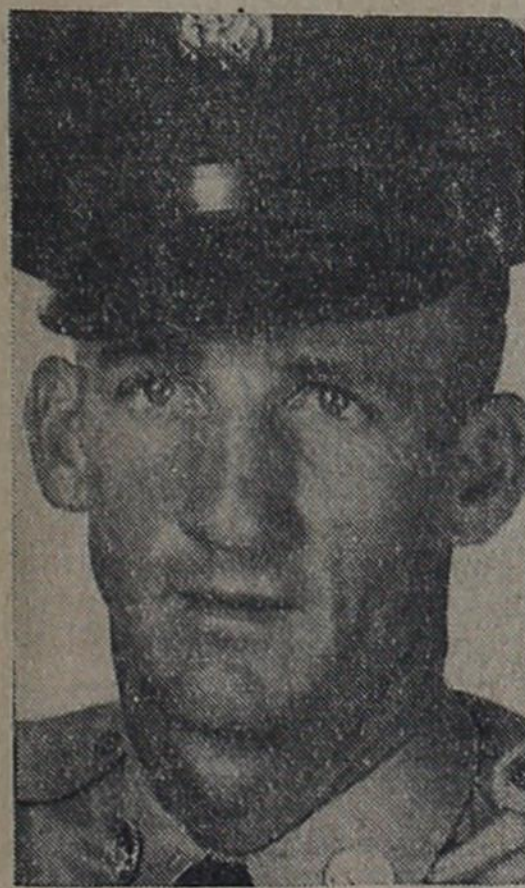

The Bearcats will be playing their first game under their new coach, Bill Little, and his material is not as strong as in recent years. However, I am sure the Bearcats will field a fine team as usual. Seven lettermen are on the lineup for the Bearcats but only five of these will be ready for full time duty Friday.

The Panthers will have seven lettermen returning to this year's lineup. They are Captains Neil Overstreet and David Revels, with Dick Townley and John Brinegar with two letters and Gary Echols, Jimmy Brightwell and Kenny Welch with one letter. Two lettermen on last years team have dropped out. Other members of the Panther squad are Bobby Shugart, Jerry Anderson, and Douglas Craig, Juniors; Jackie Simpson, Sophomore; and seven freshmen, Joe Harrison, Nathan Files, Glen Scitern, Phil Puckett, Terry Shell, Joe Bob Rodgers, and Gene Snider.

Announcement of this and other broadcast-telecast plans was made recently at a school for Southwest Conference announcers held in San Antonio.

Besides the 11 videotaped games, there will be 70 radio broadcasts and four live telecasts of Southwest Conference games.

The videotaped games will offer many of the advantages of live telecasting; in fact most viewers cannot distinguish between the two. Each game to be recorded on tape will be selected by Conference representatives and will be telecast at 5 p. m. (CST) the day after the games are played. It will be seen over a 28 station network in Texas and New Mexico. This program will give viewers a 45-minute version of the game as it would have been if telecast "live".

Live telecasts include the Baylor-Texas Tech game, October 18; the SMU-Georgia Tech game, October 25; the Rice-Army game, November 8; and the TCU-Texas game, November 15. These four games, selected by the Conference will be telecast over a network of 24 TV stations.

More than 130 radio stations in Texas and New Mexico will be used for radio broadcasts of games played by the Southwest Conference, Texas Western and New Mexico University. These will originate from 25 stadiums in 16 states.

The announcers school was held in conjunction with the Southwest Football Officials Association convention in San Antonio. As a part of the school, the announcers attended sessions of the convention. Instructors were Texas University head coach Darrel Royall and Kern Tips, one of the nation's top sportscasters.

Among announcers attending were Ves Box, Eddie Barker and Eddie Hill of Dallas; Bob Walker of Wichita Falls; Alec Chesser of Houston; Jim Wiggins of San Antonio; Jack Dale of Lubbock; Dave Russell of Beaumont; John Phelan of El Paso; and Connie Alexander of Albuquerque, N. M.

