In publishing the following letter it is not my desire to create any friction between the City Commission and the people they serve. My aim, as editor and publisher of your paper, is to keep you informed as to what happens in this community. If at any time a citizen feels that they want to unburden their minds by having a letter published, as long as it is not libelous, I will be glad to publish it.

After receiving the following letter, I checked with the City Secretary and found the City Commission was not violating any law in selling the property referred to. In fact, according to the information I received, our City Commission has unlimited power to execute the affairs of our town without informing the citizens of their actions. I do not mean they have deliberately withheld any news from the people, because they have always answered any questions asked by any representative of the Progress. I have been lax in calling on the City Commission for news feeling that they would notify me if anything came up worth publishing. In the future I will strive to keep in closer touch with our City Commission.

Dear Editor - Please write this letter as follows:

In regards to the City land that sold May 26, 1952. To those who don't know where the city land is. It is located just west of Brogdon Field, and also joins Mr. Marvin Roberts, James Jobs, and my lots on the south side.

I leased the land from the city in 1947. When I leased it I moved my barn, water trough, plow tools, and milk cow on the land. When I leased the land it was solid with Bermuda grass and there was two deep ditches across the land. I have killed out the Bermuda grass and filled up the ditches and during the time I have had the land leased I have asked the City Officials to sell the land to me. Every time I asked they told me the land was not for sale.

The first thing I knew about the land having been sold was when I learned that the deeds had already been recorded on the County Records.

I have talked to 23 tax-payers of Gorman and all twenty-three of the men said the land should have been advertised and sold to the highest bid.

Three of the men said if they had known the land was for sale they would have paid \$800 for it. Two of the men said they would have given \$1000 and two other men stated they would have given \$300 per acre for the land. So we had better wake up the water tower may be next.

PERTAINING TO 1952 PEANUT PROGRAM

The Department of Agriculture announced this week that the support price on Southwest Spanish peanuts would be \$232.00 per ton, basis 70 grade. The discount for foreign material would be for each full 1 percent foreign material in excess of 4 percent and not over 10 percent at \$1.00 per ton, and in excess of 10 percent and not over 15 percent shall be \$2.00 per ton. Moisture is to be based on 7 percent, discounted one full percent for each percent above 7 percent and not over 9 percent. Peanuts containing moisture over 9 percent would be ineligible.

The 1952 program does not call for direct buying by CCC or its agents as a means of support. In order to get peanuts in line with other commodities the Department will support the price by: (1) Farm loan to producers; (2) Purchase agreement; (3) Purchase by the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association; (4) Loans to producers who place peanuts in approved warehouse (CCC-PMA).

Under the above options the farmer has several choices, and the following producers has been announced by PMA:

1. FARM STORAGE LOAN: You may obtain a loan through your county PMA Committee, and hold your peanuts in any committee-approved farm storage structure. You may sell them at any time after repaying your loan to the county committee. Loans bear interest at 3 1/2 percent per year and mature May 31 1953, with CCC accepting delivery of peanuts if loan is not repaid by that date. Producer will be responsible for loss in weight and grade that may take place during the time your peanuts are under loan. A service charge will be paid by the producer at time he signs agreement, this is to be \$0.30 per ton with a minimum of \$3.00. Producer will pay for inspection by Federal-State Inspection Service. Approved farm storage shall consist of storage structures located on or off the farm (excluding public warehouse), which are determined by the county committee to be so located and of such substantial and permanent construction as to afford safe storage of peanuts. Such structure shall be dry and well ventilated.

2. PURCHASE AGREEMENT: This agreement signed by the producer and a representative of the County PMA Committee, guarantees producer a market at support price. It may cover any quantity of eligible peanuts produced on your farm. The peanuts remain in possession of the producer in any location he chooses to store and may be sold or disposed of in any manner he chooses. No money is advanced to producer and this agreement only gives him the right to sell them to CCC but he is not obligated to do so. Producer may deliver peanuts at the support price

SCHOOL BOND ELECTION CARRIES 253 TO 177

430 patrons of the Gorman Independent School District went to the Poll last Saturday and expressed their wishes in regard to a new high school building.

The vote for the issuance of \$110,000 to build a new school building carried by 253 for and 177 against.

Legal procedure and getting bonds ready will take about six weeks. During this time the School Board will have under consideration several questions as to plans and materials.

It is hoped that construction on the building can be started by September first.

No allocations have been made to the new building or repair of the grade school.

Operation of the schools will be continued in the present buildings for the coming term.

Normally seven to eight months are required for construction of this kind, and it is hoped that the auditorium will be ready for use for the Spring programs.

