The Gorman Independent School Board of Trustees met in regular session on Monday evening at 7:00 p. m. in the office of the superintendent. All members of the board were present.

At this meeting the following were elected as members of the faculty for the school year 1969-70: Mrs. Jean Lasater, Mrs. Ruth Higginbottom, Mrs. Esther Bolt, Mrs. Annie Mae Wright, Mr. Joe O'Neal, Mrs. Nedra Green, Mrs. Rowena Wilson, Miss Ragan, Mr. Pat Crawford, and Mr. Bo Caraway. Others elected earlier or under contract are Mr. Garrett, superintendent, Mr. Bettis, high school principal, Mr. Patterson, elementary school principal, Mr. Joe Neill, and Mrs. Patterson. Other faculty members will be elected at a later date.

Other personnel elected at the meeting were Mr. Jack Harrison, Mr. Walter Steele, Mrs. Bernice Gregg, Mrs. Velma Grady, Mrs. Wynell Brown, and Mrs. Louise Rankin. Bus drivers will be elected later after bus routes are determined.

Three members of the current faculty are retiring at the end of the present school term. Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Bramlett, who have been teaching in the Texas Public Schools for 39 years, 22 of these years have been spent in the Gorman School system. Mrs. Dorothy Brewer has been teaching for 44 years with 9 of these in Gorman. These members of the faculty will be missed, but I wish them many years of happiness after serving the Texas Public Schools for so long. These three teachers have a total of 122 years of service. Best wishes to all of you in the years ahead.

Other business transacted at the meeting Monday was the adoption of a policy banning money raising projects through the public schools except those sponsored by and used for school projects. No outside organization will be permitted to sell or sponsor a sale through the school for any purpose unless proceeds go to some school organization. Some parents are concerned about students leaving the grounds during the noon hour and in many cases they were not aware of it. A policy was adopted which states that students leaving the grounds during the noon period must have on file with their principal, a note signed by the parent giving the student permission to go home for lunch or to eat in town. Students who do not have such notes on file will be expected to be on the grounds during the noon period unless they have permission from school personnel to leave. These forms will be sent to all parents in the near future.

Gorman teachers attended the District 14 TSTA meeting in Abilene on Friday of last week. This was a very good meeting and was enjoyed by all. The meeting next spring will be in Snyder.

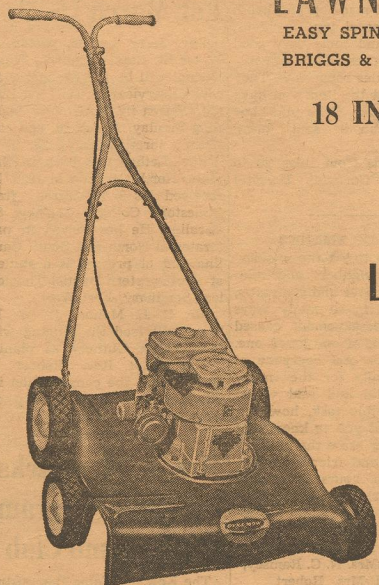

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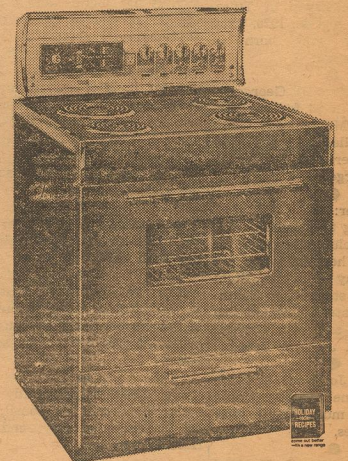

They have also called for legislation for the purpose of the "re-allocation of national resources" to the "poor and powerless."

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IT IS ALMOST AXIOMATIC THAT ONE INVITES controversy when discussing religion or religious institutions unless in the confines of his own. It may, however, be acceptable to consider what appears to be non-religious aspects of an organization related to many of our churches.

DR. J. LESTER MCGEE OF CENTENARY UNITED METHODIST CHURCH of St. Louis feels that words from some pulpits and some religious teachings outside doctrine is partly responsible for riots and disorders.

