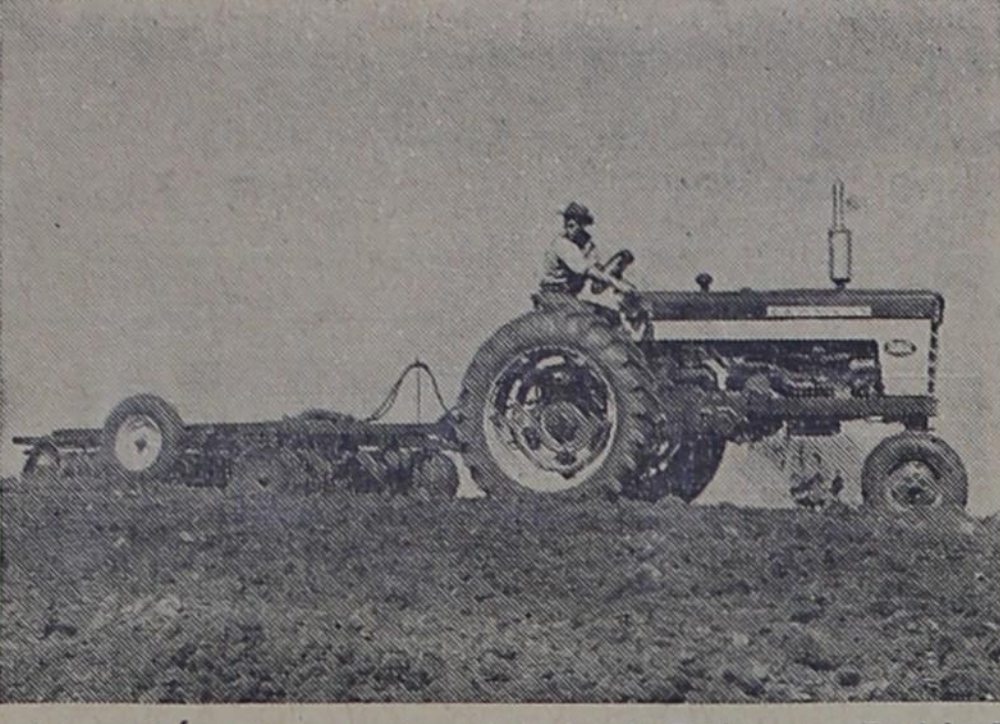

Judge Parker has only one sister and one brother living. His sister is Mrs. Annie Wallace of Bakersville, California and his brother s George Parker of De Leon. His other sisters are the late Mrs. Bell Henderson, Mrs. Laura Burros of Sipe Springs.

Parker has three children, Mrs. Alna Melton of Ft Worth, Mrs. Connie Flinn of Decatur and Mr. D. P. Parker of San Angelo. Mr. Parker's wife is the late Mrs. Florence Parker.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #4—Number Seven on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing, however, that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

Section 1. That Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 56. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing, however, that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #36—Number Eight on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-1, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 51-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall never exceed the payment of such Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided for in Section 51a of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall

be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts paid out of Federal funds for such purposes.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States, such financial aid on behalf of the needy, aged, needy blind, needy children, and needy permanently and totally disabled persons as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions hereinafter set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

