General Election Tuesday, Nov. 5th.

Voting in the Tuesday, November 5th General Election will be heavy, judging by the interest in the absentee voting in Eastland County.

Johnson Smith, Eastland County Clerk, reported Tuesday that 262 had voted in person or asked for mailed ballots. He estimates that over 7,000 votes will be cast in Eastland County in the Tuesday election.

Absentee voting will end Friday, November 1 at 5:00 p. m. In order to vote, the person must be registered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year, and he should have his registration certificate with him. However, if he has lost his certificate he may vote after making an affidavit of loss.

Mr. Odie Brightwell will serve as election judge for Gorman balloting and clerks will be Dorothy Hatcher, Viola Eaker, Donnie Parker, Glenn Jordan and Frances Simpson.

The election will be held in the Gorman Fire Hall. Polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m.

Carbon Water System Approved

Funds totalling \$130,000 for water loan for the city of Carbon was announced Thursday by Congressman Omar Thurston.

According to information available approximately 450 persons will be serviced in about 100 meter connections in Carbon, with the system in that incorporated city coming from the City of Eastland.

Four Trucks, Hay, and Barn Burned In Carbon Blaze

Three trucks loaded with peanuts, a butane delivery truck and a large barn containing about 2,000 bales of hay were destroyed by fire near Carbon on Tuesday.

Fire departments from Carbon and Eastland answered the call to the Hep Jackson farm three miles south of Carbon.

The fire started while a Chaney Butane truck was supplying the butane system for the peanut drying plant on the farm. It is thought the fire began in one of the dryers and then spread to the trucks loaded with peanuts belonging to Laverne Jackson, brother of Hep Jackson.

Some 2,500 gallons of water were put on the burning hay, but the fire could not be extinguished. The Carbon Fire Department was standing watch late Tuesday evening over the fire, which expected to take two or three days to burn out.




SGT. TIM STACY RETURNS FROM VIETNAM

The drive included two passes, one to Sharp for 45 yards, and one to Jackie Grice for 23 yards. The Panthers had the ball first and ten near the Elk fifteen with only 15 seconds on the clock. Rogers rolled on two quarterback keeper plays but failed to make it out of bounds to stop the clock. He was then thrown for a loss on a pass try, and then hit Johnny Scitern in the end zone with a real vine pass, but Scitern was jarred loose from the ball. When the pulsating drive was over they were still five seconds on the clock, but the Panthers had lost their second district game in three starts.

Doyle Shipman was the leading rusher for the Big Red with 92 yards on 20 trips for a 4.6 average. Johnny Scitern got 51 yards on 10 carries for a 5.1 yard average. Wesley Rogers had 9 yards on 8 tries but his average was hurt when he lost yardage on two pass tries. Mike Duran got 12 yards on 5 carries for a 2.4 average.

The Panthers did a very fine job of stopping the real strong attack of the Elks, especially the running of their 200 pound full-back, who was probably the best back the Panthers have faced this season. A fine tribute to the defensive work was the fact that the Elks did not score from scrimmage, but from a fumble recovery in the end zone and an intercepted pass.

This was a heart-breaker for the Panthers after playing such a fine defensive game with a superb team effort.

The Panthers will host the Lometa Hornets on Friday night at 7:30 on Brogdon Field, which will also be Dad's Night, in which the Panthers will honor their dads. Lometa is a strong team and the Panthers will have to have another all-out effort to take this one. But, with their dads on the sideline, they are expected to have their best game of the season. I do not feel that my opponent is the only elected party candidate, since the people were denied a choice. I have, from the start, had faith in the Democratic System of letting the people decide the issues. And I do hereby LAY MY CASE BEFORE THE PEOPLE, and I will abide by their decision in this General Election. I would like to explain to any who have felt that the issue was closed, that the only issue settled last spring was that I could not have my name printed on the Primary Ticket. IT IS NOT OVER YET, and in the General Election November 5, 1968, you can still "Write In" Truman Kirk for your judge for the 91st District Court and

thus strike a blow for Fairness and Justice in Eastland County.

I am a graduate of Hardin Simmons University and a 1956 graduate of the University of Texas Law School. I have served in the cities of Odessa and Abilene in their City Attorney's offices before going into private law practice. I have practiced law in Cisco and have taught government at Cisco Junior College since July, 1965. I have three children in the Cisco Public


land Elementary Schools. My family and I are members of the First Baptist Church of Cisco. I have worked consistently for the betterment of Eastland County and have faith in its future.




- NO. 1** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System.
- NO. 2** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).
- NO. 3** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule.
- NO. 4** FOR AGAINST
The Amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsection (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section.
- NO. 5** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year.
- NO. 6** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas.

- NO. 7** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.
- NO. 8** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase.
- NO. 9** FOR AGAINST
The amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas.
- NO. 10** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana.
- NO. 11** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.
- NO. 12** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.
- NO. 13** FOR AGAINST
The Constitutional Amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation.

THE GORDON SPOT

By Dee Gordon,

A total of thirty-five men attended at least one session of the Beef Cattle Short Course held in Eastland October 15, 16 and 17. Fourteen attended all three sessions while about a dozen attended two sessions.

Three Eastland merchants contributed to the short course by providing coffee and donuts. We would like to thank Hanna Hardware and Lumber Co., Eastland Grain and Seed Store, and Perkins Implement Co. for the refreshments.

The short course was held in the Eastland County Farm Bureau meeting room. This was an ideal place for the three night meetings. We are grateful to the Farm Bureau Directors for letting us use the building.

All three speakers covered timely subjects and did a good job of presenting their material.

L. A. Maddox discussed cow efficiency. He said three things are considered when talking about efficiency - cow size, weaning weight of calf and calving percentage. Therefore, the most efficient cow would be a small cow that weaned a heavy calf every year.

Maddox discussed crossbreeding as a method of improving efficiency. He added that crossbreeding is not always the best practice. It has some disadvantages.

Dr. C. M. Patterson said on Wednesday night that all cattle in Eastland County should be sprayed very soon.

Spraying cattle now will have three advantages. It will help prevent a screwworm outbreak that is threatening the entire state; it will kill insects that are spreading anaplasmosis; and it will kill cattle lice that usually attack cattle in the fall and winter.

There were 1,431 cases of screw worms reported in Texas during the last two-week period. This compares to only 835 cases during all of 1967. The first faces of screwworms in several years was found in Eastland County last week. Screwworms have also been reported in Brown, Callahan, Taylor, Comanche and Coleman counties.

Producers are advised to hold off on all animal surgery until cold weather arrives, to search for an treat all animal wounds and spray all cattle.

Ule Thompson discussed beef cattle feeding on the final night of the short course. He suggested a feed ration of 80 percent ground grain sorghum, 10 per-

cent cotton seed meal and 10 percent salt for stocker calves, that are also grazing small grains or spring pastures. With this ration gain can be put on calves at the cost of about 16c per pound. This mixture is fed free choice. Thompson also discussed feeding urea as a protein supplement. He said cattlemen could cut feed cost by feeding urea.





He may not get the same size headlines as those who are threatening the very foundation of our society, but he'll run until he's ready to drop if it will help defeat an upcoming opponent.


