

tax in 1938 elections. In other and one room enlarged. words, a person is assessed a poll tax on January 1, 1937, and he pays and gets a receipt the latter part of 1937 or the first part of 1938, before Jan. 31.

If a person becomes 21 subsequent to January 1, 1937, and prior to February 1, 1938, he must secure prior to February 1, a poll tax exemption cetificate, but those who reach 21 subsequent to January 31 of this year and prior to the date of the election are not required to secure such a certifi-

A person reaching the age of 60 before January 1, 1937, may vote in an election without first obtaining an exemption certificate because this is a county without a city over 10,000 population.

A person must have resided in the state one year and the county six months to vote. This is preceding any special, primary or general election.


