The Panthers will be hosting the Rising Star Wildcats in the homecoming tilt at Brogdon Field Saturday night at 7:30 in a game which could easily decide the favorite to take the crown of District 19-B. There would be a couple of more tough games in the district encounters, but this game will definitely decide who will be favored for the title.

About the only comparison between teams that both Gorman

and Rising Star have played is that Rising Star played Early to a 22 to 20 decision and the Panthers score a quick 26 points in the first half and held on to win a close battle 26 to 20.

The Panthers are really coming along as they have started mixing their game well between the pass and run, and the statistics above will show. They made 137 on the ground and 102 in the air against Early.

The Panther offense was led by Johnny Scitern, who managed 57 yards on 13 carries for a 4.3 average; Wesley Rogers hit for 40 yards on 12 trips for 3.3; Jackie Selman got 33 yards on 9 carries for 3.7; Mike Duran ran 4 times for 5 yard, however he was thrown once for a -3 on a pass try; and Bill Self carried one time for 2 yards.

Gorman got the ball again on an Early miscue on the Longhorn 34 and scored in 7 plays with Mike Duran going the final yard on a QB sneak with 29 seconds left. The run for points failed and the half ended 26-6 with the Big Red in front.

## Will Haynes Says Peanut Harvest Good This Year

Peanut harvest in the Gorman area is getting into full swing. It was delayed some over the weekend by the 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 inches of rain that fell Saturday night.

Will Haynes of the Duster Community reports the harvest of 47 acres of irrigated peanuts making 103 bushels to the acre with a grade of 72. He has some dry land peanuts that he estimates will produce 60 to 70 bushels to the acre.

The peanut land of Mr. Haynes is farmed by Bill Barnes. We hope to have reports of other peanut harvests of various farms in the area.

## Lone Star Asks Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas today asked the City of Gorman to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used in rendering public service.

The application for rate increase, the first major request since 1953 based on an income deficiency in the Gorman distribution system, listed increased cost of gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased wages and salaries, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the deficiency.

The company indicated that it had used every means available to avoid a request for rate increase, but inflationary pressures not under the company's control necessitated the application.

"Obviously our wish to keep gas rates low must be balanced with the economic pressures we face," Rayford Burgess, manager of the Gorman distribution office, said. "These pressures can no longer be offset in any other way."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately \$1.12.

Lone Star Gas serves approximately 600 customers in Gorman.

## Medicare's Fees To Be Increased

**WASHINGTON** — An aged person covered by medicare who enters a hospital after January 1 will have to pay the first \$52 of his bill — an increase of \$8.

The announcement Friday by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare came just a day after President Nixon asked Congress to increase Social Security benefits by 10 per cent beginning next April 1.

Instead of the present \$44 of a hospital bill that must be paid by a medicare recipient for hospitalization up to 60 days, the patient will have to pay \$52 under the increase in the deductible.

From 60 to 90 days, the patient's share will rise from \$11 to \$13 of daily costs, and over 90 days the patient will pay \$26 per day instead of the current \$22.

The President also predicted there would be a "substantial" increase in the current \$4 per month which beneficiaries must pay for supplementary medical benefits — helping pay doctor, ambulance, out-patient and other medical costs. The new supplementary rate must be set by December 31 to go into effect next July 1.

## New Voter Registration Law

Persons wishing to vote in the year 1970 must fill out an application Form first, then mail or take to Tax Assessor-Collector's Office where the Certificate will be written and mailed or delivered in person.

Period for registering is from October 1st, 1969 through January 31, 1970.

Application Forms are available at the Tax Office in Eastland County Court House and will be in places of business in all towns in the County as soon as possible.

All application forms must be filled out complete and signed by applicant or agent. Agent can only be, husband or wife, father or mother, son or daughter.

Each applicant must send in his own application and that of his family, in other words, these cannot be gathered and sent in groups.

Registration applications are now available at the Progress office and in each business firm in Gorman.

Remember - you must register to be eligible to vote in any election.

The 1970 voting year begins March 1, 1970 and ends on February 28, 1971.

