Range Mang'ment Short Course Slated Sept 10-11, Eastland

Brush control and range management will be the topics discussed at a range management short course in Eastland September 10 and 11. County Agent De Gordon says the two-night short course was planned to help Eastland County livestockmen improve their range land for more profitable production.

Dr. Bobby Joe Ragsdale, Extension Service Range Management Specialist from Texas A&M, will discuss brush control on Wednesday night, September 10. Gordon says brush is one of the ranchers' biggest problems. On Thursday night Dr. Ragsdale will discuss systematic deforestation, stocking rates, and grazing systems.

Each session starts at 8:00 p. m. and will be in the Farm Bureau Building on Highway 80 east of Eastland.

Everyone interested in range management is encouraged to attend the short course.

Know Your School

School is off to a good start. The enrollment as of Monday was 324 as compared with an enrollment of 319 at this same date last year. This is an increase of 1.5 percent over the same date last year and 6 percent increase over the 305 that were enrolled at the close of the year. It is hoped that this enrollment will hold and that attendance will be good. If we can maintain an average daily attendance of 301 we can add an additional teacher. Some changes are being made in bus routes so that better service can be offered and at the same time save some mileage each day on the routes.

The number of students eating in the lunchroom has increased an average of a little more than 26 per day over the same period last year. This is an increase of over 21 percent. Students are urged to eat in the lunchroom where they can get a Type A lunch with milk each day for about the price of a hamburger. An effort is made to serve a good meal and plenty of it each day. I am sure that you hear complaints about the food, but I urge you, if you have doubts about it, to come by and eat with us and see for yourself what kind of lunches are served in the lunchroom.

Work has been in progress this summer in putting a new roof on the vocational ag building and a complete renewal job inside the classroom. The classroom has been repainted inside with a new ceiling. The storage room has been converted into an additional space for shop work for woodwork. Other repainting and repair will be done in the near future. Some new equipment and tools are being added to the shop.

The Gorman School Board in the meeting on Monday adopted the budget for 1969-70 in the amount of \$185,200, which is down from 1968-69 budget of \$196,400. This decrease is not in the amount of local tax money but in a loan of \$10,400 and \$900 from the old building fund plus the balance on hand at the beginning of 1968-69. The new building has been paid for by having to borrow only \$10,400. The amount borrowed was much less than had been anticipated when the building was started. The total operation budget is up from \$150,500 to \$162,100. This increase is mainly due to the salary raise voted by the last legislature.

The vast majority of students and parents are cooperating with the school in the new board policy on dress and grooming. It is the feeling of the administration and the board that unusual dress or grooming among the students is a distracting factor in school. All high school students were given a copy of the new policies on the use of drugs and alcohol as well as on dress and grooming. I urge all parents to read these policies and help us in carrying them out. It is hoped that disciplinary action will not have to be taken.

Gorman hosts Wylie here on Friday at 8 p. m. Everyone is urged to exercise this first game as well as all games this year. Come out and back our team and enjoy an evening with your friends.

Annual De Leon Farm Tour Slated For September 16

The Annual De Leon Farm Tour will be held this year on Tuesday, September 16th. It will start at 9:00 a. m. at the Texas Department of Agriculture Laboratories on Highway 6 in De Leon and end with a luncheon at the Proctor Area Recreation Center at 12:30. The dining room at the club will serve its finest buffet, courtesy of several good business concerns in De Leon. Tours of the Lab will begin at 8:30.

Mr. Clyde Graham, head of the Soil Conservation Service in Texas, will speak briefly at the luncheon. Bob Walsh of WBAP Radio and Television will be the master of ceremonies and several other prominent people in Texas Agriculture are being invited.

Comments on a part of the tour will be broadcast from the lead car over Radio Station KCOM in Comanche, and may be heard by the tour members on their own car radios as they pass by the object of discussion.

Emphasis will be placed on new and unique ideas as well as the all around good conservation job that is being done by most farmers in this area. Although emphasis will be placed on peanuts and their cultivation and harvest, most other major products and conservation practices will be seen during the tour.

So you are invited by the De Leon Chamber of Commerce, The Farmers Union of Comanche County, and the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Service District to join them on a tour of the De Leon Area, one of the best in the State. The tour will begin with a look at the new Lab in De Leon, recently put into operation by the State Department of Agriculture, and end with a look at the big new municipal water plant on Lake Proctor. Reports indicate this to be the biggest and best of the annual tours.

