Some folks seem amazed that I quit smoking so easily. Merely a case of mind over matter, and seeking a little spiritual help. Surprising what a person can do when they seek help above that which is human. Last week I put six dollars in my piggy bank which ordinarily would have been spent on tobacco. That is over \$300 a year. This doesn't include the clothes that usually get burned from tobacco ashes in a year's time. No, I am not trying to tell you to quit smoking. I just wonder why I was a sucker to an expensive habit so long.

Driving in a fifty mile radius of Gorman one sees growth and expansion in spite of the drought. It was not easy for the fore-sighted men and women in these programs. They, like Gorman, had people who were opposed to any progressiveness. Our town has sufficient property for expansion in both business and housing projects. I understand the City owns a good bit of property that could well be used for projects of this nature if and when they come — or I should say, if we go after them. We seem to have a good supply of water which is a big asset in possible expansion of any nature.

Monday morning - An early view of Memorial Park is an inspiring sight. Mockingbirds, Red Birds, Blue Birds, Black Birds and Sparrows - letting the world know it's good to be alive. One sees the beauty and glory of the day reflected in the flowers, trees and rippling water. The recent shower has slowed work on the Park road but it is really shaping up, including the parking lot which has been leveled back of the dressing rooms. Judge Thurman and his helpers are doing a fine job. The swimming pool has been drained and I understand the Quarterback Club is going to start cleaning out the bottom this week.

While walking through the Park I met Mr Capers and he invited me up to look over his flower garden. While looking at the flowers, Mr Capers pointed at a large pecan tree, barely visible from his yard, located on the north side of the park.

He said, "Lee Bennett, now of Haskell County, planted that tree about 78 years ago." It seems that Lee was visiting a friend of his whose father a Mr Henderson owned the place at that time. Mr Henderson asked the boys to help him set out a fence row and used these pecan trees for the purpose.

A large crowd missed opportunity Monday night. They missed hearing a message from a man who is sold on the American Way of Life. A man who was raised on a farm, rode a donkey to school until he was able to buy a horse and buggy and received most of his education in a school about the size of ours. To me he spoke as a Paul Revere of today, striving to warn people of the socialistic and communistic termites who are eating away the foundation of our great Nation. Did you know that Russia is griping about paying 8 percent of the cost of the upkeep of the United Nations while the United States is forced to pay 37 percent of the cost. 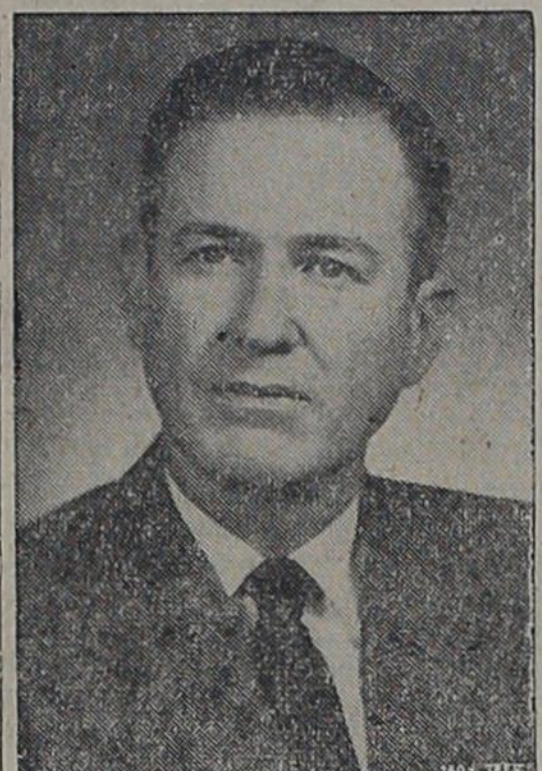

OMAR BURLESON MAKES STATEMENT



Congressman Omar Burleson was a recent visitor in Gorman. He filed his request with Democratic Chairman Frank Williams as a candidate in the July primaries for re-election to Congress.

Congressman Burleson is now serving his third term, having been elected in 1946 and has been unopposed for the office since that time.

