

Dr. C. M. Patterson said on Wednesday night that all cattle in Eastland County should be sprayed very soon.

Spraying cattle now will have three advantages. It will help prevent a screwworm outbreat that is threatening the entire state; it will kill insects that are sprading anaplasmosis; and it will kill cattle lice that usually attack cattle in the fall and winter.

There were 1,431 cases of screw worms reported in Texas during the last two-week period. This compares to only 835 cases during all of 1967. The first faces of screwworms in several years was found in Eastland County last week Screwworms have also been reported in Brown, Callahan, Taylor, Comanche and Coleman counties.


