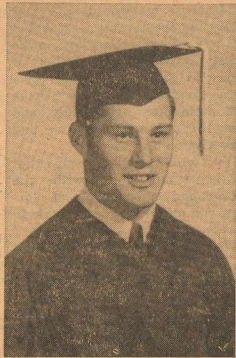

Valedictorian '69



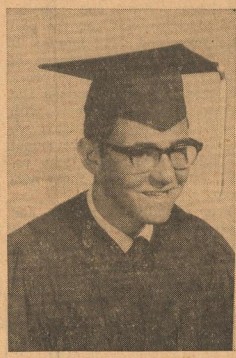
DOYLE SHIPMAN

We would, if we didn't we would be infringing on someone's rights.

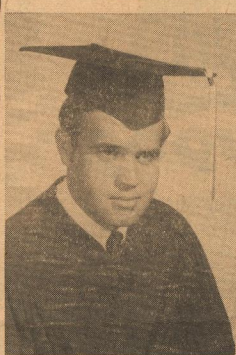

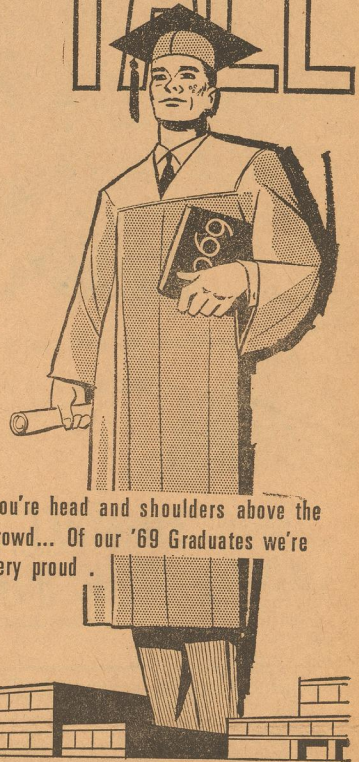
A Play School will be conducted by the Gorman Homemaking students during the week of June 2-6. The school will meet from

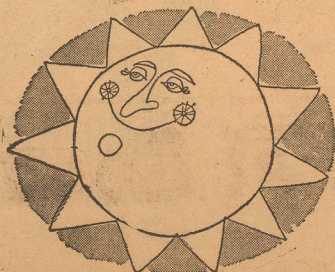

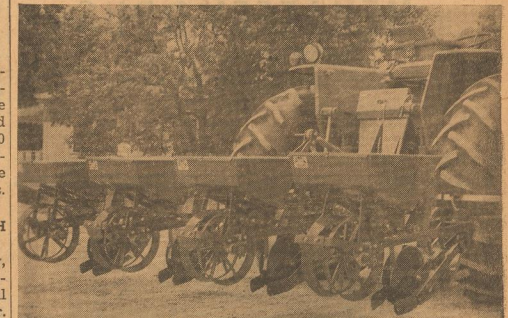
Time To Spray Pecan Trees For Nut Casebearers

Pecan trees in this area should be sprayed during the period of May 28 through 31st, according to DeMarquis Gordon, the Eastland County agricultural agent. The purpose of the spray is to control the pecan nut casebearer, the most destructive insect of the pecan. The development of the casebearer is later this year than usual. The correct timing of the spray application is most important since the insecticide must be on the tree when the young larvae are hatching and before they can enter the small pecans.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Know Your School

Have you noticed that the cost of living is going up? I am sure that you have. I have certainly noticed it in the operation of the Gorman Schools as well as all other schools in the nation. Everything that we buy, both service and equipment, are costing more each year.

As most of you are aware, the Gorman Public Schools had been operating in the red for a number of years prior to 1963. In that year you voted a bond to make some much needed improvement and went through a complete re-evaluation program in the local tax structure. This eased the situation gradually, but at the beginning of the school year of 1965-66 the school had outstanding local debts of around \$9,000 and an athletic debt of \$5,000. By watching expenditures and making adjustments where possible this outstanding indebtedness has been paid since that time. This has been done without a tax increase except by

making adjustments where needed. With these adjustments and with new property added, the district has been able to operate in the black with all local bills paid to date.