Price Daniel To Be In Eastland Saturday

Price Daniel will bring his campaign for the United States Senate to Eastland on Saturday, July 12, when he makes an address in the District Courtroom at 10:00 a. m. The public is invited to hear him on this occasion.



Daniel, who is completing six years as Attorney General of Texas, has won national recognition for his fight to save the tidelands for the Texas public school fund and for his fight against organized crime and the gambling syndicate.

Frank Sparks of Eastland is in charge of arrangements for the local meeting. Mr Sparks said that Price Daniel would make a speech at the courthouse promptly after the 10:00 o'clock meeting begins, and that the meeting will end by 10:30 a. m. He urged all supporters of Price Daniel and all interested citizens to hear the candidate speak.

In a speech directly to the people of Texas, Daniel announced his candidacy for the Senate on January 21 and since then he has been dividing his time between the campaign and his official duties as Attorney General.

Daniel attained his legislative experience as a Member and as Speaker of the House in the Texas Legislature. He is the only veteran in the race, having waived his legislative exemption in World War II. He enlisted as a private in the Army and served three years before being discharged with the rank of Captain.

Daniel is the father of four children who are direct descendants of the hero of San Jacinto, General Sam Houston. Mrs Daniel is a great, granddaught-er of General Sam Houston.

Allan Shivers Makes Campaign For Governor

Austin, July 3, (Spl) - Allan Shivers took off his formal governor's coat this week to hit the hot July Texas campaign trails for 15 days of intensive travel before he leaves for the national Democratic Convention in Chicago the week of July 20.

Shivers' jammed-packed campaign tour will take him over much of Texas - from small communities like Dime Box in Lee County to metropolitan communities of Houston and San Antonio.

His tour will start on July 4 following a busy week at the national governors' conference at Houston, where Shivers participated with 46 other governors in mapping out programs for continued improvement in state hospitals and schools, betterment of prison systems, highways, farm-to-market roads and educational systems.

Shivers, who has always spent much of his time visiting with the people and listening to their ideas for the betterment of state government, will hit the general areas of Stamford, Abilene, El Paso, Texarkana, Paris, Tyler, Waco, Corsicana, Mexia, Hillsboro, Temple, Brownfield, Lubbock, Lamesa, San Angelo, Odessa, Midland, Kermit, San Antonio, Houston, Baytown, Beaumont, and Port Arthur from July 4 to July 17.

During the past several weeks the governor has been speaking and working more on precinct meetings than on his own campaign, devoting a great deal of time meeting in various communities with precinct workers who took the lead in May to assure Texas of an uninstructed delegation to the National Democratic Convention.

Shivers pointed out in connection with his campaign tour that he has responded to the invitations of the people to visit in their communities during the campaign, as best he could, considering the brevity of the time available.

"I try to know at all times what Texans want, need and think," he emphasized.

The final score was 30 some odd runs to nothing in favor of the Yanks. The Eastland boys played hard right up to the finish and deserve credit for not giving up. With more practice they may be a hard team to beat.

must be not over 3% if stored in PMA-CCC approved warehouse. The Coop has the same restrictions on Foreign material and moisture but will accept and segregate peanuts containing less than 4% damage and those with 4% and above. Damage deduction is based on a sliding scale, increasing with each point until it reaches a maximum of \$12.00 at 8%.

In order to be eligible for price support under any of these provisions the peanuts must be graded by a Texas-Federal Inspector.

One Sheller stated that one of his objections to this year's program is that all of the Shellers would not be forced to pay a minimum support price. If a few shellers in various sections of the State could buy peanuts at below support they would be able to under sell other shellers and therefore force the price down to the producer. As long as all were required to pay a support price the Shellers were on the same basis and the price paid the producer was relative. Under this program, some of the Shellers may try to grade the peanuts themselves and in that way buy cheaper.

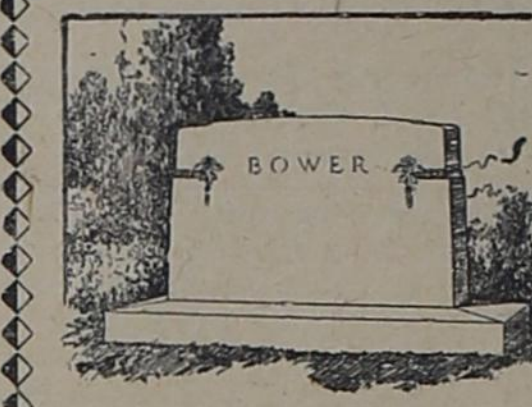
