The Gorman Panthers, victorious over Strawn by a score of 26 - 6, this week journey to Clyde for what seems to be stacking up for a battle royal. Scouts report that Clyde possess es speed and quick striking power that the Gorman boys have not faced so far this season.

In last week's game the Panthers struck for a touchdown in the early phase of the first quarter on Jimmy Rachel's end sweep behind fine blocking. The Panthers struck twice again in the second period on passes from Rachel to Joiner and Jackson. In the third quarter Gorman scored the final touchdown late in the third period on another pass play from Rachel to Ronald Jackson. Strawn pushed a lone tally across in the final stanza when T Gordon ripped his way off left tackle and romped 30 yards to pay dirt.

The Clyde Bulldogs feature three scat backs in Marcello, Acquero, Doug May, and Bill Barr with able reserve power in the persons of Charles Hines and Bob Robertson, halfbacks. These speedsters start their attack from the S M U "Y" formation and are capable of hitting quickly with much interference, especially on wide plays around the ends. The Bulldogs lost to a powerful Wylie team of District A last Friday. However, this is no disgrace as the Wylie team is currently picked as a co-favorite with Dublin in the district A race. Clyde's roster shows 33 team members, many of whom are lettermen from last years team.

The Bulldogs pass from the double wing set up with Hines doing the chunking. His targets are ends Bill Pringle and Freddie Kniffen and backs Barr and May. Barr also lends a hand in the passing department and he throws from the regular Y set-up.

The Panthers are engaged in long drills this week stressing defensive play against wide end sweeps and passes. Robert Rankin, who left the Strawn game in the first period with a pulled muscle, is still out of pads as of Wednesday and he remains a question mark as to any action Friday night. Also on the injured list is Jim Self with a bruised shoulder. However, Self should be in top shape by Friday. The running of little Max Pierce and Billy Whitlock was encouraging in a long two hour scrimmage at Eastland Tuesday. The running of fullback Don Joiner was equal ly effective as he time and again bruised his way through the Maverick line for good yardage.

There will be a pep rally in the gym Friday afternoon and the public is invited to attend. The exact time will be announced later. This will be the second district game for the Panthers and the first for the Clyde Bulldogs.

