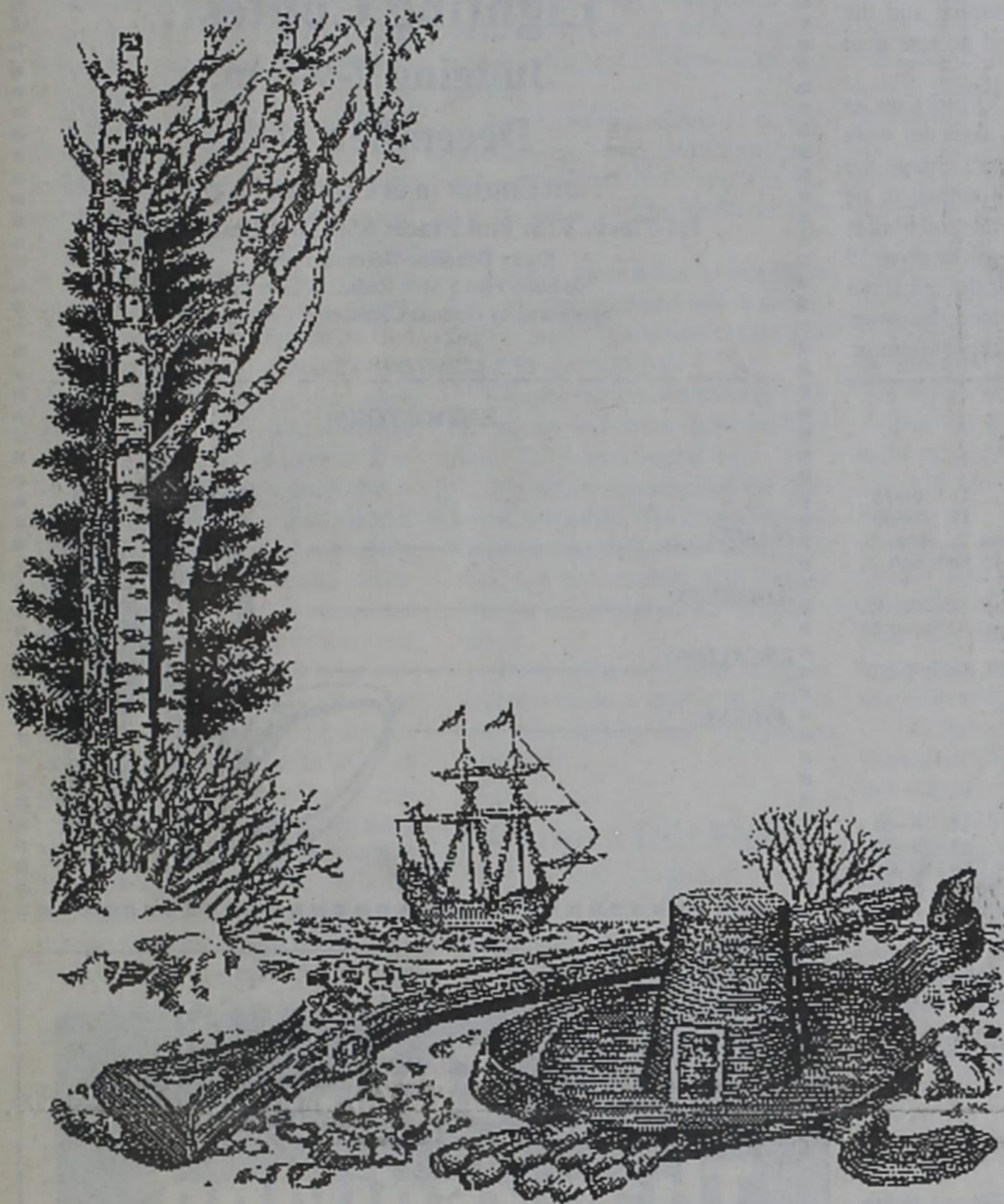

New Amendment to City Ordinance

If the Gorman Animal Control Officer has to pick up an animal more than four times the City ACO will automatically euthanize the animal and the owner will be charged no less than \$12.50.

If the Gorman ACO picks up an animal and the owner does not want the animal, the City will charge the owner \$12.50 for the animal to be euthanized. The City will send a bill to the owner. The owner will be given 10 days to pay the bill. If the bill is not paid within this time frame, the owner will be charged with a failure to appear.

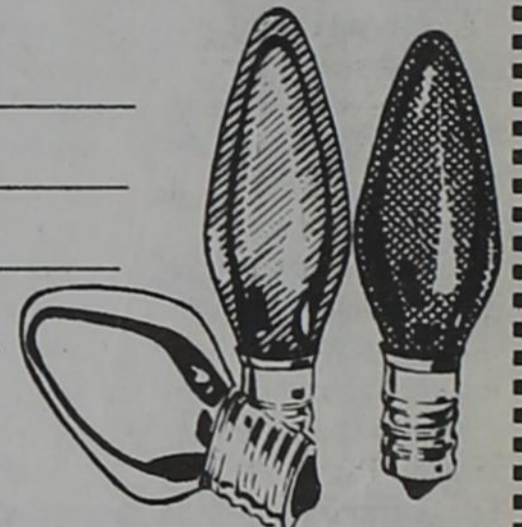

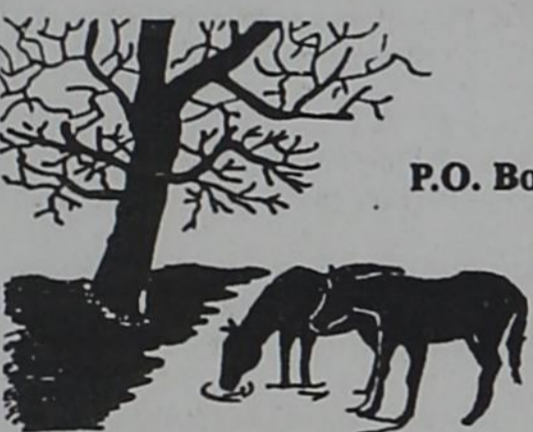

My friends at Heritage Manor and I started our visit last Wednesday talking about the foggy weather we had earlier in the week. It was not too common when they were kids. Veno Hale did remember her and others riding to school in a wagon with a sheet over their heads to keep off the moisture.

Most could remember a "Blue North'er." Like the warning of an eerie green sky before a hail storm, the sky would get a brilliant dark blue and the freezing cold would blow in (from the NW) in a matter of hours. The blue sky warning was just barely in time to let you get hay to the animals and double check the wrappings on water pipes.

It got so cold, people took their baths in a wash tub in the kitchen, in front of the stove. At school, there was a pot bellied stove, usually with a jacket (or fender), and the teacher was responsible for keeping it lit. Know the difference between stove wood and cord wood? Stove wood is about 6" shorter. Cord wood was for the fireplace. Dorris Fowler remembers using coal up around the Strawn area. Velma Bennett remembers a special rake used in cleaning the ashes out of the stove. Ollie Holcomb lived in a house with two fireplaces that shared one chimney. S.D. didn't have much to say, he was taking a nap. Myrtle Hale got cold just remembering and kept wrapping herself deeper into her blanket.

We got to talking about the type clothes worn to school. The ladies remembered wearing long, thick stockings. I asked about pants. That was a "no-no" under any circumstances. Whenever I hear that, I keep looking until I find an exception. Usually there is at least one. Back then, kids (boys and girls) were allowed to wear overalls if that's all their family could afford (and nobody made fun of them except the lowest class). Nobody got shot for their \$100 tennis shoes, either.