With Federal Funds from Title I, II, III, and V, many thousands of dollars worth of equipment has been purchased during the last four years. In addition to the equipment, one extra teacher has been hired each of the last three years to work with the disadvantaged children in the school. The equipment and supplies purchased have greatly improved the ability of teachers to teach by the use of such materials. Most of the equipment has been in the field of library and audio-visual materials. The school had no audio-visual equipment four years ago but since that time tape recorders, copying machines, record players, 16 mm film projectors, 35 mm film strip projectors, typewriters, and filing cabinets have been added. These, along with teaching materials have helped to provide a better program for your children.

During the last two years a number of the teachers have attended workshops and short courses to improve their teaching

and to help keep abreast with modern educational trends. Every effort possible is being made to secure qualified teachers and to encourage them to keep abreast of modern trends. To secure qualified teachers and hold them, it is going to take better salaries and better teaching conditions. To pay these salaries and keep the teachers supplied with needed materials and equipment it is going to take more money on the local level.

There is legislation in Austin at this time to give teachers a well earned salary increase. The outcome of this legislation is not known at this time, but there is no doubt but there will be a salary raise each of the next two years. Since the local district is required to match state funds for salaries on about a 16 percent level at this time, this means that each of these two years the local district will have to have more money for salaries if for no other reason. In addition to the salary increases it becomes necessary to have additional teachers above the number allowed by the state in order to meet the demands for new sub-

jects. During the last three years three new courses have been added to the high school. Three courses require an additional half time teacher. During the last three years the district has employed one extra teacher either on half time or full time each year. This must continue if we are to keep up with the demand. We would like to add high school trig this year.

In addition to the regular academic work in the schools a well rounded program of extra-curricular activities is offered. Currently the school has a program in football, basketball, track, band, stage band, and is now taking part in many UIL academic contests. This year we had entries in typing, shorthand, poetry reading, poetry interpretation, science, ready writing, and one-act play. I feel that these activities are real important in the school. A course of driver education is also offered as well as special events in both vocational homemaking and agriculture. In order to offer these activities it takes more money for materials and supplies. I hope that these areas may be broadened within the next few years.

During the last year it has been necessary to put a new roof on the elementary school and other roofs must be replaced this year with other repairs to be made. During the last three years much painting and repairs have been made, including the painting of the bus barn, the interior of all rooms in elementary school, and the gym. Also, as you know, the new lunchroom was constructed last summer and fall which is a great asset to the school and community. This was built without voting bonds by making arrangements with the local bank to finance the amount that would be necessary. At present no money has been borrowed for this building, but it will take a loan of possibly \$15,000 to \$16,000 before the last of August to finance this project. This amount is about one half of the cost of construction.

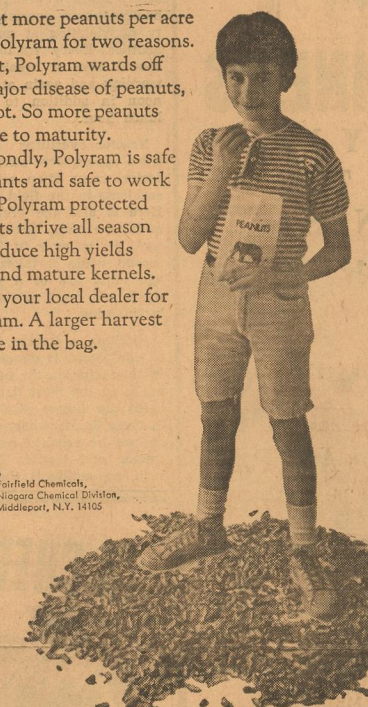
Where will money come from to continue to operate and meet additional costs? You and I are aware that there is only one source of money to operate a school and that is taxes. The point has been reached where some adjustments must be made in total taxes. Currently we have an amount of \$3,070,000 of taxable property on the tax rolls with a current rate of \$1.90. The rate is divided \$1.50 for local operations and \$40 for bonded indebtedness. Based upon a 95 percent collection, which is about normal, this year the amount for local operations will be about \$43,750 and for bonds about \$11,660. To meet operation costs next year it will take about \$5,000 more than it will take for the current year in local.

