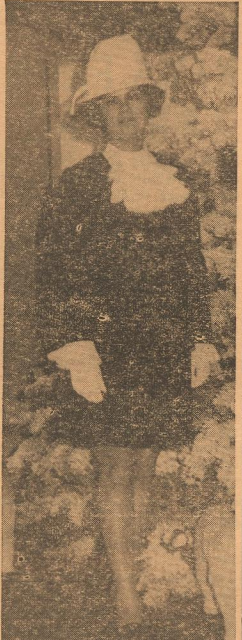
Brenda Browder And Celia Reeves Had Entries In "Make It With Wool Event"
