Thereasa and I attended the Texas Press Association meet in Dallas last week. I heard such men as Dr. Umphrey Lee, President of S. M. U.; Governor Allan Shivers, Attorney General Price Daniels, W. E. Debnam, author and news commentator of Raleigh North Carolina and C. W. Hudson, assistant to the personnel director of the Dallas Railway and Terminal Company.

Dr. Lee told of the probability of a movement sweeping this country which would be detrimental to the nation as a whole. He said it would not necessarily be a movement of "ism" but under the tenets of present day living people are easily excited and sometimes join movements without serious thought.

Governor Shivers, who is also an experienced newspaper publisher, spoke of the responsibility of the press and its duty to the public.

Attorney General Price Daniels challenged the powers that be who have robbed the people of Texas and especially the school children of this great state by taking the Tidelands.

W. E. Debnam said he was getting tired of our northern neighbors looking down their nose at us and thought it was time that we let them know just where we stand and what the South has. He has written a book in reply to Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt's condemnation of the South. Written in a light vein the book calls Mrs. Roosevelt's attention to a few facts which are far worse in the north and especially around Washington than anything she refers to in the South.

With other members of the Press we had the pleasure of meeting General MacArthur and his wife and son. I was impressed with the friendly way they greeted each one that shook hands with them. In short, they are "Just Folks" and vitally concerned over the future of our nation.

Mr. Hudson gave an inspiring talk on Americanism. A dynamic speaker with a sense of humor, he readily accepted an invitation to speak in Gorman. I hope to be able to arrange his visit in the near future as I believe the people of this area will enjoy and benefit from the message he delivers.

Lt. Robert Kirk, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Kirk of Route 1, Gorman, Texas, and husband of the former Miss Carrol Ann Pegeler of 1286 Devonshire Dr., San Diego, Calif., was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Science in Engineering Electronics at commencement exercises of the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School, Annapolis, Md., June 16th.

Under Secretary of the Navy, the Honorable Dan Kimball, was the principal speaker at the graduation ceremonies.

Lt. Kirk will return to duty as a student officer at University of California, Los Angeles.

He attended Tarleton State College, Stephenville, Texas, in 1940 and attended U. S. Naval Academy.

Formal recognition of the place occupied by the School in post-graduate education was accorded by Congress in 1945 when it authorized the School to confer on its students bachelor's, master's and doctor's degrees. It is the only service institution able to grant the latter two.

The Naval Postgraduate School as presently constituted consists of three relatively independent divisions: The Engineering and Scientific Division at Annapolis, Md.; the General Line Schools at Newport, R. I., and Monterey, Calif., and the Naval Intelligence School at Anacostia, D. C. Present plans call for all to move to Monterey in the near future.

A native of Eastland Brogdon graduated from Eastland High and later received his degree from McMurry in Abilene. He came to Gorman during World War II and later operated the Brogdon Variety. He was married to Miss Billie Huddleston of De Leon.

While in Gorman Brogdon was active in civic affairs. As a member of the Quarterback Club he was among those instrumental in putting the swimming pool and the park on the map again.

The deceased is survived by his wife, a five year old daughter; his mother, a sister and two brothers.




