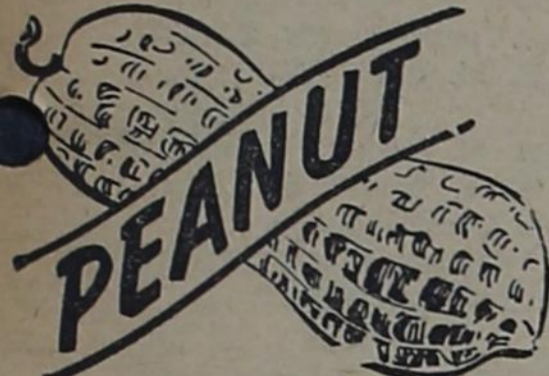

This is another story in a series of articles compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Rep. of the Abilene Social Security Office.

In a previous article I discussed retirement payments. Now suppose that you do not live to reach the retirement age?

If you die insured AT ANY AGE social security benefits can be paid to certain of your survivors. For the young man, with a wife and children, Social Security in many cases represents the best insurance protection that his family has. It can be worth as much as \$50,000 or more to his widow and children in monthly checks.

If you leave only a widow, she can be paid benefits beginning with age 62. There is no reduction in widow's benefits. In the case of a woman, her widower at 65 can receive benefits if he was dependent on his wife at the time of her death.

If there is neither widow, children, nor dependent widower, your aged parents may get payments if they were dependent on you for their support.

These are the monthly survivors benefits provided by the law. You cannot name a beneficiary.

If you are insured at the time of your death, a lump sum will be paid to your widow or widower if you were living together. If there is no such widow or widower, then the person or persons who paid your burial expenses can get the lump sum. This lump sum is three times your monthly benefit amount with a maximum of \$255. It is in addition to any monthly benefits payable.

A widow, widower or parent receives 3/4 of your monthly benefit amount. The total payment to any one family from a single social security account cannot be more than 80 percent of the worker's average monthly earnings or more than \$200. If the unadjusted family payment would be more than the permitted maximum, each dependent's share is reduced to bring the total down to the maximum amount payable. A family's total is not reduced below \$50.00 by such adjustments.

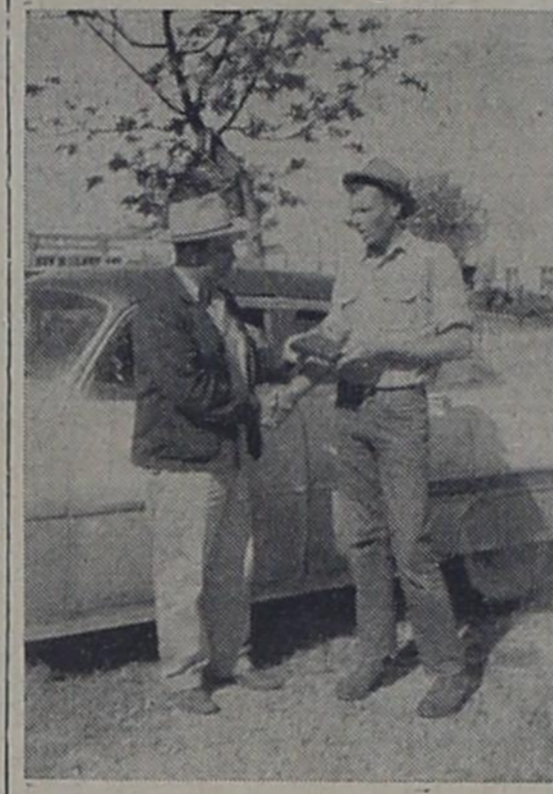

Civics Class Visits Court

Yesterday, the 28th day of April the Civics Class of Gorman High School made a trip to Brownwood to visit the District Court there. When we arrived at the court room at approximately 10:15 a. m. we were met and greeted by District Judge A. O. Newman.

We first witnessed the selection and impaneling of the jury. 36 people had been summoned for possible jury duty. One of the attorneys explained to the veniremen the main points of the case. He explained that the case had evolved from an automobile accident. The two persons involved in the accident were filing cross suits. After asking the veniremen general questions such as "How many of you know the defendant, Mr. so-and-so?", he then asked the individuals questions. There was the fifteen minute recess in which the attorneys selected the jury.

After the recess the jurors names were called and they each took their place and was impaneled.

The affidavits were read to the jury. The judge then called a lunch recess until 1:30 p. m.

After eating lunch we returned to the court room. One of the persons who had been involved in the accident was called to the witness stand. He was examined by his own attorney, then cross-examined by his opponent's attorney.

We were very sorry when we had to go home about 3:30 p. m. We had all become interested in the case and had learned quite a bit about the court system and the way in which it functions. We had previously studied about courts and law in class, but much more can be gained from actually viewing than from text books.