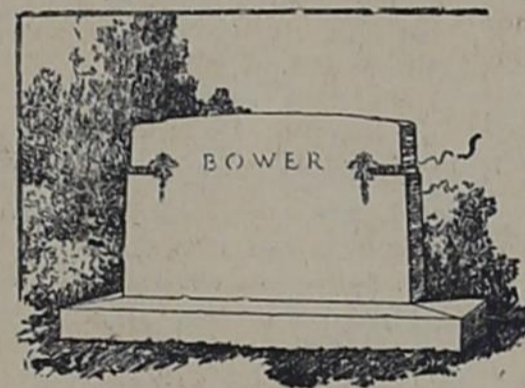

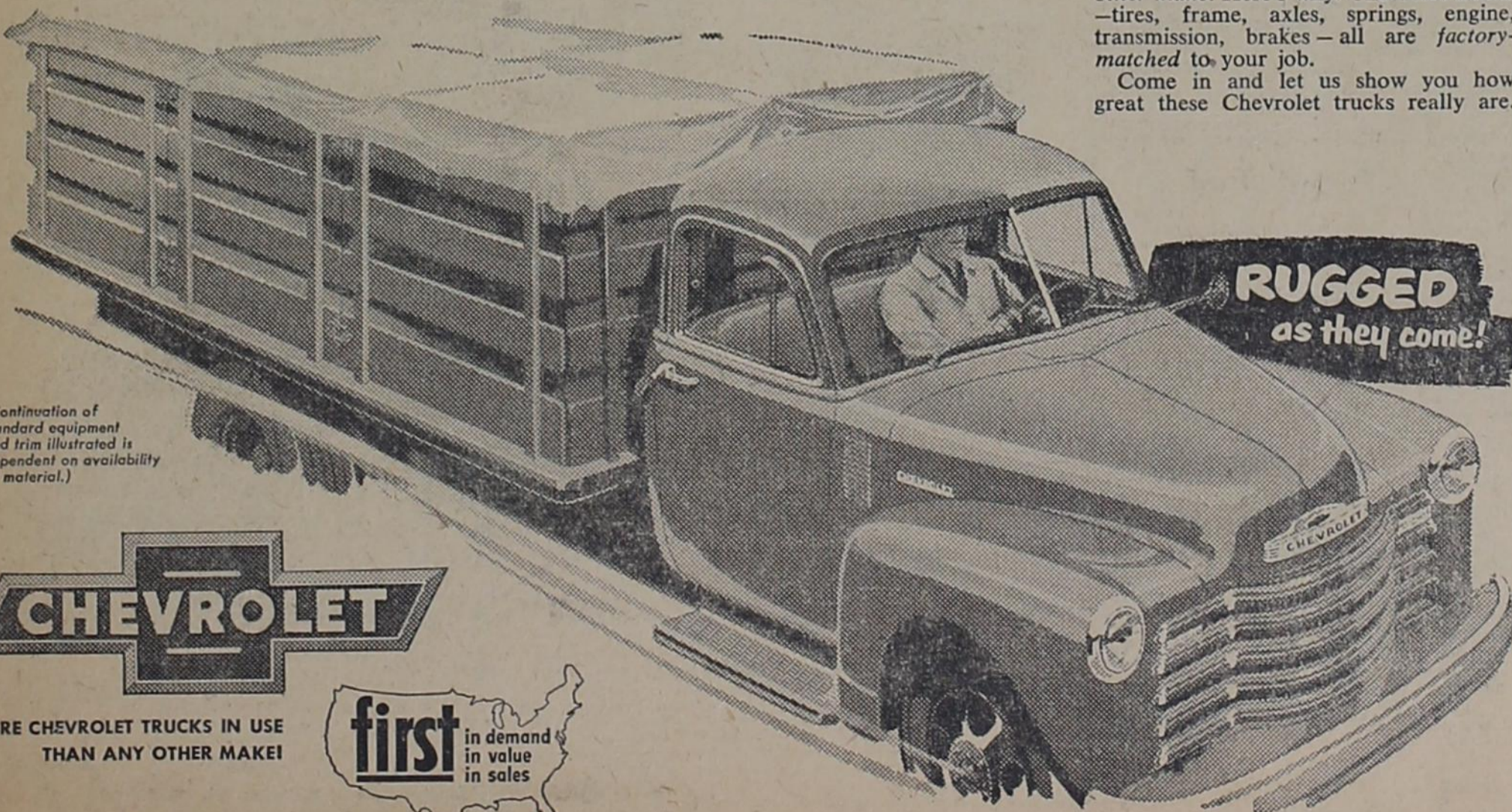

FRONTIER POSTMASTERS OF EASTLAND COUNTY

In a recent publication, "The Frontier Postmasters" edited by Homer Stephens of Stephenville, forty-five towns and communities of Eastland County are listed as having had post offices at different periods during the years 1874 to 1927.

Mr Stephens is the founder of the Erath county Central Texas Historical Society and the author of the History of Erath County, a book which has become a collector's item.

Early postmasters listed in the Frontier Postmasters for Eastland County are Berry M Burks at McGue Springs in 1874, Henry K Martin at Eastland in 1876, Dallas K Scott and Francis L Ball at Alameda in 1876 and 1877 respectively, Jackson A Jones and Martin Hill at Jewel in 1876 and 1877 respectively.

As many as 27 post offices had been closed by 1904. Eastland County now has about 13 post offices. They are in the towns of Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Gorman, Rising Star, Carbon, Desdemona, Pioneer, Olden, Okra, Nimrod, Scranton, and Romney, and possibly Sipe Springs. (Any Correction the editor will gladly make.)

Postmasters at Shinoak (Bass Lake) were Edwin F Lee 1888 and Hughes O Thomas in 1889. Carbon had a postmaster, N S Haynes as early as 1882.