Veteran Roby Rural Mail Carrier R. Smith Retiring

ROBY - When Roscoe Smith returns from his usual rural mail route Saturday, he will hang up his mail sack for the last time and end 47 years with the postal service.

Born in Stephenville, Smith graduated from John Tarleton College before beginning his career with the Post Office Department in 1921 at Gorman as a substitute clerk and janitor. On July 1, 1923, he was appointed regular clerk and served until February 16, 1926, when he was transferred to Sudan.

Smith was transferred back to Gorman from Sudan February 1, 1927 and worked there until March, 1933. He then went to Ringgold until June 1, 1933, when he was transferred to Roby. He has been on the same route there 36 years.

Smith married the former Elena Cox of Gorman March 17, 1934, and they have one daughter, Mrs. T. R. Hayes of Sweetwater.

Smith, who recalls being "pulled out" of the dirt and gravel roads many times through the years, can boast that he hasn't had a single wreck in his 47 years as a mail carrier.

The Roby man has served as president of Brazos Valley Chapter of the Rural Letter Carriers, and has been a delegate to the state convention for the past 30 years. He also has been a national delegate to conventions in Atlanta, Ga., and Los Angeles, Calif.

Following his retirement, Smith plans to travel some and "get caught up on all of my fishing," but will continue to live in Roby.

A GOOD COMMAND OF WORDS MEANS KNOWING WHEN TO KEEP 'EM TO YERSELF!



WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE PRESIDENT CAN FIND GENERAL AGREEMENT on the first point he makes in his proposal to revamp the Government's welfare programs. In effect he says present programs are too costly and have been disappointing in results.

WHAT WAS EXPECTED TO BE ACHIEVED with all the billions of dollars spent on welfare in recent years is somewhat vague but whatever was expected has not happened.

NOW PRESIDENT NIXON IS FOR JUNKING a large part of it and proposes in its stead a new system which has the central feature of an annual income for everyone. It is estimated that initially recipients would be doubled — from about 10 million plus to approximately 21 million people. The additional cost — about \$4 billion.

COUPLED WITH AN INCOME ASSURANCE FOR EVERY FAMILY is the President's proposal for a change in the Manpower Training Act carrying the slogan of "Get people off the welfare rolls onto the payroll." — cost — about \$1 billion.

AT A MEETING OF GOVERNORS JUST CONCLUDED in Colorado Springs, a "Revenue Sharing Plan" was endorsed — meaning a refund of a certain

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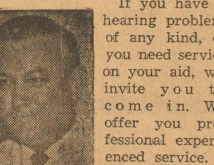

percentage of Federal taxes to States and Cities on a formula not yet defined.

LED BY GOVERNOR ROCKEFELLER OF NEW YORK, the Conference also advocated the Federal Government taking over all welfare financing from the States.

LIKELY, HAWAII WOULD WELCOME SUCH A TAKE OVER more than any other State. Four years ago Hawaii became the first State to assure its citizens that if they did not have an adequate income of their own, the State would see that they were taken care of. The plan involves the "negative income tax," cheered at the time by its advocates as a "noble experiment."

FROM ALL REPORTS, FEW PEOPLE UNDERSTAND the State's complicated formula and some have received refunds of a dollar or two a year which cost the State many times the amount in administrative expense. Seemingly, the plan is now considered to be a case of misguided good intentions and a lesson in how not to help people who need help the most. Naturally, it has been a vote getter and under circumstances they can't turn it loose.

AS UNDERSTOOD, THE PLAN WAS TO RELIEVE the burden on local residents of a 4 percent sales tax. The tax applies to every retail item and catches ready cash income from happy tourists.

IN 1965, HAWAII'S LEGISLATURE PASSED BILLS which, in effect, gave actual cash or tax credits to their citizens in amounts based on their income. The less their income, the more money received. The records show that many people do not file a return or apply for the benefits since their welfare payments are greater.

SEVERAL OTHER STATES ARE TRYING SOME SORT of a guaranteed annual income or a tax credit for their citizens. Iowa has one with a \$12 per head per year maximum State income tax credit. Indiana gives \$8 per person and Nebraska and Colorado give \$7. These latter plans apply regardless of amount of income.

MASSACHUSETTS LIMITS CREDITS TO THOSE with incomes below \$5,000 and gives a maximum of \$8 per dependent.

