Dennis Is Constable Bryant Runs Close Race In Run-Off

E L (Jug) Dennis, if he keeps up his countenance, will be dubbed "the smiling constable". He pulled a heavy vote in Gorman that won the office for him. The city vote in the run-off was 295 with 169 for Tom Bryant. Bryant led, however in Kokomo, Carbon and Staff by 57 majority. The final total gave Dennis 406 and Bryant 337.

Clyde Fisher took a lead in Gorman but lost the final tot to Richard Cox by a vote of 242 to 2783 for County Treasurer.

Gorman gave Johnson Smith lead over George Fox for the office of County Clerk which Smith won with a final total of 2906 to 2339.

Gorman voted 3-1 for the winner Supreme Court Justice Frank Culver.

TRIBUTE PAID TO F. S. PULLIG TOWN'S OLDEST CITIZEN, TUESDAY

Gorman business houses were closed Tuesday morning, August 19th, when friends and relatives paid a final tribute to the town's oldest citizen, when last rites were read for Philip S Pullig at the First Baptist Church. Rev Tom Small, assisted by Rev J L Ray, officiated at funeral services held at 9:30 o'clock. Interment was made at the Battle Creek Cemetery near Eolian where he was laid to rest in the family plot.

Mr Pullig had passed away Monday, August 18th, at 1:50 A M at the home of his brother, C W Pullig of Knox City, where he had been visiting for several weeks. He was within two months of his 96th birthday, having been born October 18th, 1856, in Columbia, Arkansas. On January 22nd, 1880, he was married to Hattie Perry Colwell. She had preceded him in death in August 1946. Seven children were born to the union, three of whom died in infancy.

Coming to Moran, Texas in 1890 with his family, he later settled on a stock ranch near Breckenridge where he was engaged in ranching for a number of years. Attracted by the Hankins Normal College Mr Pullig moved with his family to Gorman in 1905, where he purchased a farm and city properties. For the remainder of his life, 47 years, he lived at the same location, with the exception of the past winter which he spent with his daughters in San Antonio. For a time he owned and operated a grocery.

Friends and neighbors remember Mr Pullig as a Christian gentleman who radiated a pleasant but sage-like optimism. He had united with the Methodist Church at an early age. He had a wide acquaintance for he frequented the downtown area daily until he went to San Antonio last winter. It is a remarkable fact that after retiring he retained his complete faculties and was able to manage all of his business affairs, being alert and active, until one year before he passed away.

Immediate survivors are his four children: Miss Della Pullig and Mr Hulon Pullig of Gorman, Mrs Loma McKnight and Mrs Fanny Burkett, both of San Antonio. Grandchildren surviving are MSgt Don C McKnight of Brooks Field, San Antonio, Joe Burkett, Jr of Kerrville, Captain Prentiss Burkett of Biggs AFB, El Paso, Texas, Mrs Gene Ellison of San Antonio, Mrs Earl Stone, Jr., of Ft Worth. There are nine great-grandchildren. And he is also survived by two brothers, C W Pullig of Knox City, and J R Pullig of Stamps, Arkansas, and two sisters, Mrs Tom Parr of Lorenzo and Mrs Ida Williams of Nocona.

Martha Lorena Hansard Smith was born July 12th, 1883. She had lived a devoted Christian life having joined the Baptist Church at an early age. Mr Sam D Smith with whom she had been united in marriage on July 26th 1903 had preceded her in death. She had moved with her family to Gorman in the early 1900's. Later she moved to California.

SCHOOL TO OPEN WEDNESDAY, SEPT 3

The 1952-53 school term will officially open Wednesday morning, September 3 at 9:00, in the school auditorium. The opening exercises will be held with all students and visitors in assembly. All patrons are invited to be present.

This year the 8th grade class will be in the grade school building. During the past three years it has been in the high school building. This change will place all elementary classes in one building. New seating has been ordered for the 8th grade and will be installed before school starts or a few days after.

Restrooms have been painted in the grade school and new plumbing has been installed.

Work is being carried on with the detail plans of the new high school building. The preliminary plans have been okayed by the school board. Three to four weeks are usually required to complete the detailed plans before they are submitted to the contractors for bids. It is hoped that actual construction can begin about the first of October or shortly thereafter.

Mr Nicholls held his first band practice of the year on Tuesday night, getting ready for the first football game with De Leon on September 5th.

Football workouts will begin on Monday, September 1, with Head Coach Ross Wilson, Assistants David Goodwin and Bill Michaels in charge.

Tuesday, September 2 is High School Registration Day. Students in high school may register anytime from 10:00 A M to 2 P M. Tuesday in a regular workday for teachers and any questions may be answered on that day by your child's teacher. The entire faculty will meet together at 9:00 A M in the high school building.

