\$200,000 Feed Mill To Be Constructed Here In January

Final plans are being completed for the construction of the Gorman Milling Company, Inc.

A portion of the plant was built in the early fall and construction to complete the \$200,000 plant will begin around the first of January, according to Mr. Harold Fritz of Stephenville, secretary and treasurer of the corporation, and general manager of the plant. Other members of the corporation are Jim Weatherby of Comanche, president, and Daryl Nay of Waxahachie, vice-president.

In giving the size of the plant, Fritz stated it would be to process a hundred tons a day of all types of livestock feed, and will employ approximately 16 people.

The hull processing plant, which has been in operation all this fall, serves a seven state radius and the feed mill plant will be serving the farmers and ranchers in a 25 mile radius of Gorman.

This is one of the best industries to come to Gorman in quite some time. The Gorman Industrial Foundation, as well as the men forming the corporation, are to be commended for getting this business located in Gorman.

Christmas Lighting Contest Rules Set

The Gorman Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the Residential Christmas Lighting Contest, urges everyone to get their entries in as soon as possible.

Keep in mind that you do not have to have an elaborate display to win. It's what you do with what you have that wins. The following is a guide in awarding points in the named categories.

ARTISTIC MERIT - up to 30 points — Design; composition and arrangement of elements; and the color scheme.

LIGHTING TECHNIQUES - up to 30 points — Use of regular Christmas lights; use of spot and flood lights; use of other lights such as fluorescent, reflector color lights, etc.

ORIGINALITY - up to 20 pts. — New lighting ideas or effects; new ways of using standard devices such as candles, wreaths, luminous plaques, etc.

INGENUITY - up to 20 pts. — In using structure of house; in using surroundings to advantage. Using this guide, the maximum number of points attainable for one display is 100.

Texas Electric employees are not eligible to receive the first place prize award. However, they are eligible to receive the second and third place prizes.

Deadline for entering the contest is noon December 18th. Your entry must be lighted from 6:30 to 10 p. m. each night from December 18 through December 25. Entry blanks may be picked up at the Texas Electric Office, the Chamber of Commerce office and the Gorman Progress. Lighting suggestion booklets are also available at these offices.

First prize will be a Reddy Light given by the Texas Electric Service Company. Second prize will be \$15.00, and third place winner will receive \$10.00.

County Pecan Show Slated Friday and Saturday - Es'land

Pecans and pecan baked goods will be on display in the Eastland County courthouse Friday and Saturday, December 12 and 13th. The event will be the seventeenth annual Eastland County Pecan Show sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

Ben McKinnis, Chamber of Commerce chairman for the event, says visitors will see some of the best quality pecans in Texas as well as prize pecan pies, cakes, candies, nut bread and cookies. A third feature will be a display of centerpieces using pecans in various forms.

In-shell pecans as well as baked goods will be sold at the pecan show, reports Anton White, president of the pecan growers association. The Home Demonstration members will operate a concession where coffee and pecan food will be sold.

White estimates that about 160 entries of top quality pecans representing over 40 different varieties will be on display. Each entry consists of at least 40 pecans. They must have been grown in 1969 by the person entering the pecans in the show. All entries of pecans must be entered by noon on Friday. Ribbons will be given to the top three places of each variety. Plaques will be awarded to the exhibitor of the champion shelling pecan, the champion in-shell pecan, the champion native pecan and the

overall Grand Champion pecan entry of the show.

Top place entries in all varieties will be entered in the regional pecan show at Waco on January 8th and 9th.

The bake show and centerpiece arrangement division will be supervised by the County Home Demonstration Council. These entries are due on Friday, December 12th at 11 a. m. in the courthouse lobby when judging will begin.

The divisions in the bake show are pies, cakes, candy, nut bread, and cookies. All of which must feature pecans as part of the ingredients. The top three places will be awarded ribbons and prize money. Any adult or youth of Eastland County is eligible to enter.

The centerpiece arrangements must be composed with some part of the pecan tree such as leaves, wood or nuts. Prize money and ribbons are awarded to the top three places in this division.

Judging for the pecan show will be done Friday afternoon by Blueford Hancock, Extension Horticulturist of Texas A&M University, and L. D. Romberg of Brownwood, world known pecan scientist, who developed many of the top varieties grown in this area such as Barton, Mohawk, Comanche, Sioux, Choctaw, Wichita, Apache and Shawnee.

The best time to see the exhibits, according to the officials, is Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.

The new pecan queen, the runner-up, and the 1969 pecan queen will be honored at the queen's luncheon Saturday at the White Elephant Restaurant in Eastland.