Community Meeting Monday, Sept. 8th

Charles E. Coln, owner of the Double "C" Sportswear Factory, met with a committee of businessmen Wednesday night and is ready to open a branch factory in Gorman, provided we can furnish sufficient housing for the plant and secure operators for his machines.

Realizing that this must be a community effort, the four civic clubs of Gorman are sponsoring a community meeting MONDAY, 7:30 p. m., in the High School Auditorium. All interested parties including merchants, individuals and persons seeking employment are urged to be present.

The committees working on this feel that it is one of the most important projects ever undertaken and will mean more to the welfare of the community than any project we have ever tried.

This factory will bring a minimum payroll of \$1500 per week to Gorman and will employ at least thirty people to begin with. Among the things our community will be required to do will be to prepare the upper portion of Higginbotham's Furniture building, such as:

Installation of a ladies lounge, men's wash room, office space, pressing room, boiler room, wiring for machinery, a fire escape, an outside entrance to the elevator and an outside entrance for personnel. The Funeral Chapel will also have to be sound-proofed.

It is also important that we assist in seeing that sufficient personnel is available for this to be a successful venture. This will be a permanent business and sufficient work has been assured for continuous operation. In fact, more work is available than we now have employees to handle. The unit will be successful depending on our ability to furnish personnel.

All of this work will require an estimated \$5,000 of which a major portion will be contributed by local merchants. However, individual contributions of labor and money will be necessary. This will be accepted in any amount, large or small. Contributions should be made payable to the City of Gorman and you are urged to make yours as early as possible.

You are urged to attend the community meeting Monday night, 7:30 at the High School Auditorium and give your support and cooperation to the civic clubs and merchants in order that they may be assured that this community effort will be successful.

Highlights and Sidelights

From Our State Capitol
By Vern Sanford.

AUSTIN, Tex. - Texas' 56th Legislature, though not yet sworn in, already casts a long shadow over Statehouse activities.

Its membership was settled - or virtually settled - with the counting of the Democratic second primary votes. A few will have Republican opponents in November.

Of more interest now is how the 56th will lean on key issues. Political prophets already are taking pulse readings and pronounce it likely to be more liberal than its predecessor. But not predominately liberal. A big influx of newly-elected liberals from Houston is expected to be offset by Dallas conservatives, plus others from small towns.

On next session's crucial issue - finance - everyone's crystal ball seems a bit cloudy. Next Legislature will have to grapple with a financial deficit which the Legislative Budget Board has predicted may call for as much as \$140,000,000 in additional tax revenue.

Winning candidates, in both their speeches and newspaper announcements, were understandably skittish and unspecific in making proposals for dealing with this gigantic problem. Many came out flatly against a general sales tax or state income tax. Numerous suggestions were made to balance the budget through "Economy in government, elimination of waste, duplication," etc.

Such statements are like the breeze off an iceberg to state departments, many of whom have said they'll be asking for more, not less money, next session.

When the showdown comes, decisions will be made largely by the same group who pushed the voting buttons in '57. All told, there'll be 49 new faces among

the 181 lawmakers.

Replacing the three retiring senators, Ottis Lock of Lufkin, Searcy Bracewell of Houston and Carlos Ashley of Llano will be Martin Dies Jr., of Lufkin, Robert W. Baker of Houston and Louis Crump of San Saba.

House will have 46 freshmen, slightly less than the normal one-third turn-over of its 150 members. Changes result from the retirement of 33 representatives, defeat of 13 others.

MANGLED MATH - When the next speaker of the House of Representatives takes office in January, some confused arithmetic will be cleared up.

A speaker is elected at the start of each regular session by the 150 House members. Support, in the form of signed pledges, is lined up well in advance of the sessions start.

This year, when the dust settled from the run-off primary, both contenders claimed victory. Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, present speaker, said he had 80 pledges. Rep. Joe Burkett of Kerrville claimed 77 pledges. In addition, Burkett said he knew of 15 House members who had made no pledges.

All the claims added to 172 representatives - 22 more than the people elected.

BIG DAY DUE - San Antonio, site of the Alamo, may see another lousy scrap Tuesday (Sept. 9) when Texas Democrats of wide varying sentiments gather for state convention.