"I shall be a candidate for re-election to Congress," said Burleson, "and will begin my campaign just as soon as I feel it proper to leave Washington."

"During the time I have been in Congress, about the only time there has been opportunity to visit back home was in the fall at which time I have each year covered my District visiting with the people. I welcome the opportunity of making a campaign this year in order that I may stay in as close touch as possible with the people whom I have the honor of representing in the Congress and will thoroughly enjoy the time permitted me to be back home."

Congressman Burleson advises this newspaper that he will have a formal statement regarding issues of interest at a later date.

"In the meantime," said the Congressman, "If the people believe I have been diligent in my duties and faithful to the trust and confidence placed in me, and if they believe these first years of experience are a valuable asset to the Nation, State, and District, then I shall ever be grateful for everyone's interest and effort in my campaign."

At their regular monthly meeting last Thursday night the Quarterback Club planned an extensive membership drive. Speaker Tells Group Stand At Cross Roads

A small group of citizens on Monday night at the High School Auditorium availed themselves of the opportunity of hearing a most sincere and gifted speaker discuss How We Are Fast Losing The American Way Of Life. Mr C W Hudson titled his address "STAND YE AT THE CROSSROADS AND POINT TO THE RIGHT."

The program sponsored by the Woman's Study Club was prefaced by a most enjoyable concert of patriotic and other familiar numbers played by the Gorman Band under the direction of Charles Nicholls.

The term RIGHT used in the title refers to constitutional government with its provision for only the original three branches namely the Legislative, Judicial and Executive Departments. The scripture which he partially quoted and partially paraphrased is from the second book of prophecy in the Bible, that of Jeremiah.

Mr Hudson cited the numerous turns that the present administration has made to the left, the communistic and socialistic moves and trends.

The following statement should give every reader a vivid picture of pink, red, communistic or socialistic infiltration into every walk of the American Way of Life: "The Communist Party in the United States," Mr Hudson said, "sent 900 Americans to the University of Lenin. These communists with 1300 Russian born have found positions in the government, military, business and education organizations of the United States."

Hudson refers his hearers to the files of the F B I and to the reports of the Committee on Un-American Activities (Dies Committee) as his sources of information.

Present conditions call for prayer and a prayer meeting for the salvation of the American Way of Life he stated. He urged that the people demand a constitutional amendment that would keep the government out of business and break government control. He warned that elections must swing wide to the RIGHT. Subsidies, priorities, party, and gifts must not be allowed to stand between the people and the American Way of Life. Bureaucracy must go.

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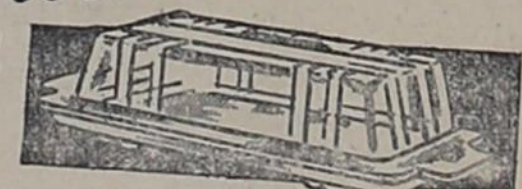

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Farmer's Question Corner

WHAT ABOUT ACETONEMIA?
Q: Is this dairy cow problem, acetonemia, a strictly nutritional disease?
A: No. Sometimes called 'ketosis', this disease usually affects the best producing cows and good feeders, although poorly-fed animals are also susceptible.
Q: What causes it?
A: The exact cause is unknown, but veterinarians believe it is related to the liver's failure to properly convert food sugars to blood sugar.
Q: What forms does this disease take?
A: There are two forms, the mild form and the severe form. In mild cases, symptoms are vague, such as the cow going off feed and giving milk which has a peculiar taste. In severe cases, the cows may be either nervous, or depressed, lose weight, and may even go down. Milk production drops drastically.
Q: Can the farmer take any preventive steps?
A: One safeguard is to feed good quality hay and grain.
Q: What should owners do if they suspect acetonemia?
A: They should contact their veterinarian immediately so an accurate diagnosis can be determined by chemical tests. Acetonemia is easily confused with other diseases such as milk fever or plant poisoning.
Q: Can the disease be treated successfully?
A: Yes, intravenous injections are quite successful. Further treatment varies with the symptoms. If started in time, death losses can usually be prevented. However, careful nursing is required before the animals get back into production.
