Gorman scored on their second possession after failing to move on the first




# ...And Kourtney Makes Three!

The drive featured a 35 yard scamper by Sanchez, and a 12 yard run



Then the lone score by the Hornets came with just 25 seconds left in the game when Lometa picked up a Panther fumble at the Lometa 37. 