No one is making any ironclad predictions on what will happen, but pre-convention rumblings promise at least some of the usual fireworks.

A group of conservatives are working on ways to bounce the militantly liberal Mrs. Frankie Randolph from her post as national committeewoman. Having the chairman of the Democrats of Texas and leader of the opposition to state party leadership in the prestige-laden national committee post is hard to take.

But removing a national committee member offers difficulties, too. A state convention merely nominates the national committee

members; actual election is by the national convention. Whether a state convention could undo the action of a national convention is not definitely known.

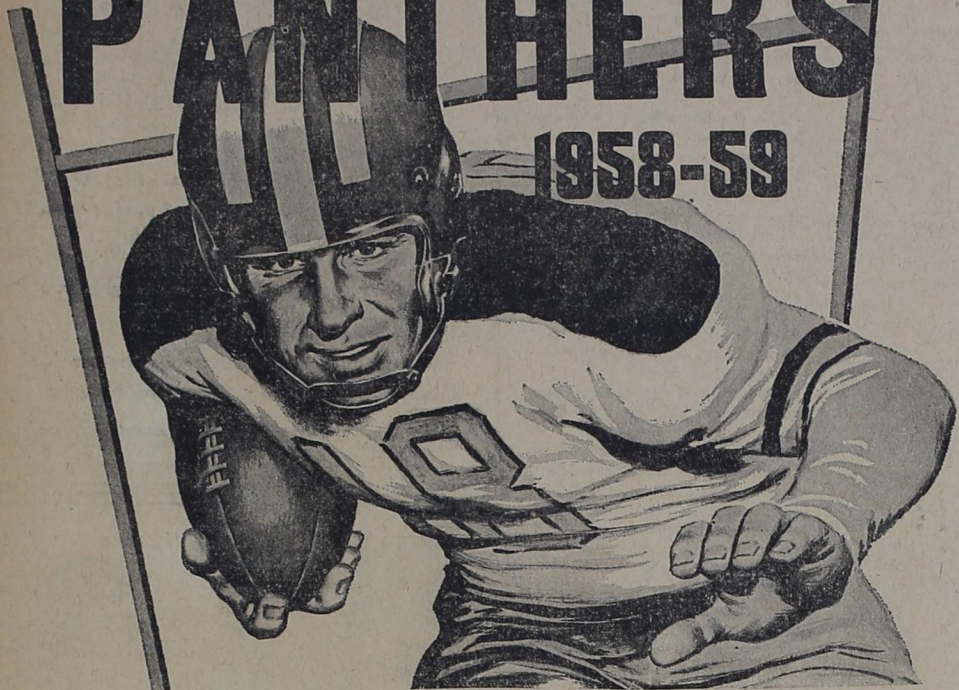

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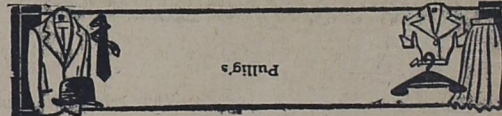

Dove Season Opens In North Zone

AUSTIN, Aug. 28 - Dove Hunters open the season in the North Zone of Texas Monday, Sept. 1, with one of the best crops of doves in years, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. The South Zone will open one month later, except in the Rio Grande Valley counties where white-winged and mourning doves may be shot on Sept. 14 and 16, from 2 p. m. until sunset.

The director gave a few warnings for shooters:
Be sure you have your new 1958-59 hunting license, on sale with wardens, sporting goods stores and county clerks.
Shooting starts at 12 noon and ends at sunset. Be sure to check your time and don't shoot by moonlight.
The limit is 10 doves per day. After the first day you may have 20 mourning doves in your possession. This doesn't mean you can put 20 in the deep freezer and go out and kill another daily limit.

Be sure to get permission from landowners for hunting on their property. You can be arrested for trespassing.

Don't shoot across roads, highways or public property. Stay off of wildlife refuges.

Your gun must be plugged to hold not more than two shells in the magazine and one in the chamber - three shots in all. Look before you shoot. A charge of bird shot in a man's face has a way of irritating him.