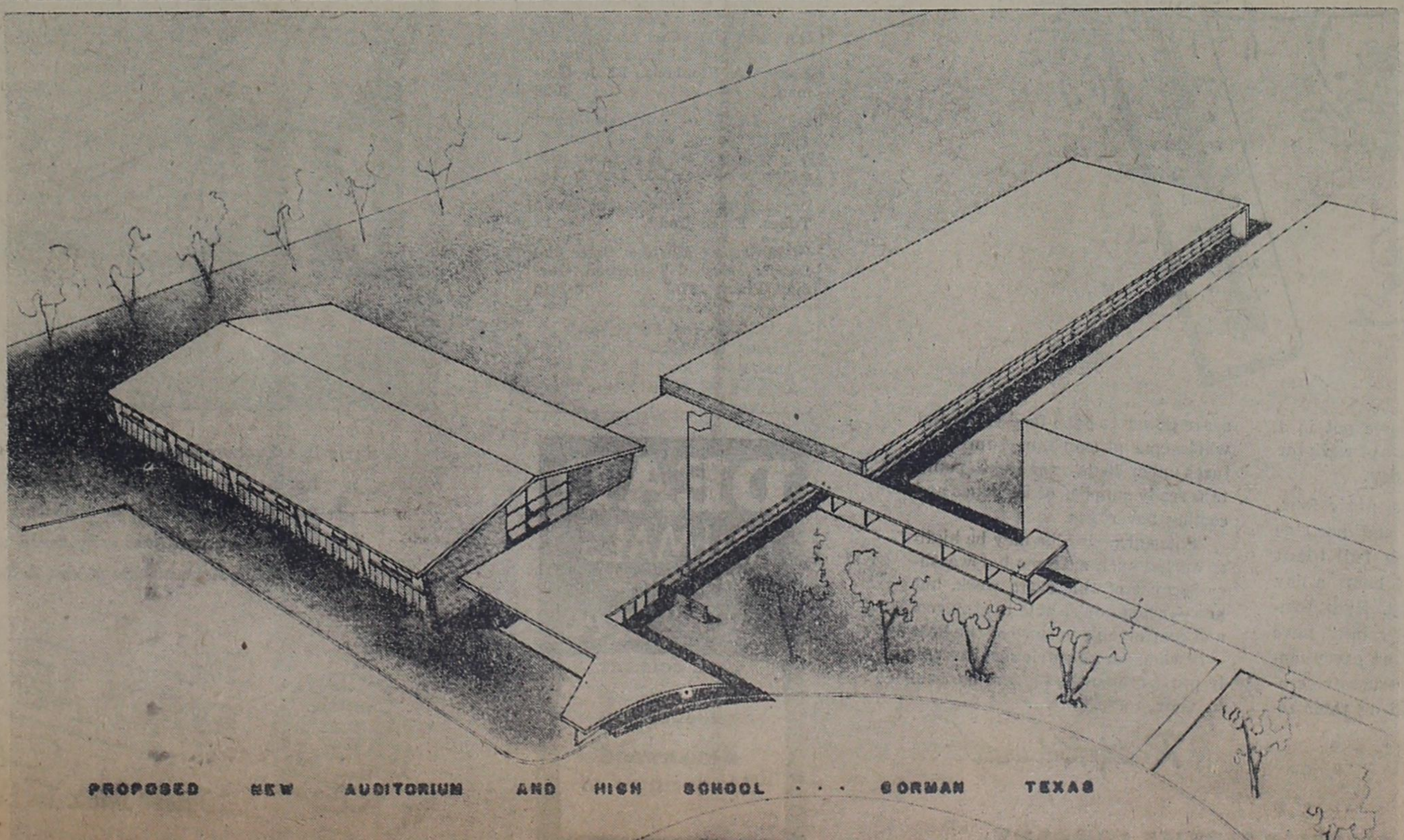

Telephone Wires

Federal Aid Available For Drought Relief

As a result of serious drought conditions in many areas of Texas as many farmers are faced with an emergency need for credit not available through local sources to buy feed for their livestock and seed and fertilizer for the planting of fall grain and pasture crops according to L J Cappleman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas, who has received reports from every section of the State on conditions as they exist at this time.

Mr Cappleman has been told that if such assistance is not provided it will be necessary for farmers in these drought stricken areas to reduce sharply, or in many instances to liquidate entirely, their livestock enterprises because of the lack of feed stuff and pastures for grazing. In the interest of the farmers concerned, the agricultural economy of the areas affected and the welfare of the farming interests of Texas, the Farmers Home Administration is taking every reasonable step to prevent the liquidation of desirable productive livestock by drought stricken farmers.

