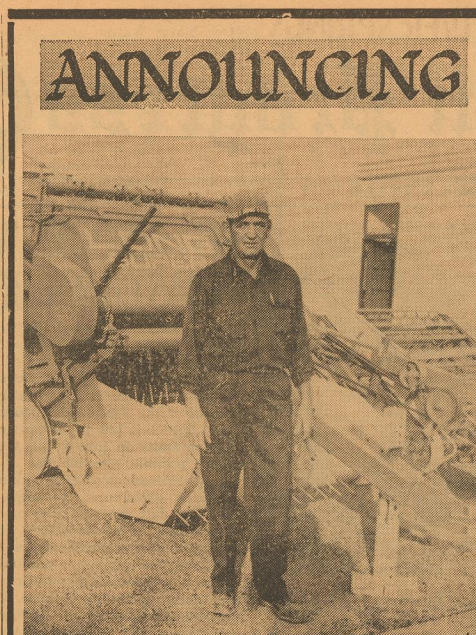

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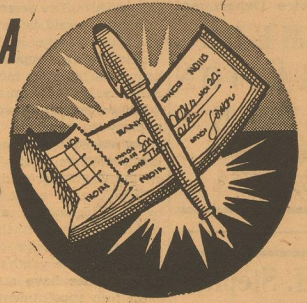

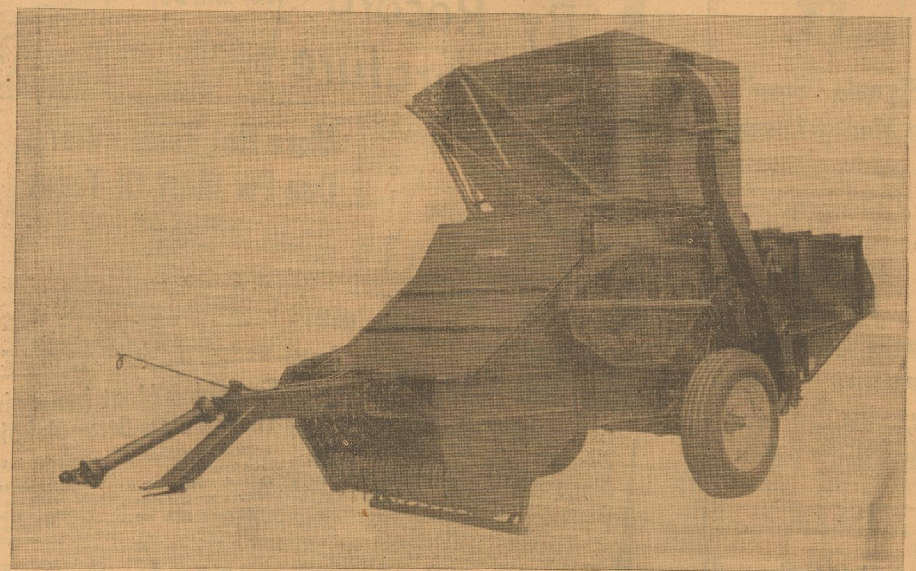


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An article and photo of some of our Supreme Court's proteges are pictured in this week's Progress.

(Austin) State Representative Burke Musgrove, House sponsor of Texas' new dangerous drug laws, publicly rejected this week a challenge to appear before a scheduled Wednesday demonstration of some 500 drug law protesters at the State Capitol. Musgrove and the stiff laws passed by the Legislature have been a target of various drug proponents and publications. The Rag Magazine and other "hippie-type" publications have repeatedly editorialized against existing and proposed drug laws.

Steve Kalish, acting chairman of a newly formed organization called "The Beautiful People's Republic" booked an appointment for 1:00 p. m. Wednesday with Musgrove's office secretary.

Musgrove said he later learned that this group's leaders were "exploiting this appointment and had contacted news media to seek publicity for their cause."

Musgrove said he would not be a party to "a show, apparently being staged by a group of drug law protesters next Wednesday on the Capitol grounds."

"I refuse to assist this group by participating in a publicity seeking rally on the Capitol grounds," Musgrove commented. "I feel that the youths who came to my office have attempted to exploit an appointment that they requested for Wednesday at 1 p. m. After the appointment was arranged, the group's leaders contacted news media in an effort to arrange a public forum for presenting their radical ideas, and are seeking the participation of some 500 to 1,000 youths. I would normally not hesitate to defend the stiff drug laws we have enacted, as well as this whole affair smelly and lacks sincerity on the part of these youths!"

Musgrove said that when the group was protesting in the Capitol Building last week he was "cornered" with questions that he felt were without an understanding of the drug bill and full dangers of many of the drugs in question.

"I gave the group copies of the law and other literature and medical reports and suggested that they at least put on shoes and shirts and come back to my office after they had had a chance to study what they were protesting."

Last week some three dozen sign-carrying youths invaded the Capitol Building, sat down in the middle of the rotunda, sang songs and called for the legalization of LSD and marijuana.

The youths, many of them shirtless and barefoot, sang "Jesus Love Me" and carried signs that said, "It's a turned on generation." "We want action, the time has come to legalize drugs," and "LSD brings you closer to GOD."

Musgrove and several other legislators were later cornered in the halls of the Capitol by some of the youths. Kalish told Representative Forest Harding of San Angelo that he had been using marijuana for two years and so had the other members of the group and none had suffered any ill effects.

Harding said that he did not think "that's a real scientific study" to take the word of a 17 year old who had been using marijuana for two years.

Musgrove told the group that they were not on the correct communicative frequency when they came into the Capitol carrying signs and demonstrating, and he suggested they "clean up before they come back."

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Several sign-carrying youth demonstrators sat down on the State Capitol rotunda floor last week in support of legalizing "Pot" (marijuana) and "acid" (LSD) while other protestors roamed the Capitol halls questioning various legislators. Spokesmen for the drug law protestors have called for another, but much larger demonstration this week.

106-Degree Temperature Scorches City On Friday
 An official 106-degree was recorded at the weather station in Archer City, Friday, July 11, making it the hottest day of the summer, so far, according to Jake Sheppard, official weather man for the city. The advent of summer on June 21, was followed the next day by the first 100-degree reading on the official weather thermometer, and that mark was reached several times, but had failed to go higher until Wednesday of last week, when 104 degrees was recorded, even though Wichita Falls, our neighborly city to the north was the hottest city in the state for the week.

Scorching Heat Maintains West Texas Stranglehold
 Scorching heat maintained its able low tonight in the low to middle 70s. As usual, forecasts held out hope for a few brief showers. Top temperatures Sunday ran as high as 109 degrees at Wichita Falls. The Associated Press reported that temperatures Tuesday ran as high as 108 degrees at Cotulla.

Mercury Keeps On Sizzling
 With the mercury soaring to a century mark at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, climatological data reports Wichita Falls is in more temperatures and the straight day without respite is in sight. A minimum temperature of 81 degrees was recorded Wednesday and Thursday should be around 102.

Temperatures Are Measured in Kilowatt-Hours, Too

That's why nearly everybody has been using more kilowatt-hours this summer... because July, 1969, was the hottest month in this area in recent years, with temperatures of 100 degrees or higher day after day.

This was in sharp contrast especially with July temperatures in 1967 and 1968 when averages were among the lowest on record here.

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
