Gorman School Board Estimates 1954 - 1955 Budget And Receipts

The school board and the school administration recently set up a record of 1953-54 receipts and expenditures and also scheduled estimates for receipts and expenditures for the 1954-55 school year. A copy of the same has been given to the Gorman Progress. A summary of the various totals from the four page record appears below.

Total 1953-54 expenditures were \$99,185.88 with 68,022.93 being spent for administration and instruction and 31,162.95 for physical operation and maintenance.

Differences in 1953-54 totals and estimated 1954-55 totals are largely accounted for in the 402 dollar pay raise the State has awarded each teacher.

Administration expenses include salary of superintendent, secretarial help, tax assessor-collector, any system-wide duty, and supplies.

With Our Boys In Service

Corporal Roy F. Dennis, whose wife, Maxine, lives on Route 1, Gorman, is on his way home after serving more than fifteen months in Korea.

The 23-year-old soldier served with Company "A" of the famed 772d Military Police Battalion, one of the oldest MP outfits in the war-scarred Republic.

The "Seven-Seven-Deuce," as it is known in the Far East, is responsible for the safeguarding of all UN military supplies, equipment, and material moved over the Korean National Railroad.

Unlike most units, the "Deuce" has its four lettered companies and their many detachments spread out up and down the South Korean peninsula to facilitate the functioning of its mission of railway security.

Cpl. Dennis entered the Army in October 1952 and received his basic training at Camp Roberts, California. He returns wearing the United Nations Service Medal and the Korean Service Medal.

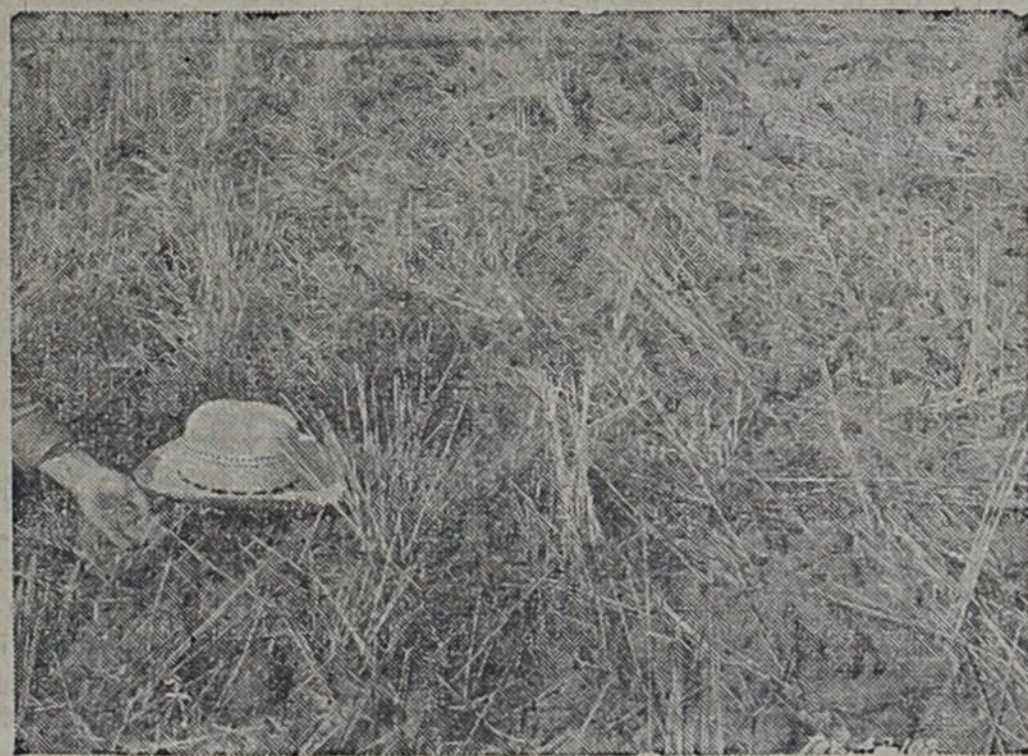

"As It Looks From Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — There are certain basic and fundamental freedoms to which every loyal American is devoted. It is inherent in us to defend the freedom of Religion, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, and freedom of assembly. These are the freedom and the liberty about which we talk so much.

From 1945 to 1948 thousands of Greeks starved to death while fighting for similar freedoms. They refused Communist food for the surrender of their liberties.

On the other hand, there are tens of millions of people in the world who do not care for these abstract freedoms, but only want sufficient food and a roof over their heads. Mostly they are people to whom these things we call

liberty have meant nothing and have no appeal.

There are all sorts of concepts of freedom and liberty. Sometimes we ourselves become confused as to what it really is. We may contend we have a right to do this and that and the other, but usually with a privilege goes responsibility.