The director pointed out that in order to accomplish this purpose and to help farmers continue in business county offices of the Farmers Home Administration are in a position immediately to make disaster loans in any county in the State of Texas to qualified applicants in accordance with published instructions and revised policies outlined at a meeting of State Field Representatives in Dallas last week. At the meeting held here in Dallas, Mr Cappleman received reports of serious crop losses through drought and that farmers and ranchmen are in urgent need of funds to buy feed, seed and other supplies to continue their operations for the remainder of this year. In many instances it was pointed out that these farmers will require emergency credit to put in their 1953 crops and funds are available through the local Farmers Home Administration County Offices now for the purposes indicated. These funds are available at 3 percent interest for crop production needs, under the provisions of Public Law 38.

The purpose of the disaster loan program authorized by Public Law 38, said County Supervisor, George I Lane of Eastland County, is to provide a source of temporary or emergency credit to assist farmers in designated areas who have suffered serious production losses as a result of drought or other natural causes, and who are unable to obtain from other established local sources, the credit needed to continue their farming or ranching operations.

The Eastland county office of the Farmers Home Administration is located in the Petroleum Building, Room 209, second floor, in Eastland, Texas and applicants may contact supervisor George I Lane there for the purpose of discussing their needs.

The Eastland county committee is composed of Marvin H Perkins, Ranger and Ewing Baker, Jr of Eastland, who certify to the eligibility of applicants for loans and otherwise assist the county supervisor in the administration of Public Law 38 and other phases of the county Farmers Home Administration program.

that they have had a diphtheria vaccination or Schick test showing negative.

Buses will run at the regular time on Wednesday morning.

Accident insurance may be purchased for \$1, as last year. In order that students, who purchase the insurance may be covered, free insurance is provided for the first few days for all students. After that time only those who have paid \$1 will be covered. This insurance is for accidents ONLY. Coverage is from the time the student leaves his doorstep to go to school until the time he gets home in the afternoon. It DOES NOT cover accidents incurred by students who participate in inter school activities - playing other schools in a game. The High School football team, The High School Basketball teams, both boys and girls, are covered by a policy paid for by the athletic department. Coverage for interschool activities calls for a higher premium than that paid for local school coverage. Two claims were made last year on this insurance and two claims were paid. One was for a broken arm and the other for a broken leg. One-hundred twenty-seven students purchased this insurance last year. The two claims amounted to \$119.00. Only \$127 was paid in premiums. As the school is not liable for any injury, this insurance serves as a good method by which medical payments can be made in case of accidents. Details will be given to students to give to parents on the opening day.

