The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on July 16, 1998 with the following present: Mayor Jack Simpson, Commissioners, Robert Ervin, Kenneth Good, Judy Morris and Donnie Rodgers. Others present were Gaylord Battenfield, Ken Wheeler, Frank Fenley, Gloria and Edward Murphey, Mr. and Mrs. G.E. Bennett, Cameron Gulley and Robin Hicks.

The meeting was called to order at 5:05 p.m.

Judy made a motion to approve the minutes as read with a second from Robert. Motion carried 4-0.

Donnie made a motion to approve the bills for payment with the exclusion of Danka and Robert made a second to the motion. Motion carried 4-0.

Cameron Gulley, Cameron Gulley CPS, was present to present the 1997-98 audit report. Cameron went over the audit and also furnished numerous copies of the report for the commission and other entities that will require this information. No action was required.

The Thomas Seay property was placed into abeyance.

No action was taken on the rent house property. Bids will be taken on the one house through July 30, 1998.

No action was taken on the amending of the city charter. We are waiting on a response from the secretary of

state.

Owner of the home, Arlon Smith, told firemen at the scene that he probably would not try to renovate the house.

According to Gene Foster, Fire Chief, the fire was believed to be caused by an electrical short but said the cause has not been determined.

It took about 45 minutes to extinguish the blaze. The heat was unbelievable for the firemen. The Eastland Fire Department were called to the scene and helped to give the Gorman firemen a break. Smoke and water damage took their toll on the older home. Most of the furniture and other belongings were destroyed.

said Representative Jim Keffer, State Legislator from the area. Keffer has taken the lead with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to sponsor this workshop. "We hope to develop strategies for citizen stakeholder involvement that will result in private/public resource teams," he said.

Congressman Charles Stenholm will lead a policy section with his perspective on government policy and how it may impact Cross Timbers producers.

"Peanut producers in the Cross Timbers have seen deeply declining agricultural income," said Ron Woolley, District Extension Director based in Stephenville and Co-Chair of the Summit Workshop. Acreages have shifted dramatically, moving to West Texas.

The transition has been so rapid that farmers, especially those in peanuts, are looking for effective alternative strategies. They are taking a hard look at

the best use of their land and how to survive in the face of 64 percent of spring peanut quotas transferring out of the region in 1997.

Peanut production and profitability has changed so fast that growers and related agribusiness need to respond immediately to preserve their competitive edge. Participants will hear from a variety of experts, then break out into concurrent groups to design ways to maintain stability and preserve economic viability to the region.

It is not just individual peanut producers who are affected. The cost/price squeeze threatens related agribusiness and the surrounding rural economy.

The workshop is a continuation of a Summit Initiative begun in 1993 with the first-ever Texas Agricultural Summit held in College Station. Contact Davy Vestal at 254-629-1093 by Aug. 10th to register for the Summit Workshop. Lunch will be provided.

