WFAA To Hold Open House On 30th Anniversary

Radio listeners of Texas and the Southwest will have a chance to meet the stars and see how radio works when WFAA, Dallas radio services of The Dallas Morning News, holds open house to observe its thirtieth anniversary on the air, June 23 through 29.

All broadcasts at the station will be open to the public. There will be variety stage shows put on each half hour throughout the weekday hours, from 5:30 a m to 10 p m and on Sunday from 12 noon to 10 p m.

Visitors to the station, and 50,000 of them are expected to come, will go away laden with prizes, too. There will be three daily door prize drawings for jackpot awards, and there will be a giant jackpot award on Sunday, June 29th. Refrigerators, wrist watches and radios are among the awards. A candid camera contest, open to amateur photographers, will have a \$50 cash first prize.

The station's air-conditioned studios will be turned into exhibit halls of radio entertainment star pictures and displays of the growth of radio from the early crystal set eras to the present clock-radio sets.

Entrance will be via elevators in the Government Building (formerly Sante Fe Building), 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas, up to the tenth floor WFAA level and across a garden in the sky.

DR. LOUIS H. BAUER of Hempstead, New York, new President of the American Medical Association, who this week urged both major political parties to write platforms which "disavow all threats to our Constitutional independence and liberty."

CHICAGO—Warning both the Republican and Democratic Parties that the eyes of the world will be upon them during their July conventions in Chicago, the new President of the American Medical Association Tuesday night challenged them to nominate fearless men of integrity who will be guided by the highest concepts of national welfare and world freedom.

Dr. Louis H. Bauer of Hempstead, New York, in his inaugural address delivered here at the 101st Annual Session of the AMA, declared that "a candidate who emerges from a smoke-filled room will be the candidate of defeat."

Farmer's Question Corner

PREPARED BY American Foundation For Animal Health



WHAT ABOUT BLACKLEG?

Q: Are all farm animals susceptible to blackleg, or just cattle?

A: Principally young cattle between six months and two years of age. Goats and sheep are also susceptible, but other animals are apparently immune.

Q: What causes it?

A: Blackleg is caused by a spore-forming germ which can live in the ground for years. It may enter an animal's body through small cuts and punctures in the skin, or through grazing.

Q: How does blackleg act?

A: First symptoms are dullness and lameness. Victims develop a fever, lose appetite, show depression. Swelling caused by the disease have a crinkling, tissue-paper feeling if they are touched.

Q: How serious is blackleg?

A: It is usually fatal, though some infected calves may be saved if treatment is started in time.

Q: How can the disease be prevented?

A: All calves in blackleg areas should be vaccinated when three or four months old. In some areas, where 'complicated' blackleg is a hazard, veterinarians may use a combined vaccine for best protection. Complicated blackleg is caused by two different germs.

Q: When is blackleg likely to occur?

A: The worst danger season is during the spring and summer months when cattle are on pasture. Farmers may wrongly blame blackleg losses on lightning or poisonous plants.

Q: What should be done with carcasses of animals which have died from blackleg?

A: They should be burned or buried deeply under lime to prevent the infection from spreading. NOTE—Due to space limitation, general questions cannot be handled by this column.

