We better expalin this article before the citizens in Desdemona have heart failure. The following article appeared in the Gorman Progress June 16, 1921. This could possibly be the first beginning of the annual Desdemona Homecoming. Everyone has often wondered when the first one was held - maybe this article is the answer to our question. The article follows as written:

The live little town of Desdemona will stage a big celebration of the Nations' birthday as they are planning to make it the biggest event in the history of the town. The celebration will take on the nature of a Homecoming as well as a fourth of July affair and they are asking each and everyone that worked in the Desdemona area in the days of the "Big Boom" to come back and be with them on this day.

The program will consist of all the usual fourth stunts. There will be a band concert for that day that will last practically all day, there will be public speaking and a lot of "Free" attractions. A rodeo is being planned and they will have all the wild west features to pull at this time. A fast ball team has been secured to play their team a game of baseball on that occasion - the ball game alone ought to be worth the trip to the celebration.

At night on account of the danger of fire, they have had to forego the usual fireworks but instead they have the most novel stunt that has been pulled at any celebration in this part of the State. They will have an aeroplane do "night flying" and in an illuminated plane, the aviator will pull all the usual day flying stunts, such as "looping the loop", "nose dives", "tail spins" and "side slips". He will do the same stunts that Locklear was doing when he went to his death. The plane will be brightly lighted and will furnish a thrilling evenings' entertainment. The Homecoming committee has charge of the program, the entertainment and will do everything in their power to make it a great day for those who attend.

HANDLING PUBLIC TEMPER **TANTRUMS**

For some parents outing with their children often become a display of embarrassing behavior on the part of a child. Some parents find it difficult to control their child temper tantrums in public. Here are a few suggestions:

*Take the child to his room, carry him to a safe spot and let him work it out. *Bring a treat from home to appease the child while shopping in the grocery store.



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Older Americans Month Highlights Age as Opportunity

This year's Older American's Month theme, "Aging: A Lifetime Opportunity" highlights the expanded horizons growing old may bring. With better health and increasing longevity, many people can look forward to second or even third careers, and a chance to fulfil cherished ambitions. A recent USA Today Gallup poll indicated that 70 percent of baby boomers expect to work after they "retire."

In 1940, an American could expect to spend seven percent of his or her adult life in retirement. Today that figure is 26 percent, and a long retirement has become commonplace. The highest-growing segment of the population are people 85 and above.

Social Security changes over the years genrally recognize the increased vitality and longevity of older Americans. For example, the retirement test, the earnings limit designed as a measure of whether a person is actually retired from the workforce, has increased over the years. This means people may earn more while still receiving SS benefits.

Just recently, the limits were increased to \$12,500 a year for 1996 for people 65 and over. Earnings over the limit reduce benefits \$1 for every \$3 in excess earnings, the limits remain at \$8,280 for beneficiaries age 62 but not yet 65; benefits are decreased \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings.

The increased earnings limits recognize the need for greater income that many working beneficiaries face, and the likelihood that people are to work past age 65.

Another feature that affects older workers is the delayed retirement credit. Benefits are increased each month after age 65 the person dealys retirement up to age 70. In 1996, benefits increase 5 percent a year; the figure increases gradually until it reaches 8 percent in

this means that older people who want to continue working can do so with the knowledge that they are increasing the benefits they can count on as much as 25 percent for those who retire today, and as much as 35 percent for people who retire in 2008.

You should note also that the age at which a person retires with a full benefit is scheduled to gradually increase from 65 to 67 by 2022. This change recognizes that people will be working longer and will be drawing SS longer. The age for early retirement will remain at 62 for those who prefer it.

Voice Monitors To Track Parolees

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice parole division has begun using an innovative voice identification tracking system that incorporates pagers, computers and telephones to keep up with parolees.

Initially 100 parolees will be tracked by the Voice Monitoring Program in use in eight Texas cities.

The offender is provided a pager and is required to calla the VMP host computer in response to either random calls or scheduled check-in times. The computer confirms the caller's identity through voice verification technology and also determines the offender's location at the time of the incoming call by identifying the telephone num-

"Public safety, new technology and cost effectiveness all come together in this system," Allan Polunsky, chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, said. "Voice Monitoring gives us 24-hour a day, wide area coverage at nominal cost.'

Melinda Bozarth, director of TDCJ's parole division, said the Voice Monitoring system is more flexible than the electronic ankle monitors widely used by parole offices. But it was the success of ankle monitors that led to the use of the voice system and ankle monitors will continue to be used, she

Offenders targeted for the new techology are those requiring higher levels of supervision, Bozarth said.

Bozarth said the voice identification system recognizes an offender's voice and will reject a call if made by someone other than the offender.

"If two brothers call in, the computer is not fooled by the similarity of their voices," she said. She said the computer will not accept calls from offenders using cellular phones.

The parole division contracts with Voice Track Corp. of Dallas for hte new system. Voice Track provides the pagers and the central host computer and charges 15-cents per transaction.

By comparison, an ankle monitor costs the state \$3.21 per day. There are 700 ankel monitors in use. Tracking by ankle monitor is limited to specifically-wired telephones while the voice tracking monitor can utilize any tele-

Each offender's parole officer determines the frequency and schedule of a parolee's calls.

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