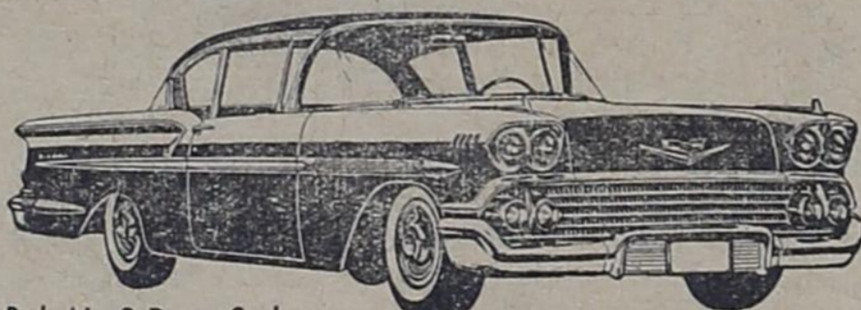

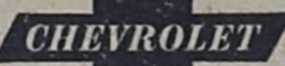

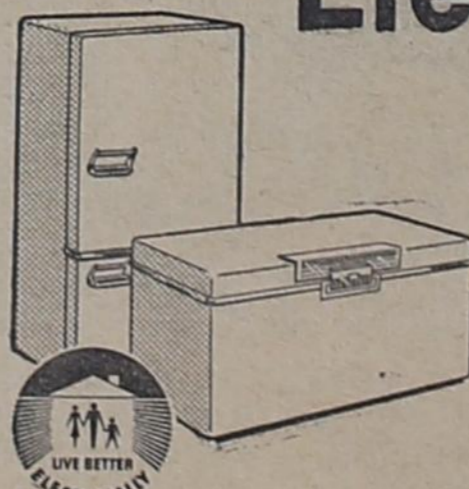

From the political standpoint it does, however, sound good to talk about cutting taxes and, at the same time, spend money for every cause and purpose anyone can dream up.

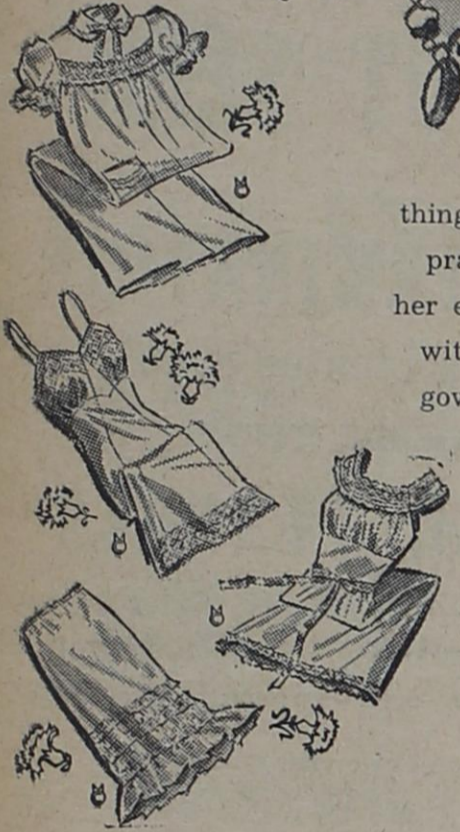

mentioned before in this column that all blessings flow from Washington, and that governmena can cure all ills.

And speaking of children, a recent survey of 6,000 high school students over the United States indicates that 25 per cent of the boys and 33 per cents of the girls believe that government should control basic industries such as power, steel and railroads. The poll among high school students reveals that most senior believe that business is not good for the country. Fifty-six per cent thought that the government could eliminate economic problems by taking from the rich and giving to the poor. Sixty-one percent favored government censorship and control of press, radio and TV.

This strongly suggests that we are not imbuing the youth of this Country with the principles of free enterprise, which, of course, is basic to our economic system.

While we are talking of better education in the sciences and mulling over the many proposals to improve the deficiencies found in this field, it seems pretty obvious that somebody should be doing something about teaching the basic philosophies which have made us the greatest country and the greatest people on earth.

Miss Hybernia Grace taught history and economics in Anson High School. Dr. Earl Brown taught economics in Abilene Christian College, and Dr. W. Aubrey Stephenson taught economics and politics in Hardin-Simmons University. Dr. Walter Prescott Webb, author of "Divided We Stand," taught the same in the University of Texas. All these teachers were my instructors.

If it could be summed up in one sentence, the idea in their teaching was that every individual American should be guaranteed the right by his government to earn and accomplish that which he wishes to accomplish by his own ability, initiative and energy, so long as he does not infringe upon these same rights on the part of his fellow man.

It would seem to me that there is need, if we believe in these surveys, for a reiteration of this broad principle. It would seem that it is equally important for the preservation of our nation to teach these fundamentals as to educate our youth in the sciences.

What gain we from conquering all space and to lose that which has made us a great nation?

Perhaps we are protecting ourselves for the moment but