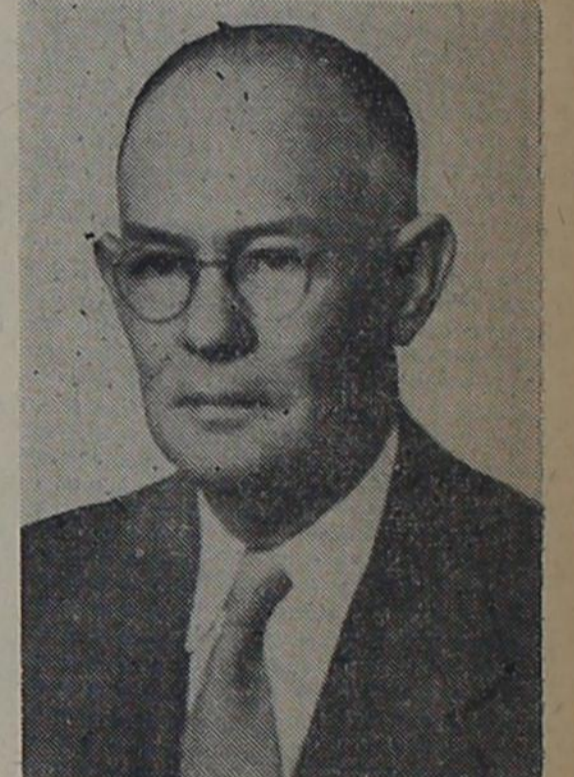

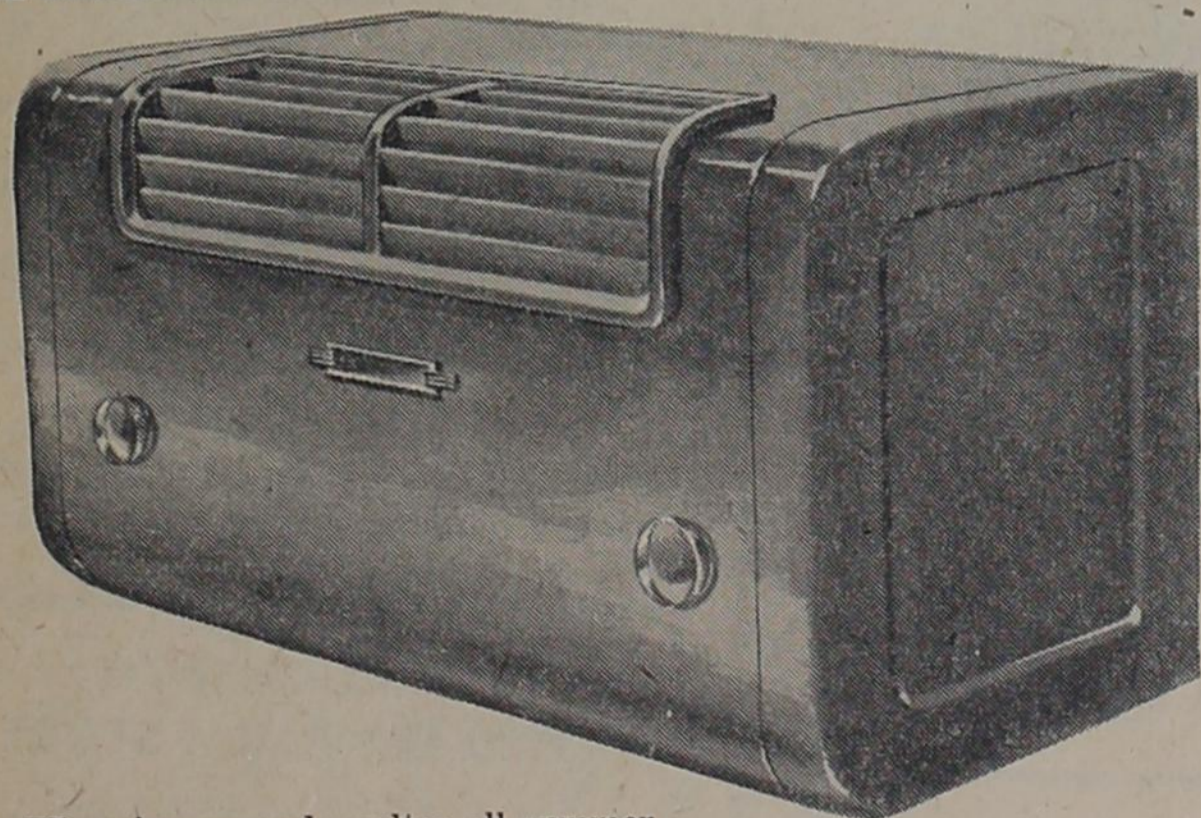

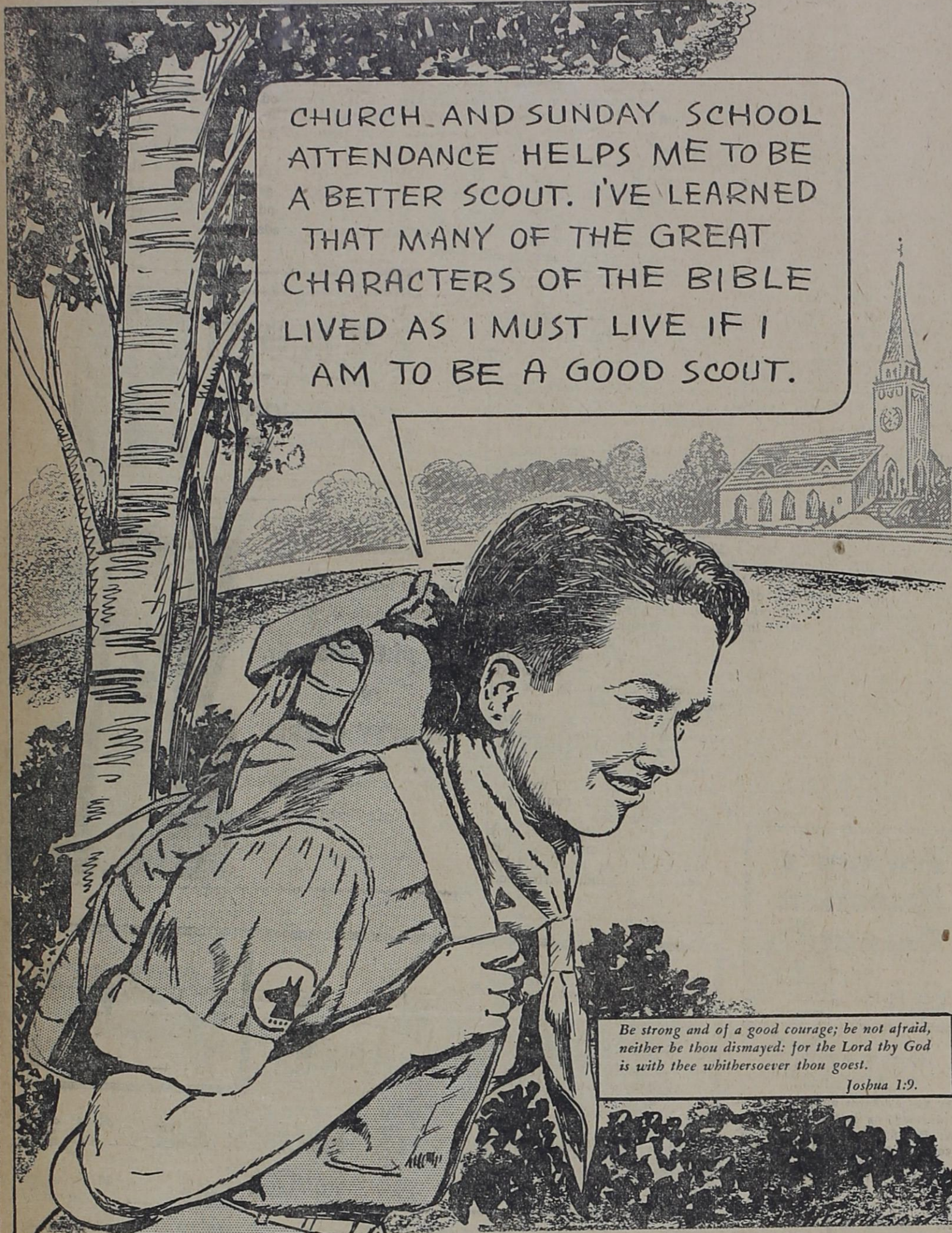

THE WORD "newspaper" oversimplifies the functions of the institution so named, because a newspaper publishes much more than the news of its community. Virtually all newspapers regularly contain editorials, features such as this, and advertising, none of which is included when speaking of news.

Functions of Newspaper

To give readers a better cross-section of current events, a newspaper impartially and objectively reports the news, discusses and interprets it with editorials, and entertains and informs in feature and advertising columns.

News is an accurate account of highlights of a happening of interest to the paper's readers. That is why it is necessary to say black is white, if that is what someone stated, even though the reporter, editor and newspaper know differently. And that is why a report about a meeting of local officials is as important news here as a session of the legislature or of the congress.

The home town newspaper's editorials and its educational and entertainment features may not receive as widespread attention, numerically, as do those of metropolitan papers, but proportionately they are even more important. They are more closely representative of what the "grass roots" of our country thinks, approves and disapproves, because America's home towns are the backbone of our nation.

Voice of Majority

Sixty per cent of the people of the United States live in communities such as this, or on farms. What they believe, do, and say is therefore the voice, will and heart of this country. And their newspapers therefore mirror majority desires and aims.

News, editorials, features and advertising combine in the home town newspaper to accurately reflect the community, to inform it, entertain it, and to give it a voice in the larger affairs of our daily lives. There is no more important newspaper, anywhere, than this one. And the local news it reports is big news, in this community.