Hughes O Thomas, who had been appointed postmaster of Shinoak in July 18, 1889, was appointed postmaster of Gorman in December of the same year. As early as 1891 Gorman had a woman postmaster, Lucy V Yates. Miss Yates was the late Mrs Lucy Townsend Carter who died at her home in Eastland in the fall of 1951.

Other early postmasters serving Gorman and listed in The Frontier Postmasters were Hardy Parker 1890, James A Coffman, 1891, William H Maddox, 1897, Robert F Nelson 1899, C V Gates, 1914, E E Layton, 1920, Sidney B Smith, 1922. (The date signifies year in which appointed. Several were re-appointed over a period of years.)

Among familiar names listed as early postmasters are: Almos Blackwell and Archie Harrleson, 1915 and 1917, at Romney; David T White and W L Brashear at Staff; and John T Gilbert at Sunette.

Postmasters who have served Gorman since the early 30's are Mrs R E Boucher and Mrs Dona Moorman, the present postmaster.

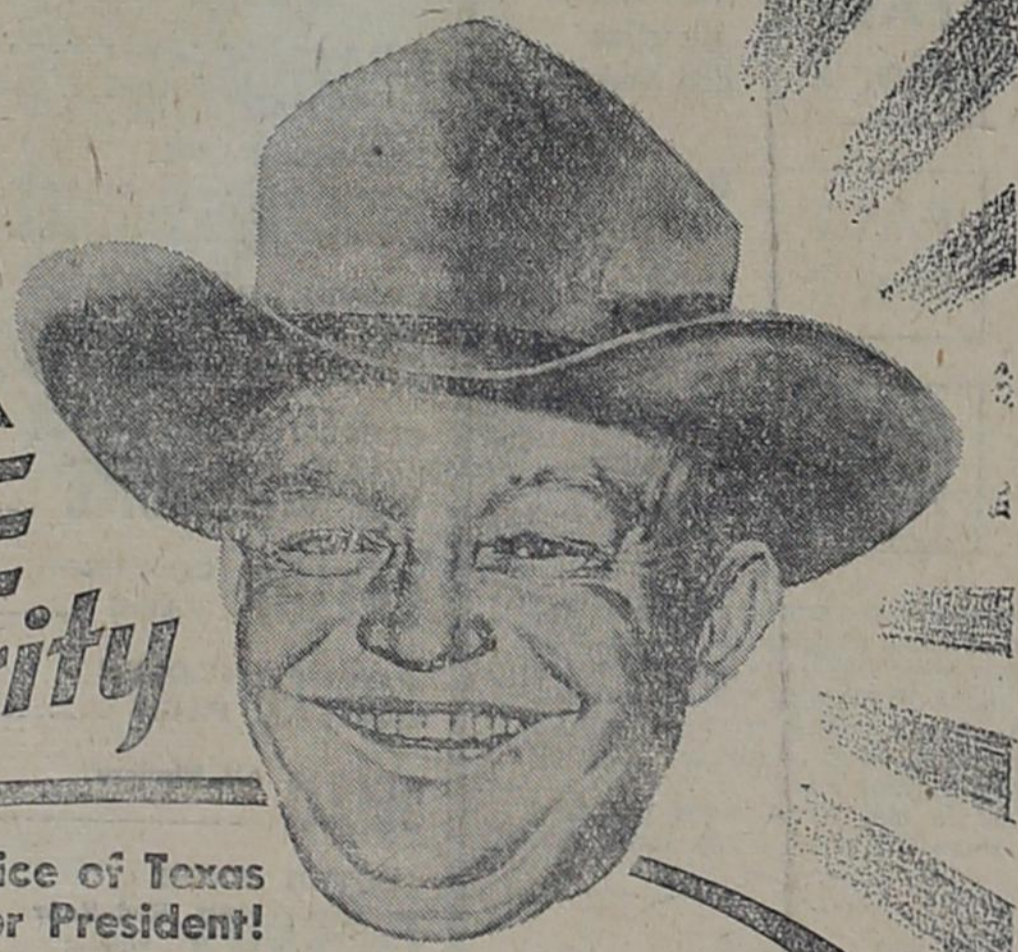