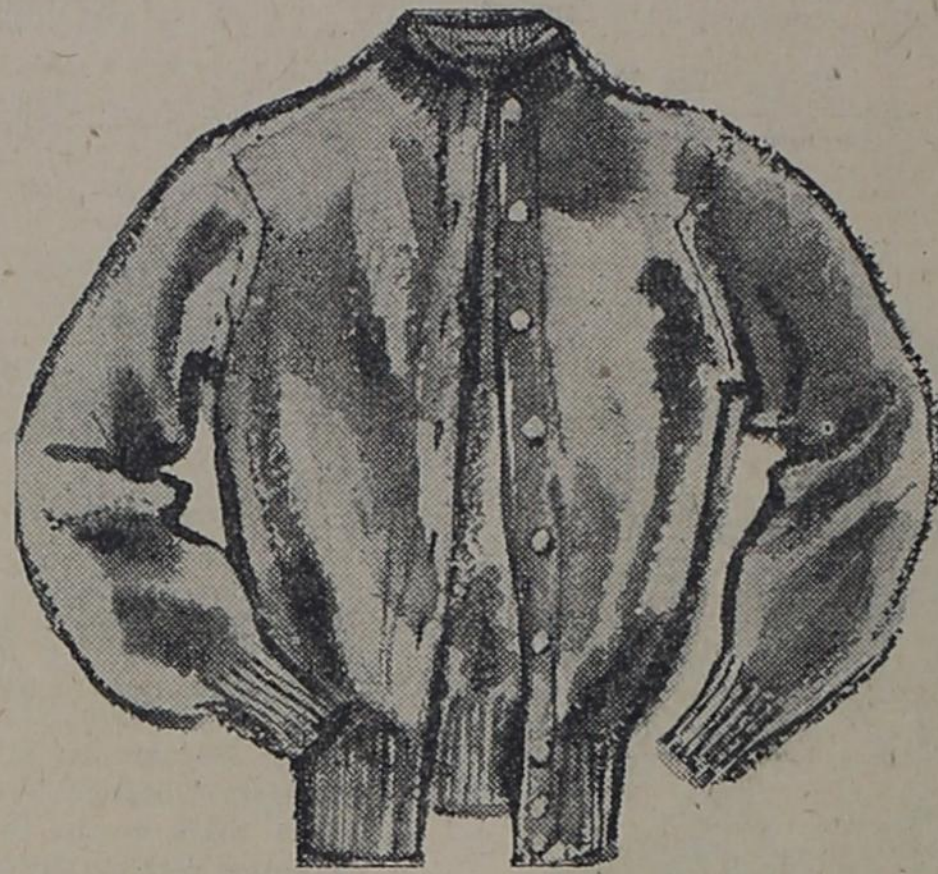

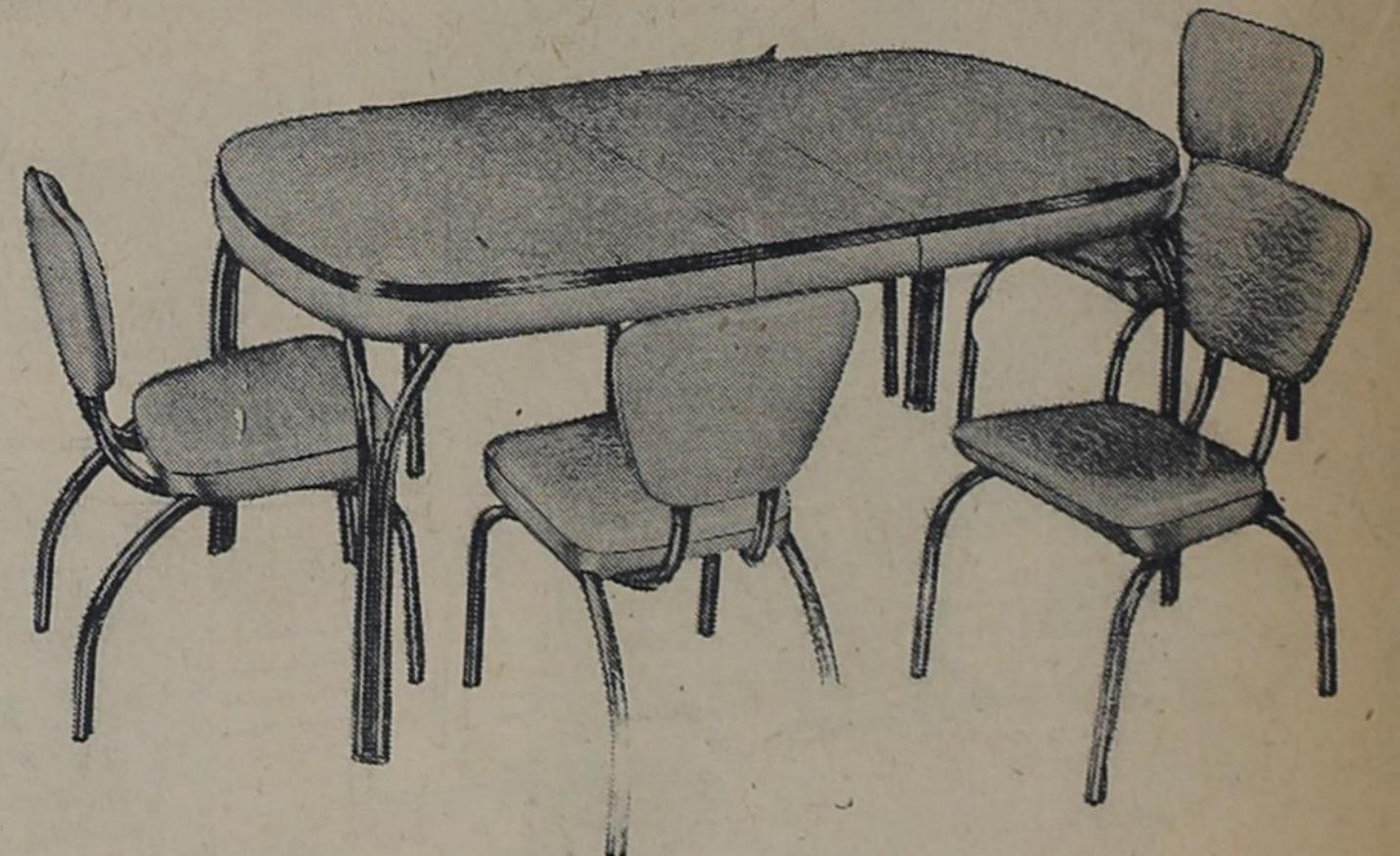
