PEANUT PATTIE

- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 lb. raw peanuts
- 1/4 tsp. red food coloring
- 1/2 stick butter
- Pinch of salt

Bring sugar, water and syrup to boil. Add peanuts and coloring. Cook until hard ball stage. Remove from heat, add butter and salt. Beat until mixture is too thick to beat, pour onto greased cookie sheet. Break into pieces when cool. Yields 24 servings.

Christmas Lighting Contest Rules Set

The Gorman Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the Residential Christmas Lighting contest, urges everyone to get their entries in as soon as possible.

Keep in mind that you do not have to have an elaborate display to win. Its what you do with what you have that wins. The following is a guide in awarding points in the named categories.

Artistic Merit - up to 30 pts. — Design; composition and arrangement of elements; and the color scheme.

LIGHTING TECHNIQUES - up to 30 points — Use of regular Christmas lights; use of spot and flood lights; use of other lights such as fluorescent, reflector color lights, etc.

ORIGINALITY - up to 20 pts. — New lighting ideas or effects; new ways of using standard devices such as candles, wreaths, luminous plaques, etc.

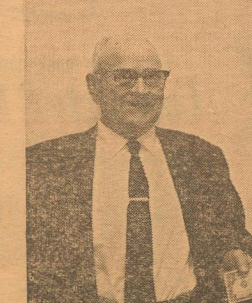
INGENUITY - up to 20 pts. — In using structure of house; in using surroundings to advantage. Using this guide, the maximum number of points attainable for one display is 100.

Deadline for entering the contest is 5:00 p. m. December 20. Judging will take place on this date. Entry blanks may be picked up at the Texas Electric Office, Chamber of Commerce office, and the Gorman Progress. Lighting suggestion booklets are also available at these offices.

First prize will be a Reddy Light given by the Texas Electric Service Company. Second prize will be \$15.00, and third place winner will receive \$10.00.

For each pint of blood donated, a pint can be withdrawn from the bank. A certificate will be issued for each pint of blood given when the mobil unit comes to Gorman on Saturday, December 14, and anyone in the area in need of blood can withdraw blood from the bank in Abilene. Heretofore blood donors have had to go to Fort Worth to replace blood used by local people and have had to give two for one. With the new blood bank, one pint will be issued for each pint donated.

The mobil unit will be set up in the Progress Library from 9 a. m. to noon. Blood will not be taken from persons who have eaten lunch.