In order to get this amount it will take about a 10 percent or 11 percent increase in local money, but no additional money is needed to meet bond payments. With an increase of 10-11 percent in taxable value the bond rate can be cut to \$.31 at least or maybe to \$.30. With this cut the total tax rate would be \$1.81 or maybe \$1.80. This would be a 9 cent or 10 cent reduction in rates. With an 11 percent increase and a reduction of the rate to \$1.81 would be a total of 5.8 percent increase. Here is an example of how the change would affect taxes. A person now paying on property valued at \$1,000 for tax purposes is paying \$19.00 with the current rate of \$1.90. With an 11 percent increase the property would be taxed for a value of \$1,110 at a rate of \$1.81, which would be \$20.10 in taxes or an increase of \$1.10 per year for each \$1,000 of taxable property. This figures 5.8 percent. The increase is less than 10 cents per month or the cost of a cold drink or a cup of coffee. Surely no one would complain spending 10 cents more per month to support the educational program. The Board discussed the tax problem at length and presents a possible solution as outlined here. They will be taking action soon as to what will have to be done about the taxes. I hope that you will understand and cooperate with your Board in making whatever adjustments that must be made.

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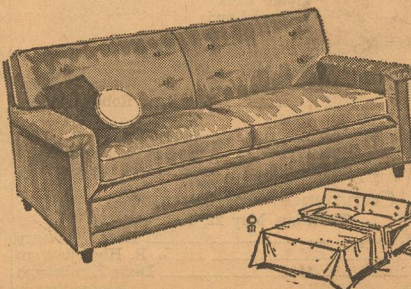
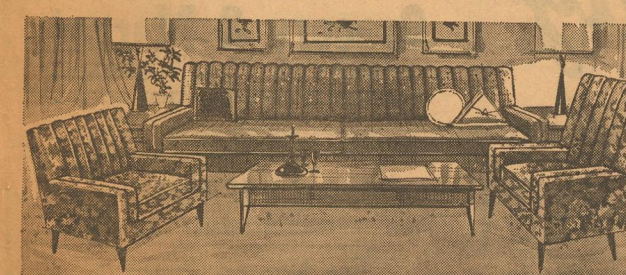
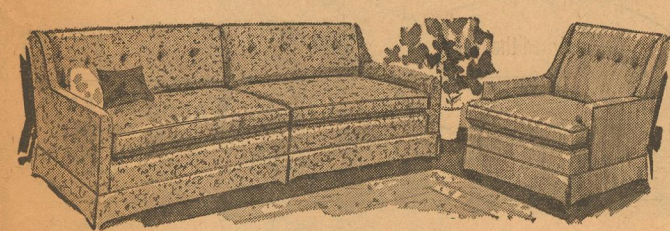

FARM SAFETY WEEK CLIMAXED WITH TRACTOR DEMONSTRATION

"Tractor accidents don't just happen they are caused," Joe Smetana, safety director of the Texas Farm Bureau, pointed out Friday at the Gorman FFA Chapter.

During the 45-minute program Smetana pointed out a variety of safety rules in which all tractor and machinery operators are guilty of violating at one time or another. Every tractor operator should take a break at mid-morning and again at mid-afternoon in addition to a regular lunch hour.

Tractor overturns and rearward upsets were stressed as the factors most often causing fatal accidents in the field or pasture. Here is also the greatest point of false security because a tractor can tip over in 3/10 of a second while it takes the average mind 5/8 of a second to think and react to the situation by jumping.

Hitching a tractor to a piece of equipment is dangerous, also. In this situation the person helping is in the most danger. If he holds the tongue of a trailer up to meet the drawbar and misses, he can be crushed between the tractor and trailer. To prevent such an accident, the operator

Also, the children are run over by tractors each year because the operator, generally their dad, did not see them in time, Smetana said. Keep children away from the working area.

Refueling was a point highly stressed as dangerous. Too many operators get in a hurry to refill and spill gasoline onto a hot engine. Many tractors costing \$8,000 to \$10,000 have been ruined in this manner.

For protection from overturns, the use of a Roll-guard or crush-proof cab was suggested by Bullard. By securing the operator with a seat belt and use of Roll-guard or crush-proof cab, many lives could have been saved.

Proper lighting when on roadways was suggested as a must. In addition to the regular lighting required, the use of the SMV emblem was suggested for identification of the Slow Moving Vehicle.

The Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department hopes to bring these facts to 10,000 or more farm people, or those interested in farming, each year.

The program was brought to the Gorman FFA chapter under the sponsorship of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.
