U. S. AIR FORCE ACADEMY, Colo. — U. S. Air Force Major Stanley W. Powers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam S. Powers of Desdemona, Texas, has been decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross, his second through fifth awards of the Air Medal and his third award of the U. S. Air Force Commendation Medal for action in Southeast Asia.

Major Powers, who served as an electronic warfare officer with the 41st Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron at Takhli Royal Thai AFB, Thailand, received the DFC for flying highly intricate and hazardous missions in support of free world forces combating aggression.

His Air Medals were also for his outstanding airmanship and courage on successful and important missions completed under hazardous conditions.

In addition to his duties as a combat crew member, Major Powers served as a standardization and evaluation officer for which he earned the Commendation Medal.

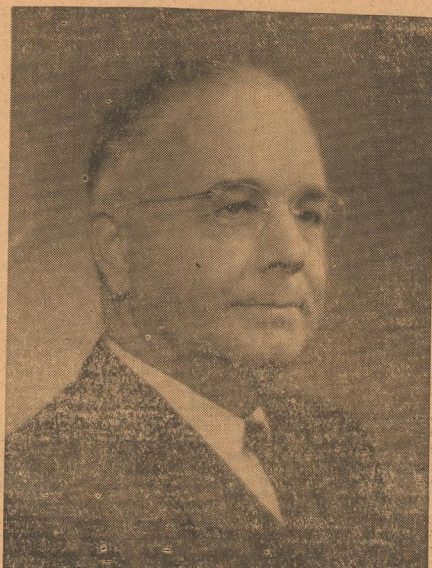
The major was honored during ceremonies at the U. S. Air Force Academy, where he now serves as an instructor in the navigation division.

Panthers Smother Blanket 48-0; Play At Hico Friday

Wow! What Happened! That's what most of the Panther fans were saying on Friday night as the Panthers roared on the field against the Blanket Tigers in a 19-B District game at Brogdon Field, and before you could say "Whut Hopped" the Panthers had the visitors down 14-0 with only 3 minutes gone off the clock in the first period.

The Panthers kicked off to the Tigers who ran the kick back to their own 38. On the first play from scrimmage, Blanket tried a quick jump pass which was intercepted by Jackie Selman on a heads up play, who returned the ball to the 31. Then lightning struck as QB Mike Duran faked a line play and rolled out to his right side and roared into the end zone with 11:38 left on the clock. Wesley Rogers added the 2-pointer on a run to make the score 8-0.

Then following a drive by the

Tigers, the Panthers took over on their own 21 yard line, and when, lightning struck again, as on the first play Johnny Scitern broke over the left side of his line cut to the outside of the field and electrified the fans with a 79 yard touchdown scamper with 8:20 left in the first period. The pass for points was incomplete.

The Panthers added another tally with 3 minutes left in the first period going 43 yards in 8 plays, featuring a 13 yard aerial to Selman. Mike Duran got the score on a keeper from 17 yards out on another fine run. Rudy Espinoza kicked the PAT and the score rose to 21-0.

Gorman got 2 more points on the scoreboard with 13 seconds left when Reggie Underwood, a real tough player for the Panthers shot through the line and dumped Blanket QB James Rodgers in the end zone for a safety. This was two games in a row that Reggie has accomplished this feat.

Then the Panthers tacked on another quick one for good measure as on the kickoff following the safety Johnny Scitern grabbed the ball on his own 35 yard stripe, hit the outside lane and took off for the races on a fine run for 65 yards and a score which brought the crowd to their feet again. Rudy Espinoza added the extra point on a kick and the Panthers led 30-0 with 2 seconds left in the first period.

Gorman scored again with 6:43 left in the second period going 80 yards in 12 plays with Jackie Selman exploding for the final 35 yards for the TD. The kick failed.

The next Panther tally came with 10:32 left in the third quarter with the Big Red going 64 yard in 4 plays, sparked by a 33 yard scamper by Scitern to set the Panthers up with first and goal from the nine. From there Jackie Selman scored in one shot through the line. The kick for PAT failed.

The final score of the game came with 6:13 left on the clock with Danny Ervin, reserve fullback, going the final 2 yards off his left side. The pass for points was incomplete, leaving the final score at 48 to 0.

The reserves of the Panthers got to play some in this game for the first time this season for most of them. And they are to be congratulated, as they scored once and had another called back due to a penalty.

The Panthers looked very good in this ball game, to the surprise of a few who thought they would possibly be a little low for this game, looking forward to the big one next Friday night at Hico. But, as you can see, the Big Red were definitely not down for this one.

The offense wound up the evening with 423 yards on the ground and 125 in the air for a total of 553 yards. Johnny Scitern lead the Panthers with 149 yards on 14 carries for a 10.6 yard average, plus about a hundred yards in runbacks and two pass receptions for 51 yards. Jackie Selman had another good night with 109 yards on 11 trips for a 10 yard average and caught one aerial for 13. Duran had a fine night, netting 60 yards on 3 keeps for a 20 yard average. Rudy Espinoza got 28 on 10; Danny Ervin 28 on 11; Phillip Lewis 21 on 7; Wesley Rogers 19 on 4; and Kelly Henderson 4 yards on 4 keeps. The reserves did yeoman service.