Some people are most fearful that our liberties will be jeopardized if wire-tapping becomes legal or if witnesses before investigating committees are limited in their right to claim protection under the Fifth Amendment. If this is a surrender of any liberty that we may enjoy, it seems to me we should be able to forego this much in order to protect ourselves against those who would destroy our freedoms completely.

In times of stress it has been necessary for everyone to give up to some degree a part of his liberty. Economic controls during the war, such as OPA and others, are an example.

The personal freedom of the loyal American is not limited by tightening the laws against subversive activities in our Country.

A great many things have been done in the name of liberty and

JONES HAVE VISITOR FROM PENNSYLVANIA

Miss Caroline Rumsey, a charming young lady from Port Allegheny, Pennsylvania, has been spending her summer vacation with her aunt, Mrs. Marvin Jones and family.

The claim to freedom, but the idea of freedom may have a different meaning among different peoples.

The people of Denmark claim to have the greatest freedom of anyone anywhere. Danish women, for example, are permitted to retain their maiden names after marriage. Spinsters are allowed to call themselves "Mrs." A family row is considered wholly a private affair and cannot be interfered with unless someone is seriously injured or an outsider becomes involved.

Reference to divorce is not permitted in Danish newspapers. Suicides are called "a sudden death," and no mention is made of the circumstances. On the other hand, no Dane may let his hedge grow higher than 5 feet 10 inches without his neighbor's consent.

So different people may have slightly different ideas about what constitutes freedom. In this Country, which we like to describe as the "Cradle of Liberty," it is senseless for us to sit idly by and let subversives destroy us by claiming their "rights" under the guise of absolute liberty.

In the year 348 B. C., Demosthenes gave this advice: "While the boat is undamaged, then is the time for sailor and helmsman and all on board to show unceasing vigilance and prevent anyone from upsetting it, either purposely or accidentally. But when the sea has overwhelmed it, all effort is in vain."

While we still have time, we had better give the FBI and other law-enforcement agencies the strongest possible tools with which to meet the Communist menace in this Country.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year; providing for enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions hereinafter contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application;

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application;

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government

of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

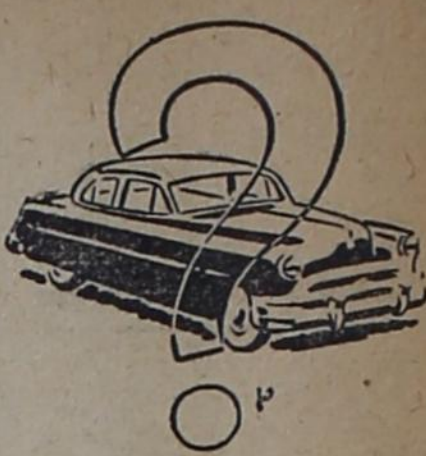
The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

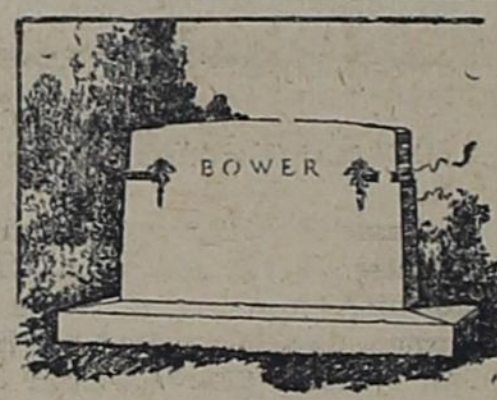

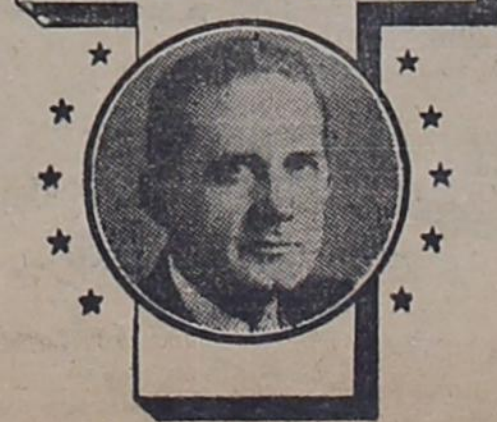

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof, creating the State Building Fund, providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund, providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature; providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon, the proclamation of such election, and the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b and reading as follows:

"Section 51-b. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for some other State official to be a member of the Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate as such State official, he shall be so confirmed as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner that other State officials are confirmed.