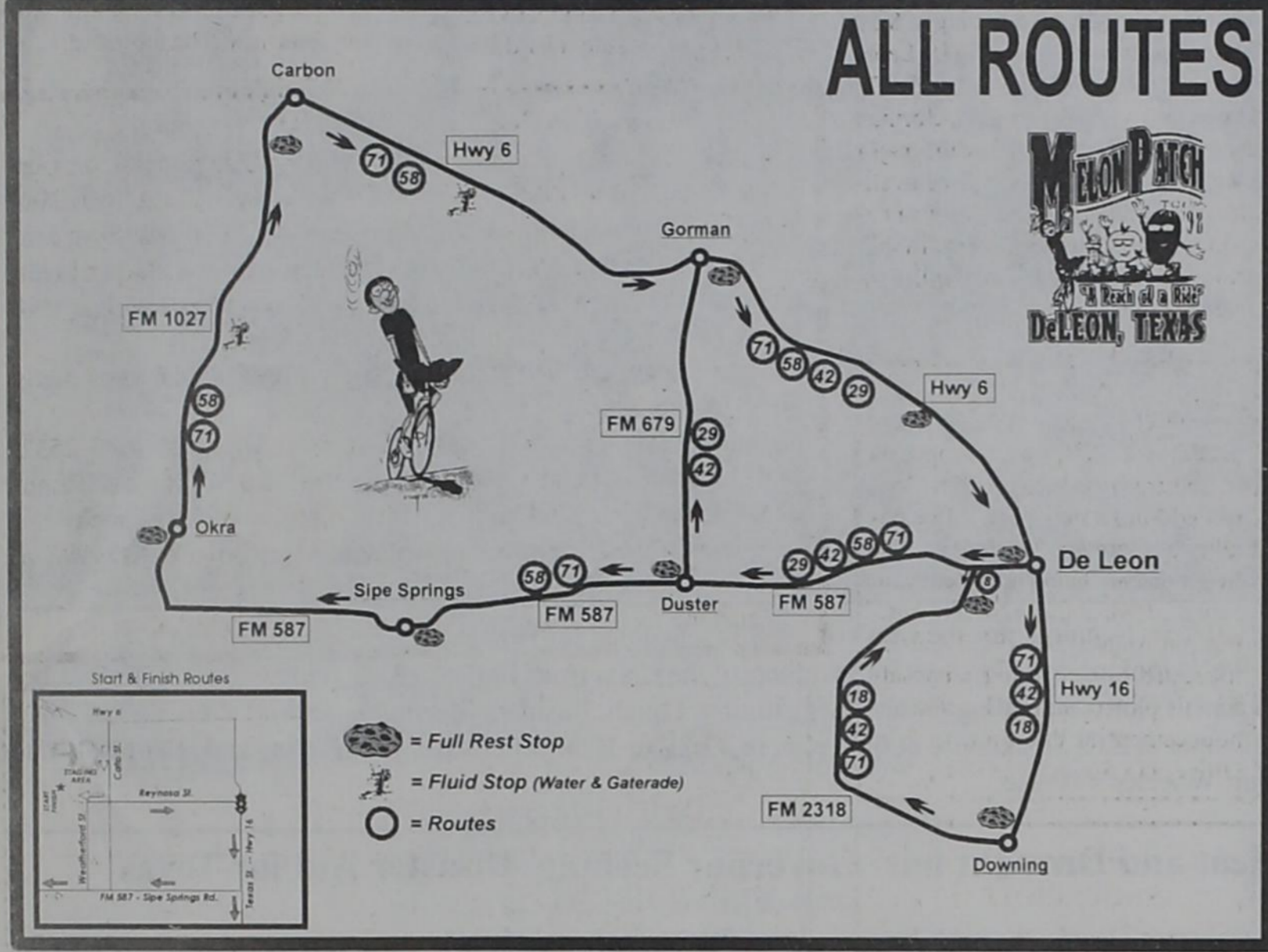

Sharing With Brother Bob

Brother Bob is still out of town. I'm filling in for him--Bob's kid sister--Jackie O'Neal.

One of the best summer activities on our grandparents' farm in Iowa was riding their Shetland ponies. Grandma had named them after spices--Ginger, Nutmeg, Cinnamon and Sugar. I'm sure there were others, but their names escape me. I've asked my brothers and sister, but they cannot remember the other names either.

Ginger was the best pony. She seemed to be the easiest to ride, and she like to go fast. I enjoyed riding her in the lower front drive where she would quickly run laps. Another mark in her favor was that she had a new colt almost every year. Seeing colts and petting them was an exciting part of visiting Iowa.

One year, while riding Ginger around the farm, she tried to clothes-line me on an electric fence that had been put up out of the way. I might have gotten hurt, but I leaned backwards just in time. I fell off her back, embarrassed but unharmed. As the saying says, I got back on after falling off and continued to ride.

We also rode the colts as they got old enough. Since they had not been ridden much, they were harder to ride. We rode them anyway. However, they were tricky and would rub us up against a fence in a heartbeat to try to get us off their backs and onto our behinds.

Once while riding one of the younger ponies, he rolled while I was still on his back. I was fine, but Grandpa saw what happened and really let him have it. Using his worst expletive--ornery sucker--he severely scolded that pony.

Again, I got back on and continued to ride. If I hadn't, my male cousins (and my brothers) would never have let me forget it.

I remember that one pony was born blind, but Grandpa and Grandma loved him anyway. Since Grandpa did not feel that it was his place to say when the pony should die, he did not have the pony put down. Grandpa let God take care of things like that. One day we found the blind pony in a grove of trees by the pond. It was one of the most beautiful spots on the farm. The blind pony had run into a sharp branch and had been killed instantly. God had taken him. Although Grandpa hated to lose animals, he understood that was a part of raising them. Life and death were natural things on the farm.

Gorman ISD Dress Code

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards, and teach respect for authority.

The District prohibits any clothing or grooming that in the principal's judgement causes undue attention. The District prohibits pictures, emblems, or writings that are lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene or that advertise or depict tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited under policy FNCF (L). Students may wear shorts that are an appropriate length and loose fitting. Clothing may not have holes cut in them. Jeans with the knees worn out are not appropriate school attire. Tank tops, halter tops, and muscle shirts are not suitable for school. Boys and girls will not be allowed to wear facial jewelry. Pre-K, K, 1st and 2nd grades have more leverage in the length and style of shorts. For the comfort and ease of play it is advisable for primary level girls to wear shorts under their dresses. The high school standard policy dress code will apply to elementary. Shorts may not be worn from Thanksgiving until Spring Break. Short, bare midriffs are not permitted. Appropriate undergarments should be worn but not exposed. Sunglasses will not be worn in the building. Combs and head covering are not to be worn in the building. Caps are to be left in lockers. Trousers must be worn with the waist at the appropriate level. No sagging or extremely loose trousers will be permitted. Boy's hair shall be trimmed so that no hair is below the collar of a regular style shirt. Hair may be worn over the ear but short enough to expose the earlobe. Mini-skirts are not appropriate; skirts that are slit up the side are not appropriate.

If the principal determines that a student's grooming violates the dress code, the student shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem. If not corrected, further disciplinary action will be taken.

The principal, in cooperation with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extracurricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity. Students who violate these standards may be removed or excluded from the activity for a period determined by the principal or sponsor and may be subject to other disciplinary action.