AS DR. MCGEE IS QUOTED: "WE ARE SEEKING TO REFORM the World rather than to convert the individual person. No, I don't think we are trying to reform the World, we are just doing our best to conform to the World. Many preachers have been finding of late that the gods of big Government, civil disobedience and the 'new morality' have feet of clay. Meanwhile, the moral fabric of our society has been torn asunder and a secularized church is baffled before the evils of our time."

DR. ARTHUR S. FLEMING, COUNCIL PRESIDENT, has labeled "police repression of social dissent" as "pagan." The policy line of the Council is "voluntary compliance" with those laws which are "just and equitably enforced"—an individual should obey only those laws which he favors. This line is followed up with one which would permit draftees to seek "exemption from a particular war" and that there should be no requirement of proof that objection to serving in the Armed Forces be based on any religious belief.

EVIDENTLY THE COUNCIL IS SUBSTANTIALLY FINANCED from outside its affiliated churches.

OBSERVERS CONCLUDE THAT IT ESPOUSES CAUSES of the liberal left much louder and more effectively than that of the church bodies it supposedly represents.

THE COUNCIL IS ONLY ONE OF A MULTITUDE OF ORGANIZATIONS representing a philosophy—a point of view—

ACTIVE LOBBY IN WASHINGTON and exerts its pressures on Congress for big increases in programs which have failed to reach goals to any appreciable degree intended. The Council has recommended huge increases in foreign aid spending, most of which they would channel through agencies of the United Nations. Incidentally, it is the agency offshoots of the United Nations which have blurred and distorted its original intent of keeping World peace. Many of these organizations within the United Nations are like barnacles on the ship of good intent.

THE COUNCIL FAVORS ADMITTING RED CHINA INTO THE UNITED NATIONS and would reduce and weaken United States military strength in areas near communist China. At the same time they recommend "an increase in and tightening of economic sanctions and political pressures" against little Rhodesia who is trying to mind its own business.

THE NATIONAL COUNCIL THROUGH ITS "YOUTH MINISTRY" seems to take pride that they were at the Democratic Convention in Chicago and took part in the riots. In explaining their presence they say they assumed a new role - "not as an observer or a reconciler or even a 'presence' but one who identifies with and joins the cause." The Kerner Commission, in a mild reform that the Council, found that "white racism" was a major factor in recent city riots. The Council goes further. They contend that white racism and white resistance to black attempts to gain power "are the foremost cause of the 'crisis' in our Nation." The group supported the so-called "Poor Peoples March" on Washington last year.

If we, as citizens, dislike Federal legislation produced under these pressures, it is an indication we have lost control, by default, of the institutions we support. To whatever organization we belong, participation is necessary if we expect to shape and influence its policies.

Joe Burkett, Jr. Named To LCB

AUSTIN — Joe Burkett, Jr., son of Mrs. Fanny Burkett of Gorman, a native of Eastland and a former Kerrville legislator, was named Wednesday to the Liquor Control Board.

Burkett, 36, will complete the term of O. R. Crawford of Jasper, whose term extends to November 14. The appointment by Gov. Preston Smith is subject to Senate confirmation.

Burkett had five terms in the House between 1951 and 1961. Born in Eastland, Burkett attended schools there until the family moved to San Antonio in 1928. He finished High School at Peacock Military College and attended Texas Tech one year before taking his law degree from Cumberland University in Tennessee in 1933.

He was admitted to the bar in 1934 and served Kerrville four years as justice of the peace, five years as county attorney and one year as county judge before winning a special election and moving on to the Legislature in 1951.

Burkett lost the 1959 speaker's race 75-74 to Waggoner Carr, who was seeking a second term. It was one of the closest speaker races in many years.

A native of Eastland, Burkett formerly was justice of the peace, county attorney and county judge in Kerr County and was U. S. Commissioner for the Western District of Texas for two years.

Burkett was chairman of the House Insurance Committee of the 54th legislature that rewrote the major portions of the Texas Insurance Code. He was chairman of a special House investigating committee that conducted a statewide veterans land probe in the mid-1950s.

Smith also reappointed Lawrence R. Melton, Dallas, as chairman of the Governor's Committee for Employment of the Handicapped.
