts, headlights and tail lights, turn signals, stop signals, reflectors, mirrors, windshields and parking brakes. This will add about \$1,000 to the cost of an average golf cart — a 25 percent increase.

Is there such vehicular mayhem on the links that a concerted government effort is needed to save lives? I suspect not.

This is just one example of how our regulatory efforts lack common sense — and a sense of proportion. Not only is every last detail of our lives being micromanged by regulators in an effort to eliminate all risk from existence, but the cost of regulation to our society now totals \$650 billion. Federal regulations now fill more than 200 volumes totaling in excess of 131,000 pages.

Congress has made some progress toward curtailing this propensity to over-regulate. In 1995 we enacted the unfunded mandates bill, which requires cost assessments for regulatory requirements expected to cost state and local governments \$50 million or more annually, and the private sector \$200 million or more annually. Last year Congress enacted a law allowing congressional review of proposed new regulations.

But that was only a start. Much remains to be done to bring the regulatory monster to heel. To carry out the intent of the Congressional Review Act, I have proposed that Congress establish a joint task force for ongoing review of all new agency regulations. We need to lower that \$200 million threshold for unfunded mandates on the private sector. And we must reduce the funding Congress allocates to regulatory agencies. Regulatory reform is a matter of jobs and livelihoods. It also is a matter of privacy and personal freedom. The enforcement of regulations is turning hundreds of thousands of hard-working Americans - such as plumbers who install outlaw toilets that will flush the first time - into common criminals. Businesses large and small have been harassed, municipalities nearly bankrupted, workers thrown out of jobs and consumers forced to pay an estimated \$130 billion annually for the privilege of being regulated. Max Weber, the great German sociologist, defined what must be changed when he wrote, "In a modern state, the actual ruler is necessarily and unavoidably the bureaucracy, since power is exercised neither through parliamentary speeches nor monarchial enunciations, but through the routines of administration." In the United States at the end of the 20th century, those routines need to be interrupted.