AN ORDINANCE  
FIXING AND  
DETERMINING THE GENERAL  
SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED  
FOR SALES OF NATURAL  
GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND  
COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS  
WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF  
GORMAN, EASTLAND, COUNTY,  
TEXAS, AND PROVIDING  
FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH  
SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED,  
ADJUSTED AND AMENDED  
AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE  
CITY COMMISSION OF GORMAN,  
TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the  
first gas bills rendered after the  
final approval of this ordinance,  
the maximum general service  
rate for sales of natural gas rendered  
to residential and commercial  
consumers within the city limits  
of Gorman by Lone Star Gas Company,  
a Texas corporation, its successors and  
assigns, is hereby fixed and determined  
as follows:

First 2,000 cu. ft. or fraction  
thereof \$1.344 Gross, \$1.21 Net.  
Next 10,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.011 per  
Mcf Gross; \$.91 per Mcf Net.  
Next 10,000 cu. ft. @ \$.900 per  
Mcf Gross; \$.81 per Mcf Net.  
All Over 22,000 cu. ft. @ \$.789  
per Mcf Gross; \$.71 per Mcf Net.  
No gas bill will be rendered to  
any residential or commercial  
consumer served under the above  
rate not consuming any gas during  
any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT  
The amount of each net monthly  
bill computed at the above  
stated rates shall be subject to the  
following adjustment: Plus  
an amount equivalent to the  
proportionate part of any new  
tax, or increased tax, or any  
other governmental imposition,  
rental, fee or charge (except  
state, county, city and special  
district ad valorem taxes and taxes  
on net income) levied, assessed  
or imposed subsequent to July  
1, 1969, upon or allocable to the  
Company's distribution operations,  
by any new or amended law,  
ordinance or contract. Each  
gross monthly bill shall be  
adjusted proportionately. Company,  
at its option, may forego the  
application of this adjustment; however,  
failure of Company to apply  
such adjustment shall not  
constitute a waiver of Company's  
right from time to time, or at  
any time, to make such adjustment,  
in whole or in part, in any  
subsequent current monthly bill  
that may be applicable to such  
bill.

Net rate shall apply to all  
bills paid within ten days from  
monthly billing date; gross rate  
shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable  
to each residential and commercial  
consumer per month or for  
any part of a month for which  
gas is used at the same location.

right to collect such reasonable  
charges as are necessary to conduct  
its business and to carry out  
its reasonable rules and regulations  
in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth  
in Section 1 may be changed and  
amended by either the City or  
Company furnishing gas in the  
manner provided by law. Service  
hereunder is subject to the orders  
of regulatory bodies having  
jurisdiction, and to the Company's  
Rules and Regulations currently  
on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there  
is an imperative public need for  
an ordinance fixing and determining  
the rate for gas and gas service  
furnished to residential and  
commercial consumers creates  
an emergency, and the reading  
and passage of this ordinance  
at three separate meetings is  
hereby suspended and this ordinance  
shall take effect and be in  
full force from and after the  
date of its passage at a single  
meeting and the approval thereof  
by the Mayor.

