AN OPEN LETTER

Mr. Baker:
I have watched with increasing interest the numerous letters that have graced the front page of the "Gorman Progress" concerning the formation of a Hospital District. I respect each one opinion and am thankful I live in such a country that we may write to the editor of our paper and voice our opinion without fear of jail or worse.

I think Gorman, Carbon and Desdemona have some of the best people on earth living in and around them and this includes the farmers in between that are the back bone of our economy. I have the utmost faith in their decision on this problem that it will be with due consideration and an effort to do that which is best for all of us.

Yes, we in Gorman are asking for help, but not without some promise of it also helping others. We agree that a hospital is desperately needed. Some of our best people have spent hours of their valuable time trying to look into this thing thoroughly and to work the problem out the best possible way for all concerned. They have received no compensation whatsoever, and I'm sure at times wondered if their time has been wasted because of adverse criticism. They are not beyond mistakes and have asked many times for suggestions and ideas to help them. The actions taken have been in their belief to be the best available at this time.

It has been stated many times that all contributions deposited in the "City of Gorman Hospital Fund" will be returned to the depositor if the new hospital is not constructed. All raffle, coffee, and other small donations that could not be reasonably returned are being used to get medicare reinstated under present conditions, legal fees, and other necessary expenses in the effort to solve this tremendous problem.

The small dairy farmer, egg producer, and other small businesses are being forced to consolidate, incorporate, or go out of business. This same pressure is working on hospitals. Possibly someone could back their own hospital and make it pay here, but at the moment Gorman has no one willing to do this. The next best solution seems to be one owned by the district, operated by a board (who will be elected by the taxpayers and represent all portions of the district), and backed by the people themselves. Which taxpayers seems to be the issue everyone is so upset over. This is something each of us will have a vote on. I personally hope deep thought is put into every vote cast no matter which way you vote.

By reading the papers more thoroughly recently I found that many places are using the hospital district method to solve their problems. Don't take my word for it, write your state representative, ask him how many districts were formed last year; how much area they include, and if it seems to be working for these people.

We, in Gorman appreciate every bit of business we get from all of you people, we enjoy the Desdemona Thanksgiving Suppers, ball tournaments, and the Carbon basketball tournaments, and are looking forward to enjoying them with you in the future. We would very much like to say No Thank You, we don't need your taxes, but if we continue to pursue the course we have set this would not be true. We do need you, and your taxes, and we would return for your interest, deep appreciation, 24 hour medical care, good doctors ready to serve you, day or night, clean, efficient, up to date equipment for use in diagnosing and treating most sicknesses and accidents, available to specialists

who could come to us; saving the patients' strength and great expense on the part of the family having to move them to some city with better facilities. Our nursing home could remain in operation and we could keep our beloved older people here at home and still run by and see them every once in a while.

Yes, I am prejudiced; because this hospital being here has saved the lives of two of my own family. They would probably have died enroute to one further than 10 minutes away. Even seconds sometimes means the difference in life or death.

Dr. Rodgers is widely known as one of the best doctors in the state of Texas. Dr. Foster is brilliant, dedicated, and highly respected as one of the best by people in his own profession. If we make available to them the very best in equipment, they will be able to do a better job for us and will take a personal interest in getting others to join their staff that are equally dedicated and care for us as people, not as a chart or number, as may be the case in our larger cities.

It is pretty well established that the taxes to make this possible will run each year from \$3.00 on the older, smaller homes to less than \$50. on a \$30,000 home with approximately 80 acres of land. It is also believed (by those who have studied many hospitals similar to the one proposed for us) that the tax would only be imposed for a few years, possibly only two. Only some experience with this particular district will tell us exactly how much will be needed and for how long. Is it worth all the hard feelings that seem to have stemmed from this for only a few cents a month?

Are you willing to gamble that you or one of your family will not be that accident victim against 1c to 13c a day for a couple of years?

It is every intention that the hospital be able to pay it's own way entirely, but in order to obtain the kind of backing we need, we must be able to show that in a pinch we can come up with some help for it.

Thank you for reading this and it is my sincere prayer that each of you will consider the pros and cons of the issue and vote your belief at the proper time.

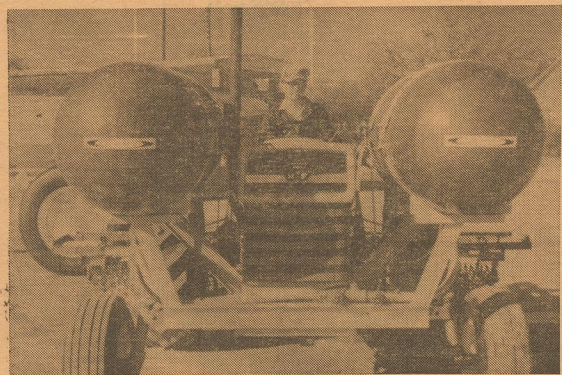

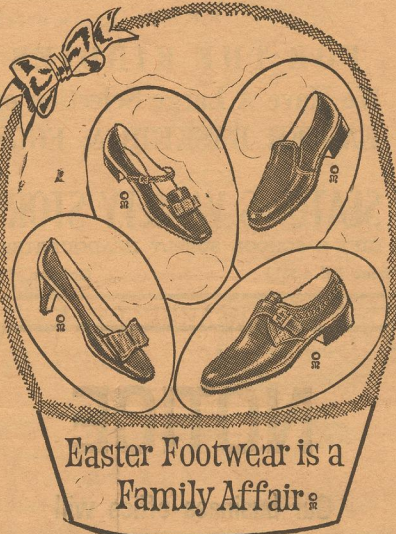
