The following news item may serve to answer some questions that many have raised about campus disorders. It is a very timely, and thought-provoking item, and a lot can be learned from it:

In May of 1919 at Dusseldorf, Germany, the Allied Forces obtained a copy of some of the "Communist Rules for Revolution." Now 50 years later, the Reds are still 'Following the rule.' As you read the list, stop after each item, and think about the present day situation where you live and all around our nation. We quote from the Red Rules:

A. Corrupt the young, and get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial; destroy their ruggedness.

B. Get control of all means of publicity, thereby:

1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays and other trivialities.

2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.

3. Destroy the peoples' faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and obloquy.

4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.

5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.

7. By specious argument cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues, honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledge word, ruggedness.

C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to arms on some pretext, with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless."

That was quite a list, wasn't it? Now, stop and think - how many of those rules are being carried out in this nation today?

City Sales Tax Now In Effect Here

A new one percent city sales tax, approved by voters last February, went into effect in Gorman on Tuesday, July 1st. The new tax added to the current state three percent tax brings the total sales tax on most items to four percent.

The city tax is subject to the same exemptions as the state sales tax. For the convenience of the merchants the Progress has printed and has available a chart of the new tax rate. If you have not already received your chart, you may secure them at the Progress office.

Mayor Wayne Eaves pointed out that it is hard to estimate the revenue that will be raised for the city by the new tax because of the fluctuations of the local spending.

The extra income will go into the general funds to be used for unforseen city expenses and city improvements of various facilities.

The city will not receive the money in its treasury until some time in January. The delay is caused by the time allowed the merchants to report their taxes at the end of the quarter and the time required for the forms to be processed by the state comptroller's office. Gorman will receive its one percent every three months.

SW Peanut Price Support announced At \$245.12 Per Ton

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced average support prices for the 1969 crop peanut varieties based on a national rate of \$247.40 a ton.

The national rates were announced on April 30th. The latest rate scale listed average prices for particular kinds of peanuts. Officials said the new schedule showed a support price range from \$238 a ton for runner types to nearly \$258 for Virginia and Valencia types suitable for roasting.

The department said some of the prices were modified for the first time since 1962 to reflect changes in marketing and production patterns.

The 1969 crop basic price support rates - subject to adjustment later in the crop year, included:

Virginia \$257.41 a ton for 1969 crop compared with \$253.73 last year; runner \$238 and \$227.37; Southeast Spanish \$249.37 and \$245.63; Southwest Spanish \$245.12 and \$236.07; and Valencia \$257.41 and \$253.73.

This is an increase of almost \$9 per ton on the peanut variety grown in the western area in which Eastland, Comanche and Brown counties are located.

This figure compares with a basic support price of \$236.07 per ton on the bumper 1968 crop.

The present good crop prospects are decreasing to some degree suggested by the recent violent weather and heavy rains.



Mary Busching In International Who's Who, Poetry

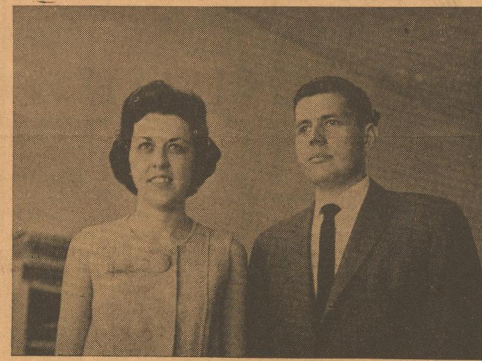


Miss Lana Stacy and Leslie Edward Sharp To Repeat Vows Here July 26

Vows will be exchanged July 26th in the First Baptist Church of Gorman.

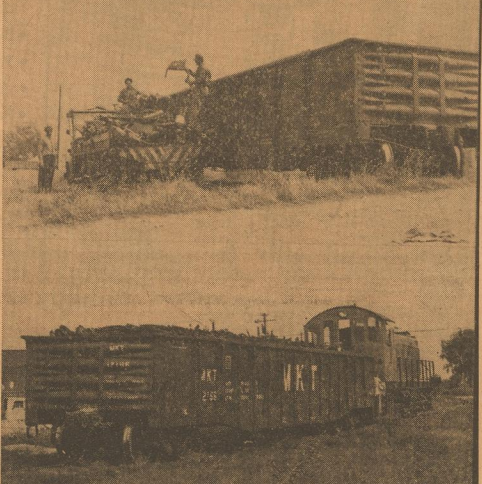


Mr. and Mrs. Charles Prestage Accept Ministry Of Gorman Church of Christ

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

PRECIPITATING our money has never before been based on a psychological factor as it is at the present.

WHATEVER THE CAUSE OF INFLATION, certainly we all know the effects. The experts differ on how to cure it but the medicine, in whatever form, is going to be pretty bitter.

RIGHT NOW THE COST OF LIVING INDEX is soaring at an annual pace of more than 7 1/2 percent. This is in the face of restraints already being taken. Wages are climbing currently at the rate of 7 percent.

EVIDENTLY THE MISSING WEAPON IN THE ARSENAL to battle inflation is something to offset the assumption that the only way for prices to go is up. Until there is conclusive evidence that the Government and business is serious about slowing down the surging economy, inflation will continue to feed on itself.

THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK HAS ALREADY clamped down hard on credit which forces local banks to reduce many loans and outright reject others. Increasing interest rates and the surcharge tax has not had the effect anticipated. Government managers, along with economists and others in the money market, have been asking themselves what went wrong. Many of them conclude that record spending continues because of the feeling that costs will be higher if they wait; the belief that sure markets will be available for all products produced and that the modernizing of plants and equipment to manufacture goods is a defense against future production costs.

THE PSYCHOLOGY OF THE PURCHASING PUBLIC seems to be that they should buy now, borrow now, invest and build, and that to delay would be to pay more later. This has, in large part, made the predictions go wrong.

THERE HAVE BEEN HINTS OF WAGE AND PRICE controls but only a hint and really not anything taken too seriously. Most feel that such controls would only attack the symptoms of inflation and not get at the cure. Voluntary guidelines applied to both business and labor have not been successful in the past.

THE QUESTION HEARD AROUND WASHINGTON and throughout the business community is what can be done to curb continuous price rise without bringing a slump causing widespread joblessness. The Administration has indicated that some higher rate of unemployment than now exists would be acceptable but, of course, a recession to any very great degree would not be favored. This makes it a tricky business in determining that point of acceptance.

THE EXTENSION OF THE SURCHARGE TAX at the present rate of 10 percent to January 1, 1970, and an additional six months thereafter at 5 percent is supposed to balance the budget with over \$6 billion in surplus. A deficit situation only feeds inflation further.

SINCE THIS TAX HAS SEEMINGLY not had the effect expected when imposed in 1968, the repeal of the 7 percent investment credit tax for businesses is calculated to go hand-in-hand as

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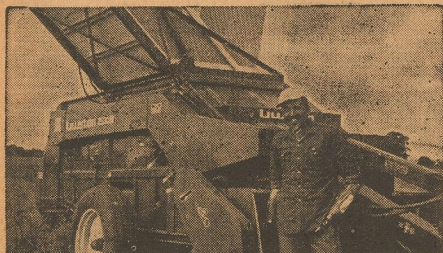
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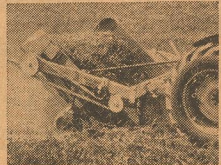
