ENROLLMENT HITS 15,000 AT NORTH TEXAS STATE

On-campus enrollment at North Texas State University has passed the 15,000 mark this fall for the first time in the school's history.

It marks the 19th consecutive fall semester for a record enrollment figure to be set at NTSU.

Total enrollment in all academic programs at NTSU is 16,501, including 15,024 on campus, 574 at extension centers in nine different North Texas cities and 930 in correspondence courses.







We Americans still maintain hope or peace in the world today, even though battles continue to rage in the jungles of Vietnam. We will not accept a peace of slavery, but a peace of honor and dignity.

As we observe Veterans Day 1969, we pause to remember the Tomb, of the Unknown Soldier, a symbol of all American fighting men who paid with their lives, that the living might enjoy enduring freedom. More than one million have given their lives in this endeavor.

Veterans of all wars of the United States now number more than 39 million. Of this number, there are some 414,000 women veterans. There are more than 27 million of these veterans alive today. We have a tremendous responsibility and owe a great debt to these veterans who have given us our dearly cherished freedom.

To this very special group of Americans, we owe a pledge of assurance that we are worthy of the many sacrifices they have made and are making at this moment, in order that we may remain a free nation.

We face the future with confidence and hope that world peace will come because of the actions and deeds of our veterans of past wars and our men who fight today on the battlefields of Vietnam.

Today, Veterans Day, 1969, we salute those heroes of past wars and our fighting men of today, who are preserving our democracy. We honor those who died for freedom's sake, and we pledge to those who live that we will remember with reverence their contributions to our freedom.