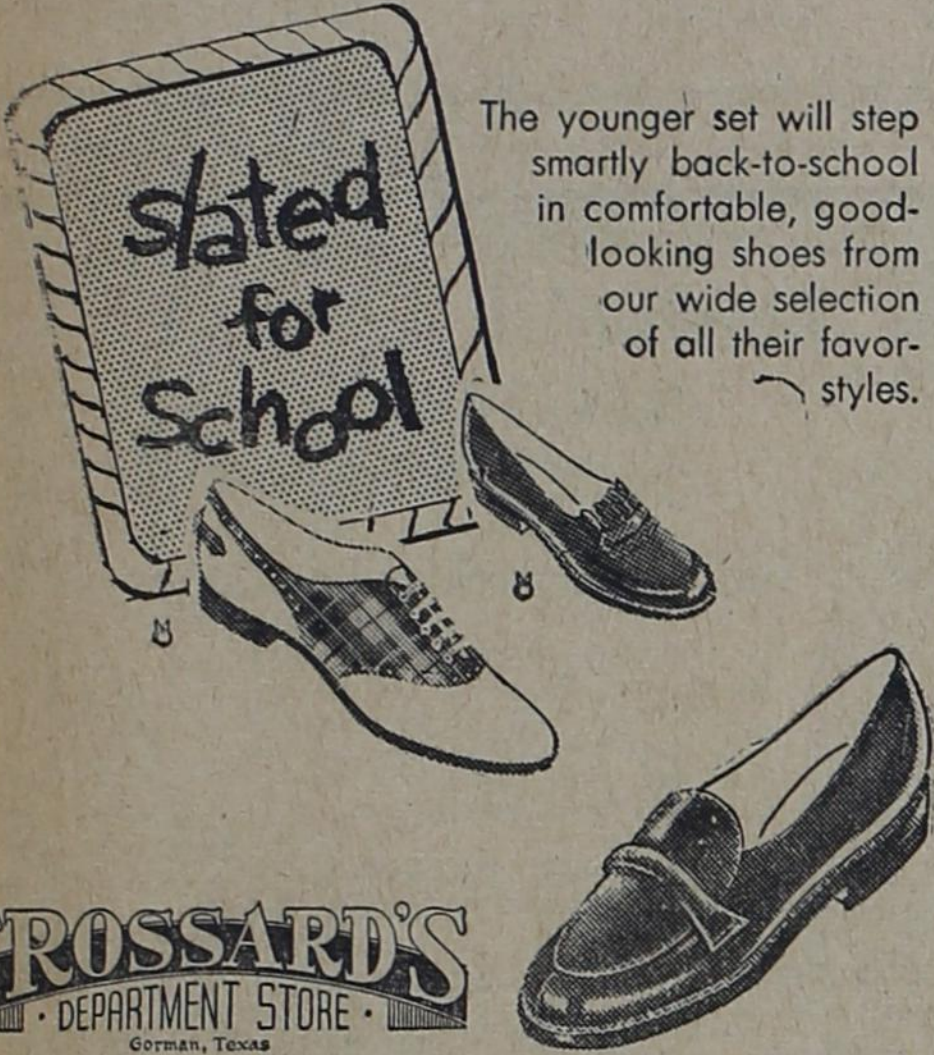

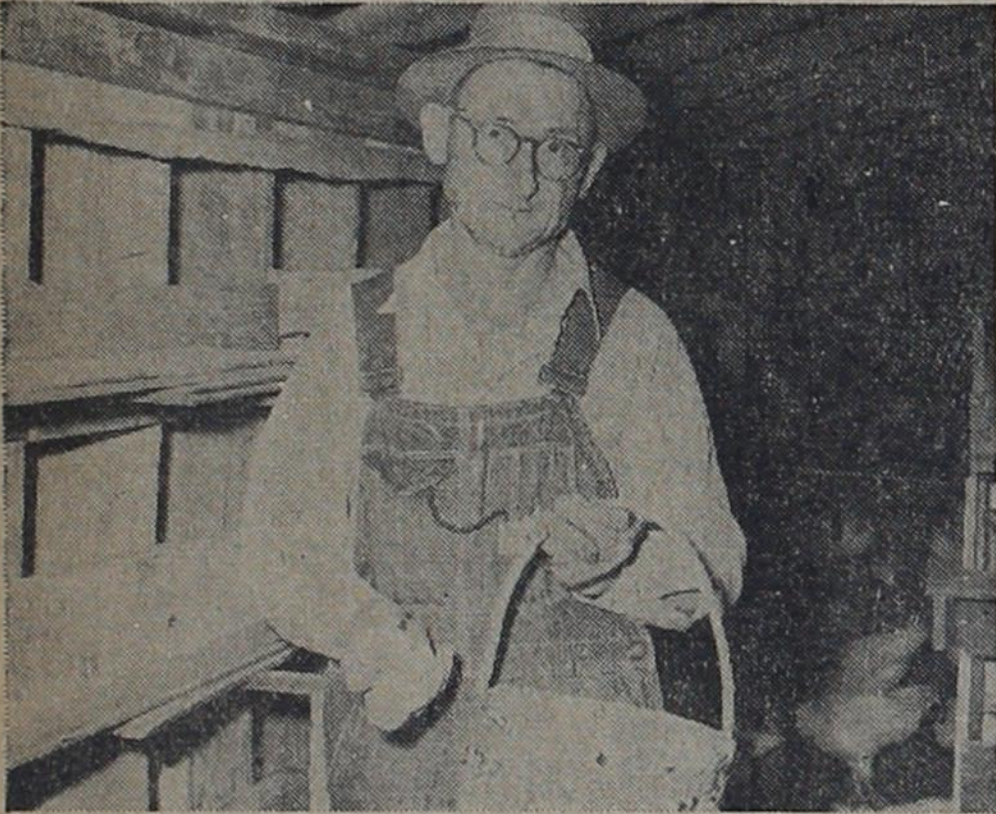

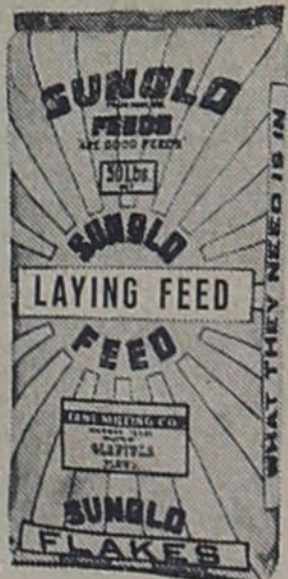

Farm Housing Loans

(b) is large enough to be considered a farm;

(2) Have sufficient farm and other income to pay farm operating and family living expenses, and meet payments on existing debts including the proposed farm housing loan;

(3) Be without sufficient resources on his own account and unable to obtain credit needed to finance the construction, repair, or improvement of homes and

other farm buildings;

(4) Have the ability, and experience necessary to carry out planned farming operations and other housing loan requirements.

(5) Be a citizen of the United States.

Tenants and farm laborers are not eligible for these loans but owners may borrow money to repair or build houses and other farm buildings for their tenants or laborers.

Who determines the eligibility or applicants?

The county committee of the Farmers Home Administration must certify in writing that an applicant is eligible for a loan. This committee consists of three local persons, at least two of whom are farmers, who know farming conditions in their county. This committee also certifies the normal market value of the farm after the contemplated improvements are made. When necessary the committee looks over the farm and personally interviews the applicant before making its recommendations.

What are the loan terms and interest rate?

The interest rate is 4 percent per year on the unpaid principal. Loans are scheduled for repayment within the shortest time consistent with the borrowers' ability to repay. In no case will the repayment period exceed 33 years. Each borrower is required to refinance the unpaid balance of the loan when able to obtain such refinancing at reasonable rates and terms from other lenders.

What security is required?

Each loan will be adequately secured by a mortgage on the farm, subject to any existing prior liens, and by such additional real estate security as the Farmers Home Administration deems necessary to reasonably protect the Government's interest.

Are there any limits on the kind of buildings that will be financed?

Farm housing loans are made to provide adequate dwellings and farm service buildings. Loans will not be made to provide buildings that are not needed for the actual operation of the farm or buildings that would cost considerably more than adequate buildings on other farms in the community.

Are applicants expected to furnish building plans?

Applicants are expected to furnish detailed building plans. The Farmers Home Administration has a limited number of plans available that applicants may use if they choose to do so.

Are plans and construction reviewed and inspected?

Yes. The Farmers Home Administration reviews the plans and inspects the construction as it progresses in order to assist the borrower in obtaining construction that meets the generally accepted standards of soundness.

When can construction be started?

After the loan is closed. Construction work should not be started and debts for such work or materials should not be incurred before the loan is closed.

Does it cost anything to apply for a loan?

No. However, an applicant must pay for legal services necessary to make certain that he has a satisfactory title to the farm and for recording the mortgage.

Where does an applicant apply for a loan?

Application for a farm housing loan is made at the county Farmers Home Administration office serving the area in which the applicant owns, and expects to improve, his farm.
