Unless you have lived in Gorman or this area for over fifteen years the names Dr. George and Dr. Edd will not have much meaning to you except in hearing their names mentioned in a conversation. Of course, you know of Blackwell Hospital and Dr. Rodgers.

Dr. George Blackwell laid the foundation for Blackwell Hospital and was later joined by his brother, Dr. Edward Blackwell. From the day Dr. George and Dr. Edd began practicing in Gorman their ability as doctors spread from one town to the next. Many have told Kernel Gene that the doctors first thought was to cure their patients and would never let them discuss money problems while they were sick. During the Twenties many were given work when they asked for it so their doctor bills could be paid. . . . otherwise many of these bills were never collected.

When Dr. George and Dr. Edd died, Dr. Rodgers continued their work and has dedicated his life to caring for the people of this area.

While hospitals in other towns were seeking assistance to keep their doors open, Blackwell Hospital (to the best of my knowledge) has never one time asked for financial aid of any kind. On the other hand, Blackwell Hospital has been generous in taking part in every project sponsored by clubs, churches and other organizations in Gorman and area.

Kernel Gene believes the time has come when the load is just too heavy for Dr. Rodgers to bear. What with Federal and State regulations and cost of operations he is forced to look to the citizens of Gorman and this area for assistance. Not for himself, personally, but that we may have a hospital.

We erect memorials, large and small, for everything - why not join together to erect a hospital in memory of Dr. George and Dr. Edd Blackwell, and one that will show Dr. D. V. Rodgers that we appreciate what the Doctors have done for our community.

## Peanut Growers To Vote By Mail On Marketing Quotas

"Peanut growers for the first time will vote by mail in the marketing quota referendum for the 1969, 1970, and 1971 crops," R. G. Lyerla, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Eastland County Committee said today. The referendum will be held December 2-6, 1968. Ballots should be returned to the ASCS county office - by mail or in person - during the period December 2-6.

According to the Chairman, a grower will be eligible to vote in the referendum if he is entitled to share in the 1963 crop peanuts on a farm on which the acreage produced for nuts exceeds 1 acre. A landlord of a standard rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenant is not eligible to vote.

"Beginning with the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1949 crop, growers have approved quotas for each year's peanut crop," the Chairman stated. "In the vote in November, 1965, for quotas on the 1966, 1967, and 1968 crops, 97.5 percent of the 36,415 growers voting approved the quotas. We are hopeful that the balloting by mail will increase the number of growers voting."

The Chairman explained that the program to be voted on is essentially the same as the one now in operation. When marketing quotas are in effect, price-support loans are available at not less than 75 percent of parity as of August 1 - the beginning of the marketing year. Under quotas, too, marketing penalties apply to "excess" peanuts of growers who exceed their acreage allotments.

If more than one-third of the growers voting oppose the quotas the loans available to growers who plant within their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity, and no quotas or penalties will apply to the 1969 peanut crop. In such a case, another referendum would be held next year on quotas for the following three crops peanuts.

These are the same dates as for cotton referendum," the Chairman said, "and those producers who have both peanut and cotton allotments will get ballots for voting in each of the referendums." Producers are reminded to be sure to place ballots in the proper envelopes when returning them to the ASCS county office.

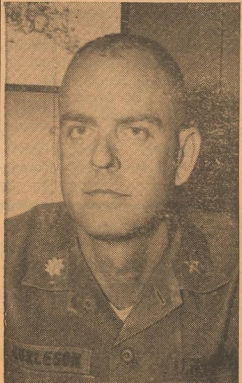

## LT. COL. BOBBY R. BURLESON NAMED NEW DEPUTY CHIEF OF STAFF AT FORT GORDON

Lt. Col. Bobby R. Burleson has been named the new deputy chief of staff at Fort Gordon.

Before assuming his present position, Burleson, who has been at Ft. Gordon since August, 1967, was S-3 (training) officer for the 1st. Bde., G-3 (plans and training) officer, and special assistant to the chief of staff.

He succeeds Lt. Col. J. T. Raley, who begins a second tour in Vietnam Nov. 15 as secretary of the general staff of Headquarters, II Field Force at Long Binh.

A 37-year-old artillery officer, Burleson spent a year in Vietnam before coming to Ft. Gordon, serving as III Corps artillery advisor and later as III Corps assistant sector advisor.

Burleson spent a year in Germany as an enlisted man before attending artillery officer candidate school at Ft. Sill, Okla. in 1953.

Later that year he served in Japan with the Army Forces, Far East as a battalion reconnaissance and survey officer and battalion S-2 (intelligence) officer.

Burleson includes among his military education courses at Ft. Sill in the Artillery and Guided Missile School in 1957 and the Artillery and Missile School in 1963. In 1966 he attended both the Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan. and the Special Warfare School at Ft. Bragg, N. C.

Burleson had a second tour in Germany from 1959 to 1962 when he served with the 4th Howitzer Bn., 18th Artillery.

A native of De Leon, Texas, Burleson lists Desdemona, Texas as his home town. He lives on the Ft. Gordon reservation with his wife, Florine, and their son, Jerrell, 15.

But the Panthers were not to be denied this game as they came storming right back and moved 65 yards in 11 plays with Sharp grabbing a fine aerial for 12 yards for the TD. Shipman ran for the 2 points.

The Panthers added three more touchdowns in the final period to break the game open. Duran scored from 2 yards out and Scitern added the 2 points. Scitern rambled for another tally from 7 yards out and the try for points failed. The final score was on a beautiful catch by Leslie Sharp on a high pass for 23 yards with 12 second left in the game. The points try failed leaving the final score 54 to 28.

The Panthers should field a good football team next season as they have gained a lot of needed experience this season in a building year. Their season record was 2-9 and we hope they can reverse this record next season. Until then, its goodbye pigskin!

**Pfizer Pharmaceutical Corporation Awards \$1,200 Agric. Grant To TSC**

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON BLINDNESS

How many blind persons are there in the United States? According to the National Eye Research Foundation and the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, there are approximately one million blind persons in our country.

Can some types of blindness be prevented? I would estimate that one-half of our yearly blind total could be prevented with frequent eye examinations.

How many people become blind each year? About 30,000 every twelve months.

What is the greatest cause of blindness? Cataracts are the main reason, and this disease is followed in cause by glaucoma.

At what age is blindness most likely to occur? Most blindness occurs after the age of 65 and the chief cause is cataracts. It is estimated that 1200 out of every 100,000 Americans over 65 are blind; approximately 300 per 100,000 between the ages of 40 and 64 are blind. The figure drops to less than 100 per 100,000 at younger ages.

Can vision be restored? Once vision is gone, it can never be restored. The time to take care of our sight is while we have it. You can help to prevent blindness by frequent eye examinations.

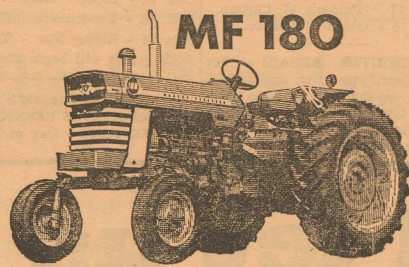

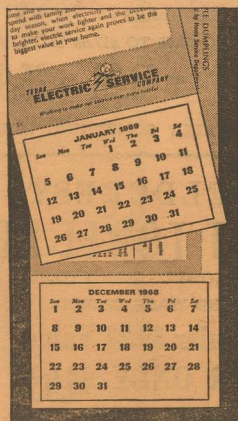