Don't shoot from an automobile. Wardens will get you in a hurry.

If you are inclined to be careless, check your life insurance policy.

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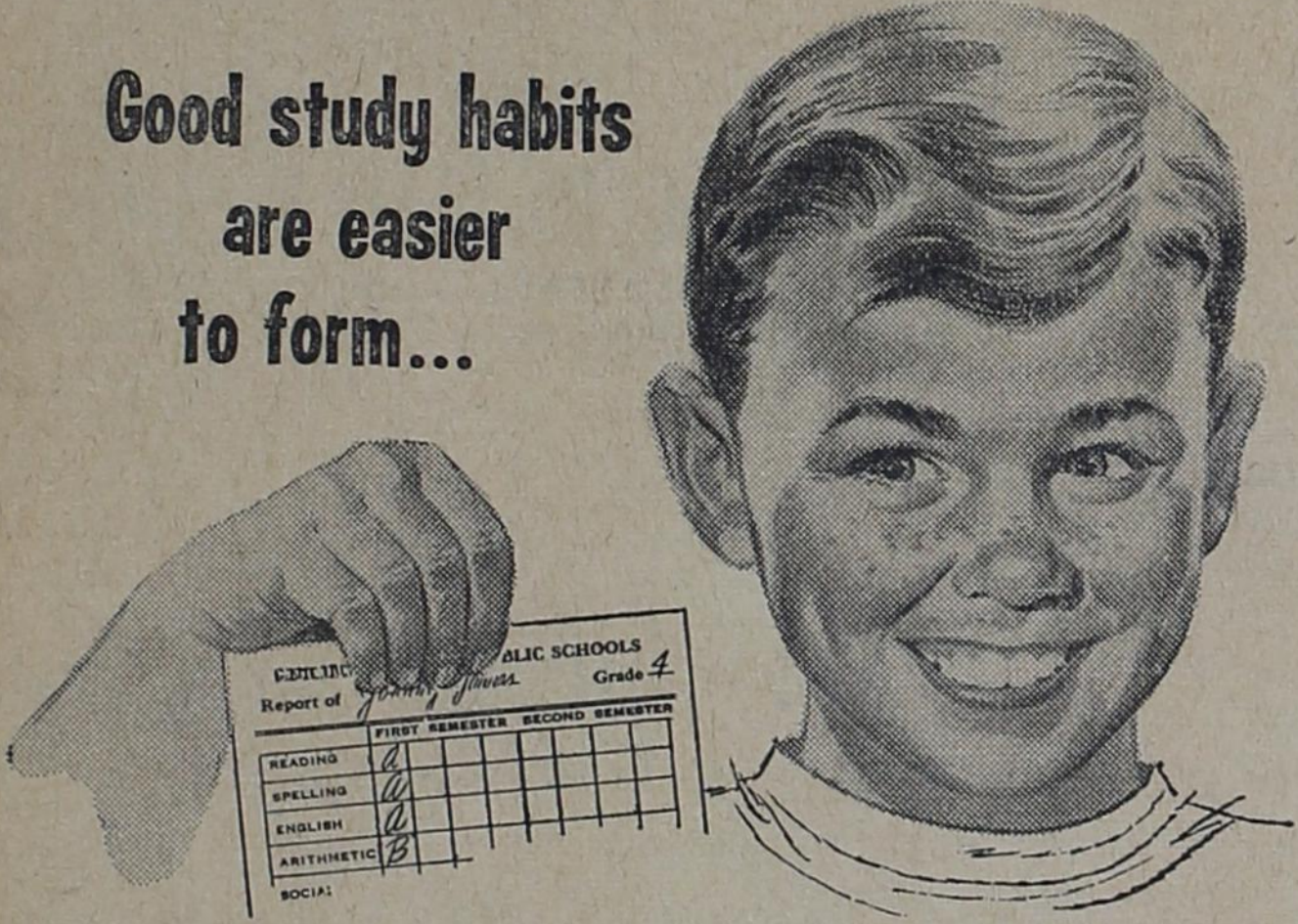