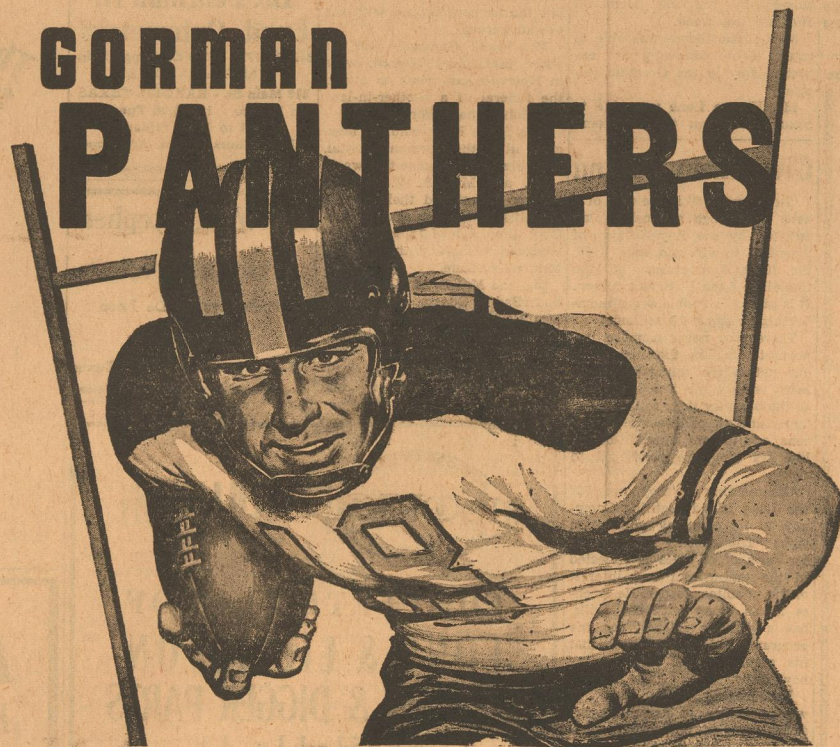

ital "C" anyway. NOW THIS CAT MAY NOT BE TOO DIFFERENT in appearance from mother cats. What distinguishes him is that he has a regular job. IT HAS BEEN SAID THAT NO ONE REALLY owns a cat, meaning that cats go where they please and tolerate those people who do the most for them. Seemingly not entirely true with this Cat. BRUCE OWNS THIS CAT. Bruce is the Lady's first name. Like the Cat, her last name is not known. SHE LIVES IN THE HEART OF NEW YORK CITY with two cats - a boy Cat and a girl cat. The boy Cat is the star in this story and hence the reason to use the big "C" in referring to him. He's the main subject because he holds down this job. He may not contribute much to Bruce's support but there is the lady cat and cat food is expensive. BRUCE HOLDS A POSITION AT THE EXECUTIVE LEVEL in a big organization with offices in mid-town Manhattan. She also has the job of seeing that her Cat gets to his place of employment on time. REPORTS ARE THAT SHE SETS ASIDE A period at about 11:00 o'clock each morning to leave her office, get a cab and go for Cat. She takes him to work, after which she has her lunch and returns to her office. ACCORDING TO THOSE WHO KNOW BRUCE and her daily routine, she leaves her office for the day around 5:30, arriving home at about 6:00 o'clock. Her Cat is either there waiting to be let in or if not there he arrives a few minutes afterwards. Like most of us he may be late to work but seldom late in quitting. His work-day is five hours. Is he being replaced by some new-fangled mouse trap installed by the bakery? Automation is disrupting a lot of jobs nowadays you know. This doesn't seem to be the case either.

FINALY THE TRUTH IS OUT. Ole Cat's job is being abolished because of the Government's rat eradication program. It is not management's decision to let Cat go. Evidently they were doing pretty good on a day-to-day operation but with no permanent solution. So the Government takes over the problem and the Cat is out of work. SHOULD HE BE ENTITLED TO UNEMPLOYMENT compensation? THE HOUSE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE of the Congress has just begun hearings (not on the Cat's problem) on proposals to revise the unemployment compensation laws. THE ADMINISTRATION REC-

COMMENDS COVERING an additional 5.2 million employees, including 400,000 farm workers. They say this added coverage will include all but 11 million in our entire work-force. Of these about 2 million are agricultural workers and another 2 million are in domestic employment. The remainder are employed in public institutions, non-profit organizations, State and local governments. 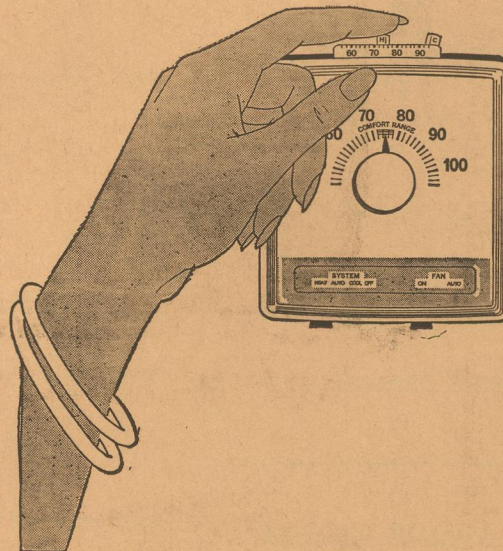

**CHECK-OFF PROGRAM APPROVED BY PEANUT GROWERS IN TEXAS**

John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, announced that the peanut growers approved September 24, a commodity check-off referendum with an 84.2 percent majority.

Results of the election were certified by Ross Wilson, manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, to Commissioner White. Nine growers were also elected on the referendum ballot as members of a commodity producers board, who will set program goals and handle funds.

The new board members are scheduled to hold their first meeting this week for the purpose of electing officers. They will operate officially as the Texas Peanut Producers Board.

Peanut growers are the first agricultural producers in the state to organize themselves for product promotion, education, research and disease and insect control under a law passed under the regular session of the legislature.

Balloting of peanut growers was conducted by mail with a September 24 postmark deadline. The canvassing committee was named by the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association with the approval of White.

The board members of the newly-formed peanut group are Dick Palmore, Dublin; J. O. Jackson, Gorman; Lyndell F. Coan, De Leon; J. N. Pruitt, Mineral Wells; Billy Carruth, De Leon; Johnny Rollins of Granbury; George A. Tolson, Pearsall; Ben Cook, May; and Wendell Sellers of Floresville.