SO, ANY STUDY OF A PLAN FOR A GUARANTEED ANNUAL INCOME or one for tax-sharing with the State should take into consideration the experiences of the States which are making the experiment.

THE RECENT GOVERNORS' CONFERENCE GAVE NO CONSIDERATION to the idea of not collecting from the States in the

first place, monies which could be used by local governments for a welfare program of their own choosing. Reference to this subject in a special release on April 28, 1969, and the bill, H. R. 10580, introduced by Burleson for this purpose on the same date.)

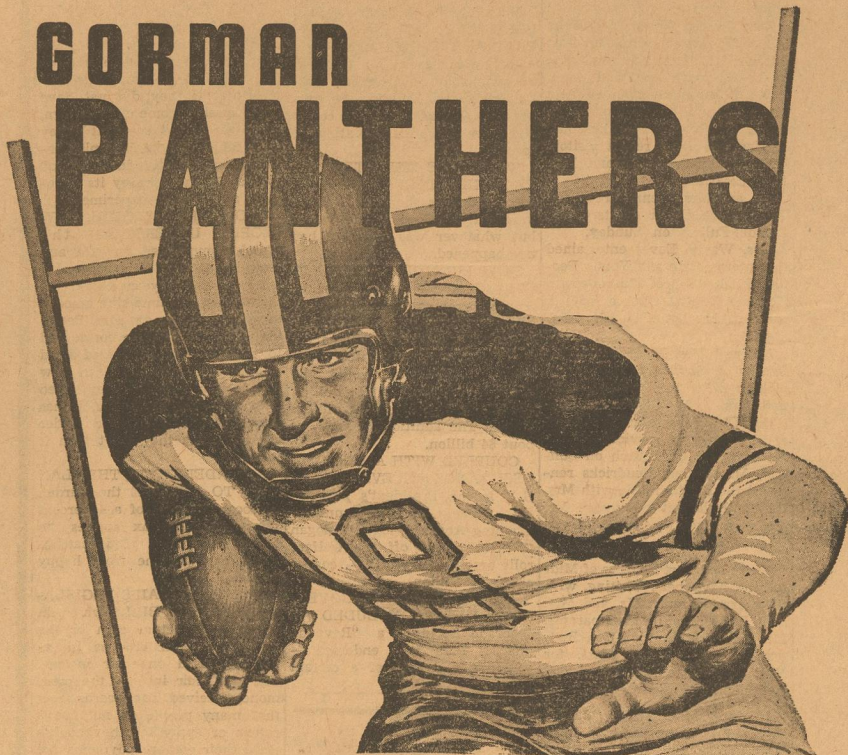

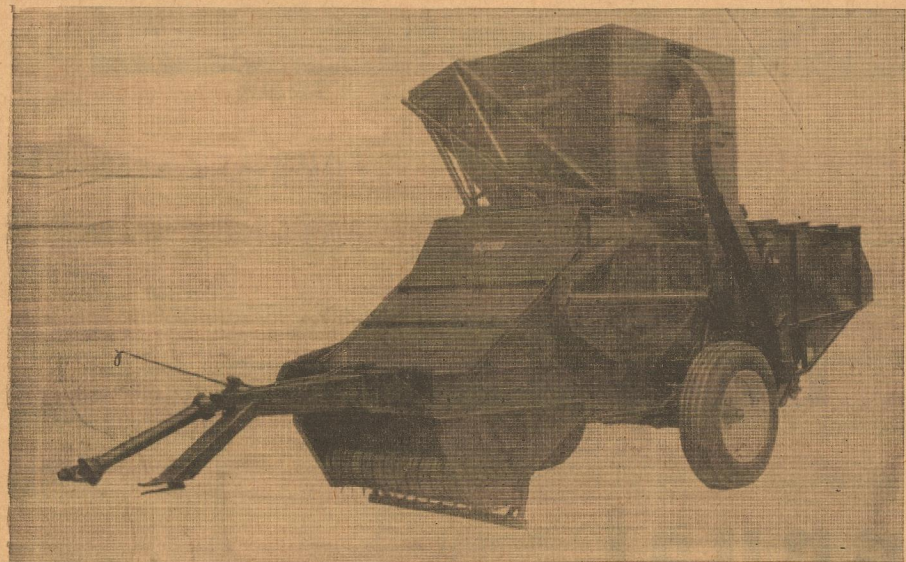