The defense did an outstanding job of stopping the Tiger attack with 6 interceptions out of 25 Tiger passes. The whole unit did the job again for the Panthers on defense.

Naming the Players of the Week was almost impossible, I am certain, but a more deserving pair could not have been named than Bill Self for the Defensive Player and Steve Patterson as the Offensive Player.

The Panthers will be playing extra hard this Friday night at Hico as they try to stay in the running for the 19-B District title. If the Panthers can come out victorious over Hico (and we all know this will be the case), and Rising Star can defeat the Lometa Hornets, the 19-B Title will be in a 3-way tie and the representative will be decided by the flip of a coin. If Lometa wins over Rising Star, the Hornets will be the champs.

So, let's go get 'em Panthers!

THE GORDON SPOT

Almost everyone is talking about the deer he shot or missed. The hunters are reporting that they haven't seen many deer, but the deer that have been killed are in good condition.

Charles Ramsey, Extension Wildlife specialist at Texas A&M, tells us why these reports are true. He says that in areas of the state where there have been extra amounts of rain this fall, the deer crop will be difficult to hunt. Where there is an abundance of green weeds or a good acorn crop, the deer will get up only to feed for short periods of time and then lay back down.

Generally the deer are in good condition this year, and because of this they are hard to hunt.

Ramsey says that the hunter's success depends on the movement of the deer rather than the deer density. This movement is in turn dependent on the available food supply. If the food supply is good, the animals will not go to the feed pens and expose themselves to the hunter's deer blind. So, if the hunter has the skill, the deer are there to hunt.

We have some publications that deer hunters will be interested in. A popular publication is "Wild Game Care and Cooking." It tells how to cook all types of wild game whether it is deer, opossum or wild turkey. Other bulletins we have are "Field Dressing a Deer" and "To Age a Deer." If you would like to have one or all three publications, let me know.

Some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers, including a representative number from Eastland County, will be involved in the 1969 state livestock survey.

During the last half of November survey questionnaires will be mailed to selected livestock producers by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Each stockman should fill out the questionnaire as soon as possible and return it in the enclosed envelope.

The reports will be used by the state statistician in making an accurate estimate of the cattle, hogs and chickens on the farms and ranches of Texas.

There are many uses, both in and out of Texas, for this information. We use it here in the county in connection with our program building activities and in conducting educational programs involving livestock.

The more questionnaires returned, the more accurate will be the estimates; therefore, it is important that each producer in Eastland County who receives a questionnaire complete and return it immediately.

tains cyclamate, it will be listed on the label.

Food manufacturers are aligning their products with recommendations stopping the use of the sweetener. Among them is General Foods.

In a recent statement, General Foods said they have halted production of foods and beverages containing cyclamates. Products are Pre-Sweetened Kool-Aid, Soft Drink Mix, Diet Twist Mix, Good Seasons Low Calorie Italian Salad Dressing Mix, Log Cabin Light Cal Syrup and Scoop Low Calorie Granulated Sugar Replacement.

Conventionally sweetened products will replace them.

Other General Foods lower-calorie foods, such as Birds Eye Cool Whip Non-Dairy Whipped Topping and Dream Whip Whipped Topping Mix, contain no cyclamates.

The D-Zerta Low Calorie line will be continued until February 1, 1970. Secretary Robert Finch of the Health Education and Welfare Department recognized the need for certain dietary foods for diabetics and others with health problems.

The company plans to reformulate the products to contain no cyclamates.

The concern about cyclamates is not sudden. But it is alarming! For one thing, use of the sweetener was zooming; U. S. consumption had increased six times in the last seven years.

Nearly 70 percent of this would be in soft drinks.

Christmas is just around the corner and maybe you are beginning to start your shopping and gift lists! New appliances are now on the market which you might like to consider.

One new dishwasher eliminated pre-rinsing. Food does not stick to the Micro-Mesh filter.

An alarm clock resets itself automatically. New irons have rotating spray knobs, a regular spray and a light one for permanent-press.

A new automatic bacon cooker from one leading appliance manufacturer cooks up to eight slices of bacon, thick or thin, in five to ten minutes. It has a variety of settings and should be on the market in late 1969 or early 1970.

Several toasters now boast a special setting for toaster-warmed pastries.

To accompany this innovation are small pizzas which are cooked in the toaster. A new process holds the cheese or sausage flavored ingredients so they do not drip or run to the bottom of the toaster.

A new age limit for blood donors has been set by the American Red Cross and the American Association of Blood Banks. Blood now will be accepted from donors up to the 68th birthday.

The old age limit was 61.

Healthier older Americans and an increased need for blood caused the change. Demand for blood is rising about 12 percent each year.

Those giving blood must be in good health and meet the requirements for donors.