Heat and Drought has Governor Seeking Disaster Aid for Texas

Governor George W. Bush has asked the federal government to declare all of Texas a drought disaster area. The request would make farmers and ranchers eligible for low interest emergency loans covering all 254 counties in the state. The governor says there is an economic emergency caused by above normal temperatures and severe dry conditions. Economist at Texas A&M University estimate losses have already reached more than 4 billion dollars and will probably go much higher.

The peanut crops in Eastland and surrounding counties are significantly down from previous years. County Extension Agent, Davy Vestal reported the peanut fields he has observed are just dry land fields with the exception of the farmers that utilized irrigation. He stated, "Eastland County has 10,516 acres of peanuts planted this year with 63% of that certified as irrigated. These numbers are down significantly from several years ago, but the potential revenue from peanuts to Ag producer is still in the 6 million dollar range."

Texas Peanut Producer's Board noted conditions for the Cross Timbers area to be hot and dry. The rains have been spotty, therefore there has been no widespread relief from the drought. Peanut farmers who are irrigating are needing rain desperately to support the irrigation water. Doing more damage than the drought are the extremely hot temperatures. It is too hot for the peanut plants to set pods. They noted the peanut acres in the Cross Timbers area have been drastically cut, with most of

those acres being put into grazing for cattle. It seems even the hay crops are looking pretty bad.

If Bush can get the federal government to declare Texas a disaster area, emergency loans may be used to cover expenses incurred to continue farming operations. Loan repayment time is usually one to seven years, but may be up to twenty years for production losses. Those applying must be able to document at least a 30 percent crop loss, according to federal guidelines.

If you now get food stamps or TANF for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$3.40 for lunch and \$3.20 for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or TANF for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or TANF case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not get food stamps or TANF, you must list the names of all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing.

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$30 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or TANF, you must tell the school when you are not getting TANF or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. Free and reduced-price eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health, or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation purposes.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAM, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

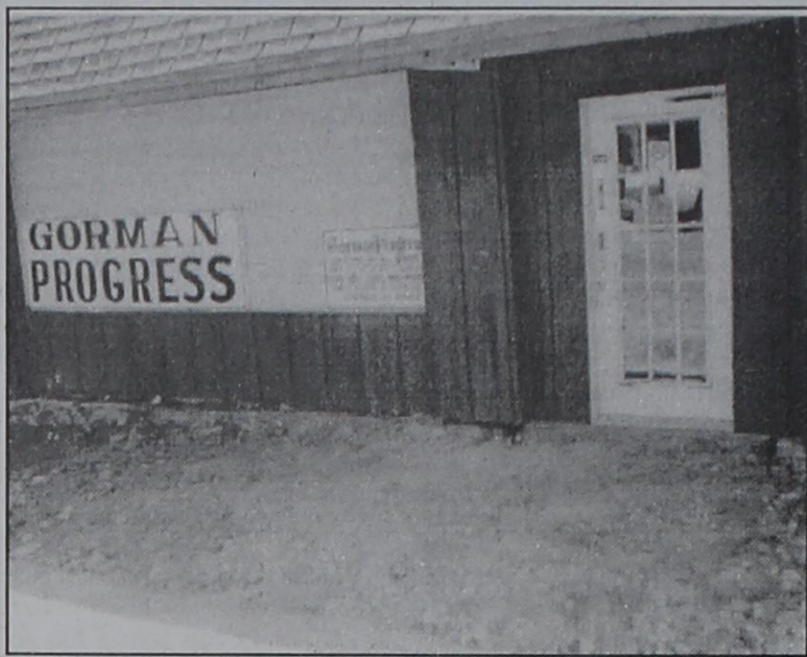
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Street Dance Sidewalk Bandits Hit Again in Gorman

Texas Dairy Fraud

A federal grand jury has indicted 29 people, including dairy farmers and truckers, on charges of scamming a Texas milk processor.

U.S. Attorney Paul Coggins said eight dairy farmers, 20 milk tanker drivers and an employee of the plant added water and salt to raw milk to inflate its weight and increase its value by \$1,225,313 over a three year period.

Coggins said the arrests of the defendants began Monday, July 20th, and will probably continue throughout this week. Most of them live in northeast Texas, where they sold their milk to Associated Milk Producers Inc. in Sulphur Springs.

The indictment says the farmers conspired with milk tanker drivers and paid them to add water and salt to milk collected from their farms. The farmers allegedly made cash payments to the drivers to make false entries.

In an earlier, similar case, five dairy farmers and ten tanker drivers pleaded guilty to charges. Coggins says the investigation is continuing.

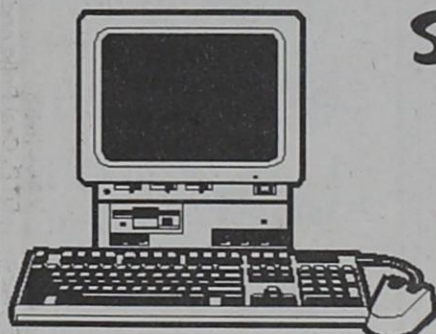
