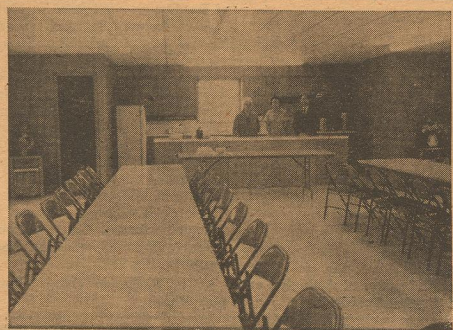
Mrs. Rayne Baze of Eastland has joined the tonsil club and also entered her son in the birth club.

Ticket Sales Brisk For Hospital Bn'fit Banquet April 4

Gorman civic clubs and business organizations are engaged in a campaign of selling tickets for the April 4 banquet to be held at 7:00 p. m. at the school gymnasium. The featured speaker for this event will be U. S. Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson. All proceeds from ticket sales will be placed in the local hospital fund.

Congressman Burleson is currently leading an effort among the Texas Congressional delegation to alleviate some of the hardships being experienced by small rural hospitals due to tighter requirements under the Medicare program. He is also working directly with the Blackwell Hospital and Clinic in assisting it in working out current problems to enable the continuation of the local hospital as a provider of Medicare services of local interest. Also, Mr. Burleson is the House member of the peanut bill recently introduced to provide for extension of the act authorizing the sale and lease of peanut allotments within counties.

Bill Parr is directing the sale of banquet tickets through the various clubs and business organizations in the community. Bob Green is in charge of program arrangements as well as entertainment. Mr. Jack Brown, president, and other members of the Lions Club are responsible for banquet seating arrangements.

Decorations will be provided through the cooperation of Mrs. John Brinegar, president, and other members of the Young Homemakers Club. This club is also making arrangements for caring for children of parents attending the banquet. Provisions will be made to entertain the children in the Home Economics Cottage.

Another highlight of the program will be the presentation of the award to The Outstanding Gorman Area Farmer for 1968. A committee composed of Tom Birdsong, Jack Brown and Charles Duran will select the recipient of this award. An attractive banquet meal will be catered by Underwoods of Brownwood. It is reported that banquet tickets are selling at a brisk pace. A large crowd of local and area folks is expected to be on hand to greet Congressman Omar Burleson and to help raise funds so badly needed for this important project.

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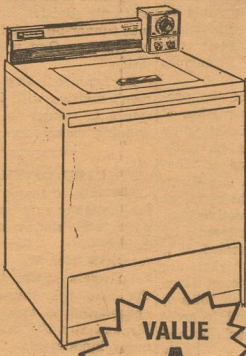


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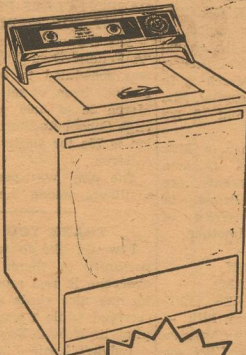

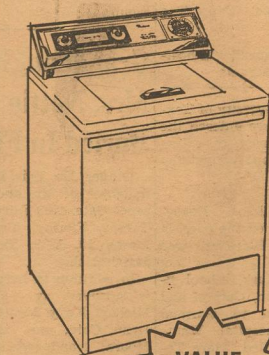