(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, and each year thereafter, the Comptroller of Public Accounts shall certify to the State Treasurer the amount of money necessary to pay Confederate pensions for the ensuing calendar year as provided by the constitution and laws of this State. Thereupon each year the State Treasurer shall transfer forthwith from the Confederate Pension Fund to the State Building Fund all money except that needed to pay the Confederate pensions as certified by the Comptroller. This provision is self-enacting. The State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the uses and purposes set forth in subdivision (c) hereof.

(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may be hereafter provided by law, the Commission may acquire necessary real and personal property, salvage and dispose of property unsuitable for State purposes, modernize, remodel, build and equip buildings for State purposes, and negotiate and make contracts necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes herein mentioned.

(d) The first major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be known and designated as a memorial to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be devoted to the use and occupancy of the Supreme Court and such other courts and State agencies as may be provided by law. The second major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be a State office building and shall be used by whatever State agencies as may be provided by law.

(e) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law,

the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) percent of the moneys available to it in any one year, for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America. Said memorials may be upon battlefields or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1965.

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be permitted by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding Thirty Thousand (\$30,000) Dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Republic in the Texas War for Independence. Said memorials may be erected upon battlefields, in cemeteries, or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1965.

"(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, and Article VII (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purposes of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

"(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Those opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

AGAINST the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

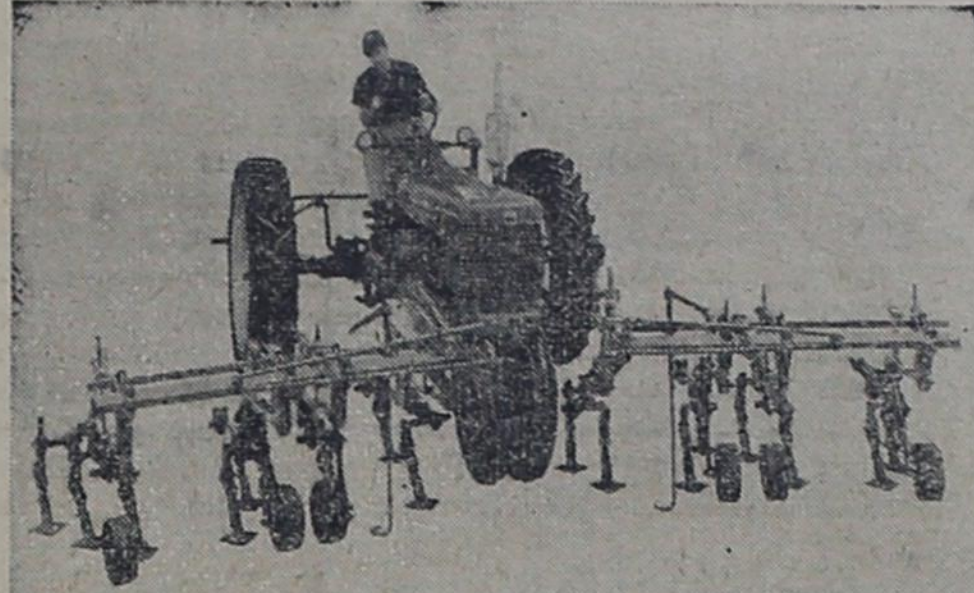

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State, providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people; and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State, in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature.

Section 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees or costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury.

Section 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service

**Re: Mr. Burkett's Position
Concerning the 91st District Court**

On Monday, August 9, in a radio address over Station KERC at Eastland, Mr. Burkett, in discussing his position on the court matter, made the following statement:

"I introduced in the regular session of the Fifty-third Legislature a bill that was recommended by the State Bar Association, the Eastland County Bar Association and the Administration Committee, to redistrict the State into as nearly equal judicial districts as possible."

It is difficult to imagine why Mr. Burkett would make such a statement when the proceedings of the Legislature reveal that House Bill No. 565, being the bill sponsored by the State Bar Association, was offered by Honorable J. M. Kilgore of McAllen and Honorable Hulon Brown of Midland.

This bill was introduced on March 10, 1953 and provided among other things for the abolishing of the 91st District Court and attaching Eastland County to the 90th District Court. After many amendments, this bill, being House Bill No. 565, was finally passed by the House on April, 1953. Mr Burkett voted for its passage which, if it had become law, would have abolished the 91st Court and would have joined Eastland County to the 90th District. This bill provided for the abolishing of two district courts and the creation of ELEVEN new ones.

It is difficult to imagine why this action on the part of Mr. Burkett would appeal to the public as a measure of economy, which he so consistently preaches during his campaign. This bill as passed by the House was not favorably received by the Senate and when all of the facts were presented to the Senate Judiciary Committee, at considerable expense on the part of the attorneys of Eastland, Stephens and Young Counties, the Committee amended the House bill so as to restore the 91st Court to its original status. The bill finally died in the closing days of the Legislature without being enacted.

To determine the attitude of Mr. Burkett so far as it relates to the 91st District Court, it is only necessary to refer to the proceedings of the 53rd session of the Legislature which reveal that on February 26, 1953, Mr. Burkett introduced House Bill No. 269 to abolish outright the 91st District Court and to join Eastland County to the 90th District Court. This bill was introduced on Thursday, February 26, 1953 and the first intimation that Judge Collic, or anyone interested in the 91st Court, had of its being introduced, was on Monday morning, March 2nd, when it appeared in the public press.

When this information reached the friends of the Court, the officers and attorneys of Eastland County requested that the interested parties be given notice of the date of the hearing of the bill in order that they might be present. Judge Collic was informed through a friend of his in the Legislature that Mr. Burkett had advised him that the hearing on the bill would be held at 7:30 p. m., the following evening. To verify the date, Judge Collic talked with the Chairman of the Committee on the same date, at 5:00 o'clock p. m., and was advised at that time by the Chairman of the Committee that the bill had been set down three days previously for hearing on that date at 2:00 p. m.; that the bill had already passed out of the Committee with the assurance of Mr. Burkett that all the interested parties had been duly notified. The bill was heard by the Committee some thirty-six hours earlier than was expected and without the people of Eastland County having an opportunity to be heard on it.

After the Committee passed out the bill, and while it was pending before the House, a petition, signed by 1855 citizens of Eastland County, including all of the attorneys of Eastland County except two, was presented to Mr. Burkett requesting him to withdraw the bill. This effort on the part of the citizens of Eastland County was totally disregarded by Mr. Burkett, who later was able to secure its passage by the House.

When Mr. Burkett's bill reached the Senate, that body was not friendly toward his attitude and his activities and refused to give consideration to the bill and permitted it to die in committee.

Had it been a matter of economy on the part of Mr. Burkett, it would seem that instead of offering a bill to abolish the 91st Court which was within his representative district, he could just as easily and economically offered a bill to attach other counties to the 91st District and have permitted the 91st Court to remain.

The whole activity with Mr. Burkett in connection with the 91st Court reveals clearly to an unprejudiced mind that there was something more than economy, that prompted his action in offering this bill.

House Bill No. 269, introduced by Mr. Burkett, is the only bill offered or sponsored by him abolishing the 91st Court. He states, however, in his radio speech that he had introduced a bill recommended by the Eastland County Bar Association as above quoted. Certainly Mr. Burkett is in error in this statement, since the Eastland County Bar Association has never recommended any such bill. The Eastland County Bar Association is wholeheartedly in favor of the continuance of the 91st District Court, and last year unanimously passed a resolution to that effect.

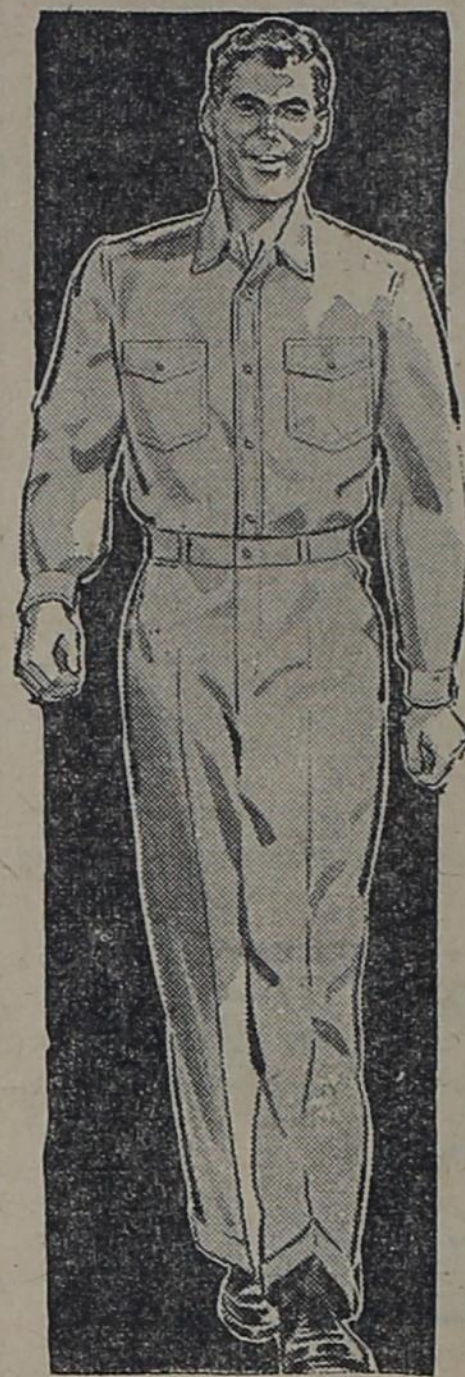
